Stories saved and told one stone at a time

The restoration of the oldest cemetery in the township, Old Zion Presbyterian Cemetery, has been completed and will be displayed at the dedication on August 18.

"To see something that's just a total mess become something pleasing to the eye, it's just incredible,' said **Janie Cooper-Wilson**.

Cooper-Wilson, 72, is the founder, executive director, and co-chair of the Cemetery Defence and Preservation Committee, which was founded 21 years ago.

Cooper-Wilson said she enjoyed

learning about the Old Zion Presbyterian Cemetery.

"There's a tremendous amount of history here," said Cooper-Wilson.

The earliest stone in this cemetery is dated as 1833, and included in the cemetery are a civil war veteran and some individuals who would have been among the early pioneers. Many nationalities are also represented here, including Scottish, English, Dutch, and German.

"Their stories need to be told. It's been lost," said Cooper-Wilson.

"It was a totally different world, and the simplicity of it is amazing." Cooper-Wilson said the individuals buried here deserve their resting place to maintain its dignity and respect.

Cooper-Wilson said she is trying to promote stricter legislations that would ensure inactive and unapproved, or unregistered, cemeteries are taken care of and do not fall into disrepair.

In 2015, the cemetery was added as a project for Cooper-Wilson's committee to work on.

Last fall, the overgrowth was cleared away, the monument restoration company viewed the site, and a budget was given to the municipality.

In June 2018, the debris was cleared

away, some stones were lifted and glued, and a vapour barrier was put in place along with limestone screenings.

With the stones being so fragile, Cooper-Wilson said it was difficult to lift them without causing damage, and they needed to use glue and plywood to hold some stones together.

"It's a long process, and it's not for everyone," said Cooper-Wilson.

"People are hesitant to get involved for a number of reasons. Death is a touchy subject."

Clearview Township has a cemetery preservation fund for the preservation of



"This introduced me to local politics and has given me an insight to the tremendous development opportunities proposed for the airport," said McKechnie. "As a pilot and a training instructor on the Boeing 787 aircraft, I was called as an expert witness at the Environmental Review Tribunal during our fight against the wind turbines. I spent over 40 hours preparing my testimony and attended every day of the hearings. I was cross-examined by the wind turbine's proponent and government lawyers and like to think that I played an important role in our victory."



You just never know with cancer

And so the cancer ride continues. Finally got into the chemo program with my first dose being two weeks ago this Friday. Just starting to feel good and bamoh they are going to hit me again. The oncology unit at RVH is very calming and inviting, if I dare say so myself, with nurses very attentive and checking on you constantly. I asked the nurse who was looking after me, about how many people do they put through the unit on a weekly basis. She said that the average is about 90 people a week. That's a lot of people, and then you consider how many other hospitals put through at least 5 or 6 times that same number a week, shocking how wide the cancer sea has spread. The first drug that they put into me is called the "red devil" because of the red colour and how the devil it makes you feel. Going for the first time you never know how you are going to react to the drug or how it is going to make you feel. I didn't notice any immediate feelings but the rest of the weekend wasn't much fun. Extreme fatigue was the first symptom, the others I won't mention. Before you even start the injections you have to take several anti-nausea medications starting a good hour before and continuing for a couple of days after. Then there is the injection that you have to give yourself in the stomach starting on day 2 after the chemo and continues until three days before the next round, you do these injections throughout the whole eight sessions of chemo that I will be going through. This injection is to boost your white blood cell count so that you have some fight against just the regular germs floating out in the world. During chemo you do not want to be exposed to flu or cold or any other common illness, it can mean death for a chemo patient. I would have loved to take my grandsons to the Children's Festival on Saturday, but the risk of being around those short little germ breeding grounds is too dangerous for me; it sounds like it was such a fun day.

As I was told that this would probably be my last week of having hair on my head (and all other body parts, Yippee, no shaving the legs of this dolly all summer!) I decided to channel my inner David Bowie and go with magenta hair and dig out my vintage DG white bug eye glasses, if you didn't recognize me and thought that dear David had risen from the dead, well... just me. The day before you go for chemo you have to go to your local hospital and have blood work done to check your white blood cell count, if too low then they make you skip a week. You have a teleconference with your oncologist who asks you if you had any major problems or concerns, they can go to different anti-nausea meds but they still can't give you the winning lottery numbers, oh well, worth a try lamenting about it. Till next time...

