At about 10 a.m. on August 15, officers responded to a shooting on a property on 15/16 Sideroad near Highway 26. Upon arrival, officers located one individual who had sustained a gunshot wound. The individual was transported to hospital with non-life-threatening injuries. Investigators believe the suspects fled the scene in a blue Volkswagen sedan prior to police arrival.

This investigation remains ongoing by the Huronia West OPP Crime Unit under the direction of the OPP Criminal Investigation Branch.

Contestants inspire local Amazing Race

Farm tour connects producers, consumers

The Dufferin Farm Tour, established in 1998 by a group of dedicated farmers, was created to bridge the gap between rural and urban communities.

The annual event, that has been running for over 25 years, offers a unique opportunity to visit working farms, hear firsthand about the challenges of producing safe, nutritious food, and learn about the importance of local agriculture. Each fall, a different group of farmers opens their doors to the public, inviting families to engage with farm animals, ask the farmers questions, and watch live demonstrations.

Dufferin is home to over 700 farms, but often the connection between these farms and the food on our plate is lost. The Dufferin Farm Tour aims to close this gap by fostering dialogue and providing a firsthand look at modern farming practices. When people understand how their food is grown and raised, they are more likely to support local farmers and contribute to the local economy. Over the years, thousands of people of all ages have enjoyed this enriching experience.

Agriculture is one of the largest economic contributors in Dufferin County. With its related industries, agriculture is also one of the county's largest employers. Dufferin County's top five farm commodities are cattle and calves, dairy, potatoes, soybeans, and corn.

This year's tour offers a variety

of farm experiences, including an original Town of Mono homestead with beef cattle and chickens grazing on pasture; robotic milking at a hightech 35,000 square foot Holstein dairy barn; a school of horsemanship; a market garden and hydroponic greenhouse operation; and wagon rides through a Christmas tree farm.

The Sept. 27 tour is from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., rain or shine. Food, refreshments and local produce are available at various stops along the route. Be sure to bring cash for any purchases. Donations to local food banks are encouraged. Visit www. dufferinfarmtour.com to register. A passport and map will be sent out to those registered.



Sonja describes Viola and Curto as "our John," a reference to **John Montgomery**, host of *Amazing Race Canada*. "They'll be present at the start in Creemore, and they'll pop up at different venues throughout the day to cheer people on, then join us for dinner that evening."

Sonja says the actual challenges will remain a secret until competitors arrive at each venue, but she does hint there will be an accessibility challenge, a grain bin challenge and a gross food challenge among others. "If you are not from Clearview. some of the clues will be tough." Because this is a race, the challenges will be timed but organizers have planned the route to allow plenty of travel

time between venues. "All rules of the road will apply, and anyone speeding will be disqualified," she says. Costumes are not mandatory, but there will be bonus points awarded for creative attire.

Full-time county warden appointed

On August 12, Simcoe County council received the municipal results of its composition's triple majority process for review.

Following council's endorsement in April 2025, municipalities were asked to consent to Council Composition By-law 7119-25, which proposed changing the current structure of council from 32 representatives (including the warden) to 16 representatives plus a full-time appointed warden.

The vote at the lower-tier level resulted in a tie, with eight member municipalities providing consent and eight providing non-consent. While the full triple majority requirement under the Municipal Act was not achieved, two of the three conditions were met (see Triple Majority Process below).

Given this outcome, council approved the following resolution through a weighted vote: That the warden write a letter to the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing to request the Province intervene to allow Council Composition By-law 7119-25 to be considered valid notwithstanding the "triple majority" requirements set out in Section 219 of the Municipal Act.


A letter from Warden **Basil Clarke** will be sent to The Honourable **Rob Flack**, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, for consideration. Any outcomes or feedback will be presented to County Council once available.

Under the triple majority process, as defined in the provisions of Ontario's Municipal Act, 2001:

- County council must pass the by-law;
- Majority of lower-tier municipalities must consent (there are 16 total Member Municipalities in the County of Simcoe); and
- The member municipalities that consent must represent a majority of Simcoe County electors.

LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

We just need to move forward

The 2006 documentary film *Who Killed the Electric Car?* had a big impact on me. It provided me an early understanding of the technology and helped me to understand that there are always forces fighting innovation to protect investment.

The film outlines the rise and fall of battery-powered electric vehicles (EVs) in the U.S. in the 1990s, and the roles of manufacturers, government, consumers, and the oil industry. If things had gone differently, a large portion of the population could have been driving electric vehicles for 30 years, meaning they'd be supported by an established electrical and charging grid, and they'd have come down in price.

I think of this film often when I hear people make a case for combustion engine vehicles. But with the status quo comes rising global temperatures, drought, forest fires, and smoky air. Here we are, living the effects of climate change, and still doing nothing about it. Under political pressure, many incentives to loosen our dependence on fossil fuels are being chipped away – no more EV rebates, no consumer carbon pricing.

The Conservative Party of Canada is calling on the federal government to permanently drop its Zero Emissions Vehicle (ZEV) mandate – requiring the number of new zero-emission vehicles sold in Canada to be at 100 per cent by 2035 – a call that is supported by many mayors in Ontario.

