# Farmers' Market season extends through winter

The Creemore Farmers' Market is expanding its season through the winter months.

Market manager Helen Martin said the decision to add two markets each month from December to March was made because there was interest from vendors, consumers and downtown Creemore businesses.

"Farmers' markets are a proven local economic driver in all communities and the demand for more markets is growing exponentially every year," said Martin. "That is also true of the Saturday Creemore and Sunday Mulmur Farmers' Markets."

She said over the past few years farmers and producers indicated they wanted to keep the momentum of the summer market season going throughout the winter, to maintain a year-round connection with their customer base.

"When customers have developed a relationship with a producer they want to buy from them all the time not have to switch to other markets or stores in the off-season. There was much enthusiasm at Thanksgiving when we announced to customers and visitors at the market that a winter market was going to happen this year," said Martin.

"Since some of our producers are also vendors in Orangeville on alternate Saturday mornings, the decision to have our market on the opposite weekends worked out well for them. Winter production is usually done on a smaller scale than summer production, which means that weekly yield does not have to be divided between two (See "Eight" on page 5)





# 100 Women concept harnesses the power of the chequebook

Area women are donating thousands of dollars to local charities.

No muss, no fuss.

100 Women Who Care South Georgian Triangle is not an organization, really. In fact, the goal is to keep administration to a minimum and facilitate donations to area charities with the most efficiency possible. And the idea is spreading.

Members only need commit to four hours and \$400.

"Four times a year we get together and hear from different organizations that have been nominated by the membership and we vote," said steering committee member **Susie McLeod**, a Duntroon area resident and Collingwood Collegiate Institute (CCI) teacher.

"I see it everyday, working with youth, the challenges that families have in this area but for me it's connecting these people new to our area because they don't know that Collingwood and area, Clearview Township, Wasaga Beach and Thornbury-Meaford, there are a lot of families that struggle," she said.

Members donate directly to the selected charity.

At the inaugural meeting in September, more than \$12,000 was donated to Home Horizon's Barbara Weider House, which offers housing and services for homeless youth,

At the second meeting in November, the money went to the Salvation Army's Emergency Assist program.

The concept is spreading through word-of-mouth and personal invitation. At last count, there are 147 members, meaning there is potential for almost \$15,000 to be raised per meeting.

Because each member has the opportunity to nominate a charity, there is an incentive to go out in the

community and learn about what organizations are out there and learn more about their programs.

Three organizations are chosen by random draw and representatives are invited to attend the next meeting and make a pitch.


"It's a bit of a reveal," said McLeod.
"You go to the meeting not knowing who has been selected and who is going to speak."

Members vote based on the pitch and everyone supports the chosen charity.

McLeod said there are spin-off benefits for the organizations that are not selected in that they have had a chance to promote their organization, may gain volunteers and in some cases people are writing cheques to them on the side.

"Eventually they will be selected. I feel their time will come. If they weren't selected and their name goes back into the draw for the next meeting," said McLeod.

McLeod first learned of the 100 Women Who Care concept when she and her mom, Cyndy Reycraft, who is also a member, were visiting a friend in Nova Scotia. The friend was talking about the meeting she had attended when they supported an organization that was using the money to purchase fentanyl recovery kits. The organization was founded by a Michigan woman and now, The 100 Who Care Alliance helps connect (See "100" on page 8)

# Corporations bad for business

We've been biting our tongues as the news of newspaper closures spreads throughout the region.

In a swap, Torstar gave some of its titles to Postmedia and vice versa. In this area, the Enterprise-Bulletin was shut down as a result of the deal, in order to strengthen the Metroland Media papers.

Media corporations are like most other corporations, at the upper levels they measure success in profits

There is a lot being said about who is to blame for the demise of newspapers in general and there is a disturbing amount of blame being put on the reader. But who is to blame for watering down a once relevant community newspaper and rushing to give content away for free on Facebook? To cut costs, corporations amalgamate, close offices, cut staff and then say profits are down. (It reminds us of a certain corporate bank that consistently enticed customers toward the bank machine and then decides to close a branch because customers aren't visiting the teller.)

Like sheep, we let corporations nudge us to a certain behavior and then they blame us for whatever it is we did.

As newspaper people, one may think that we would see closures as removal of the competition but that isn't the case. We see any closure as a disservice to the reader and the community at large. The common sentiment is that people aren't consuming media the way they used to, that they don't want to pay for it and that advertisers are directing their ad dollars online.

And while all those things are true to a certain extent there is still a huge appetite for news and information, especially regarding what affects them most – community.


That's why we are staying true to our roots, attempting to put out an old school newspaper every week. Sure, there isn't a ton of breaking news each week and there is a significant amount of news that we are "not allowed" to put in the paper even though everyone in town already knows (often we feel like we are the last ones to know).

Corporations don't belong in the newsrooms of the nation. They don't know how to do local community news. Once they start printing entertainment news about Lady Gaga and recipes from restaurants 100 kilometres away you know they have lost their way. As readers we can get that content from a hundred other publications.