Summer Salad Days

Summer seems to be flying by! I have been laid up for a while due to knee replacement surgery so you may not have seen me much around Creemore lately. I can now manage stumping around quite well and so have been slowly getting back into the swing of my usual activities, especially those food related. Having been a bit house bound over June and July, it will be good to get back to the Saturday morning farmers' market once more, as well as stroll along Mill Street and catch up with friends!

I have grown various herbs on my back deck for many years, such as rosemary, chives, thyme and Italian parsley. This year I decided to throw a few lettuces into the mix. I don't know if it was the weather we've had or what, but I have had a bumper crop of salad greens for some time now (with little to no bugs) and not that much attention on my part, aside from diligently watering on a regular basis. Sometimes gardening with benign neglect works out!

While we like to eat as many fresh greens as we can during the peak summer season, a plain green salad can get a bit boring at times. There are all sorts of ways to jazz it up a bit, and this recipe has become one of our favourite summer go to meals. Try this interesting dinner salad that is good as your main with a slice of homemade garlic bread, or serve it as a side dish to accompany some of your favourite barbequed meats. As an added bonus, you can serve it warm or cold. It is also pretty kid friendly too, as I've met few children who don't like simple cheese filled pasta!

LEMONY CHICKEN & PASTA SUMMER SALAD

Serves 4 as a side dish/2 as dinner

Cooked and shredded chicken breast meat (1 breast per person)

- 1 package tri-colour cheese tortellini
- 2 large garlic cloves, minced
- ½ teaspoon salt
- ½ cup extra virgin olive oil
- 1/4 cup freshly squeezed lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon lemon zest
- 1 teaspoon liquid honey
- ½ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 4 cups of salad greens a combination of arugula, butter lettuce and red leaf lettuce is nice

¹/₄ cup shaved parmesan (grated will also do)

To prepare the vinaigrette and let the flavours meld, whisk together garlic, salt, extra virgin olive oil, lemon juice, lemon zest, honey and black pepper in 'a small bowl. Let sit until you are ready to dress the salad.

For the chicken, you can either roast or barbeque your own or use a store bought rotisserie bird. In a large pot of boiling, salted water, cook the tortellini as per package instructions then drain and set aside in colander.

In a large salad bowl, toss the shredded chicken, cooked tortellini and vinaigrette together with the salad greens until well blended. Serve topped with shaved parmesan – can be served slightly warm or cold.

Keep your pet safe during the dog days of summer

The Ontario SPCA's 2018 No Hot Pets campaign is underway in partnership with SPCAs and humane societies from across Canada to remind the public about the danger of leaving pets unattended in vehicles.

"I left the window down for him" and "I wasn't going to be gone long" are just a few of the excuses the Ontario SPCA has heard.

There is no excuse for leaving a pet unattended in a vehicle.

The Ontario SPCA has a zero tolerance policy and charges will be laid if animals are found by an Ontario SPCA agent or inspector to be in

distress inside a vehicle.

The Ontario SPCA is asking the public to share the dangers of leaving pets in vehicles using the hashtag #nohotpets on social media. You can also help make a difference by going online to nohotpets.ca to take the pledge never to leave an animal in a vehicle and to report it if you see it happen. Those who pledge will receive a free No Hot Pets window decal for their vehicles, while supplies last.

"People still aren't getting the message about how dangerous it is to leave your pet unattended in a vehicle," says Connie Mallory, Chief Inspector,

Ontario SPCA. "Leave your pet at home, and if you must take your pet, make sure that someone is with it at all times."

Businesses across the province are also getting on board with the campaign and are welcoming animals into their place of business while pet owners shop. For a complete list of participants, as well as registration.

Parked cars can quickly reach deadly temperatures, even on relatively mild days with the car parked in the shade and the windows slightly open. Dogs have a limited ability to sweat, so even a short time in a hot environment can be life-threatening.