Conservative Leader Pierre Poilievre's reasoning is that "Canada's auto industry is already under enormous stress due to U.S. tariffs and cannot afford the costs of Carney's punishing mandate. Starting next year, the number of hybrid, plug-in hybrid and gas-powered vehicles will be capped, and any car above the quota will be hit with a \$20,000 tax per vehicle sold."

The tariffs are an economic tragedy and cannot be ignored but they will impact all vehicles, not just EVs, and the tax may be the only way to compel manufacturers to comply with targets.


We cannot turn away from the end goal of reducing greenhouse gases because of what is hopefully a political blip. The planet will not wait for us to figure this out. In the meantime, if the electrical grid can't handle charging vehicles, can it handle the increase load from air conditioners? Opponents of EVs often say the electrical grid can't handle the load of EVs but industry experts have said that it can, with the phased-in use of EVs, along with regular upgrades to the grid. Most EV drivers charge their vehicles at home during low-peak and there are some really innovative proposals to use personal EVs as a battery bank for the grid, feeding electricity back in when it is needed during peak usage.

Look, it feels like the planet is melting, and we have to do something to try to minimize human impact. I often feel helpless but I understand that as a consumer (and not a very powerful one) I have an opportunity to support innovation. That's why I bought an EV. It has not been without its limitations and financial sacrifices. EV batteries are environmentally problematic, but less so than combustion engines. I just hope EVs, or the next generation, survive the current political climate.

New dental clinic opens in Stayner

Long-time Stayner residents may recognize the building at the corner of Elm Street and Highway 26 as the former home of a dental practice.

Beginning this week, the new Clearview Family Dental will be welcoming patients at the site.

Dr. Robert Davis closed his Stayner office in 2018 and the building stood vacant for several years, falling into a state of disrepair. Mickey Sarhan, a commercial real estate investor and contractor was familiar with the building, having passed it on many childhood outings to Wasaga Beach.

Both Sarhan's parents are dentists. At one point they owned 27 clinics throughout Ontario, with their headquarters in Toronto. Now semiretired, they have scaled back to four clinics in Hamilton, Welland, Mississauga, and now Stayner.

Sarhan originally approached Davis about purchasing the Stayner property in 2023 and finally arrived at a deal last December. Since then, he's been renovating the building – trying to maintain the original character while updating it into a modern clinic with six operating suites and a modern digital x-ray suite.

"I wanted this to be a welcoming, family-friendly space, not a sterile environment," said Sarhan, chief creative officer. "We kept the original trim and fireplaces, and even the patio

area where people can relax while they're waiting on other members of the family. If you're looking for a flashy clinic with koi ponds, this is not it. We just want to provide the best care in a humble environment."

Initially only two of the six operating suites will be in use. Ultimately Sarhan says they have room for three dentists and two hygienists. Two dentists from their Mississauga location will handle Stayner patients while the search continues for the right dentist to lead the local clinic. "We are looking for a dentist who wants to make Stayner their home and make a commitment to the community," he adds.

Sarhan says it typically takes about one year for a new dental practice to fill one day per week with appointments.

"We will start out with Friday appointments and expand as needed," he said. "We anticipate that within a couple of years, we'll be open six days a week."

The cost of outfitting a new clinic from scratch can be in the \$700,000 range. Sarhan says the fact that they were able to purchase some equipment from Dr. Davis was a big help. The clinic began soliciting new patient two weeks ago, and started getting emails and phone messages right away.





Five-year strategy outlines plan for high-quality programming including over 4,900 new affordable licensed child care spaces

The County of Simcoe is releasing a revitalized strategy that will deliver over 4,900 new affordable licensed child care spaces between 2022 and 2026, including a strengthened workforce, and the promotion of equity, inclusion, and culturally responsive programming in early learning services. This follows County Council's approval of the 2025-2029 Early Learning and Child Care Service System Plan on June 24.

"The County's Early Learning and Child Care Service System Plan will enrich the diverse landscape of all early learning services. By creating an additional 2,450 affordable spaces by December 2026, we will nearly double the number of spaces that Simcoe County has created since 2022," said Warden **Basil Clarke**. "This is wonderful news for families across our region. These spaces will open doors to brighter futures for thousands of children and their families, helping build a thriving, connected Simcoe County for generations to come."

The plan outlines a vision that ensures inclusive, accessible, high-

quality, and affordable early learning and child care. It was developed through extensive community consultation that has been backed up by comprehensive data analysis.

The 2025-2029 Early Learning and Child Care Service System Plan outlines three key strategic priorities:

- Learning and Child Care Experiences
 Improving access to information and services
- Supporting culturally safe and inclusive programming
- 2. Thriving and Sustainable Early Learning and Child Care Workforce

- Strengthening recruitment and retention strategies
 - 3. Cohesive Community Planning
- Leading collaborative planning with community partners
- Engaging diverse voices, including parents and equity-deserving groups



"The needs don't stop, not for a






