

Avening Hall celebrates accessibility at re-opening

Avening Community Centre will celebrate the completion of an accessibility renovation with a grand re-opening on Nov. 30.

The community is invited to take part in the celebration and tour the updated facility. To render the hall fully accessible, it has been outfitted with an elevator, ramps, a new kitchen and gender-free washrooms, including two wheelchair accessible stalls. The renovations were paid for by the Township of Clearview, who owns the building.

Bill Hewitt, who served as hall board chair during the renovation, said he is grateful that the building has been improved to better serve the community and ensure its longevity.

"I think it's important to have spaces like this to bring people together," said Hewitt. "It's been a long time coming but it's great that we're here."

The \$1.4-million renovation began in June 2023, after more than a decade of planning, and was plagued with construction delays. A replacement contractor had to be hired after construction targets weren't met.

"We look forward to welcoming the community back to the hall," said Hewitt, noting that the hall was often closed during the pandemic, before the renovation began. "We absolutely want people to come and reengage with their community hall and use it."

He hopes people will come together

at the re-opening to visit with fellow community members and share memories.

Avening Community Centre first celebrated its grand opening on July 6, 1951, and with 700 cold meat suppers served that day it was declared "the biggest event in the history of Avening," by *The Creemore Star*:

Since then it has been the gathering place for the Junior Farmers and the Avening Women's Institute, a venue for funerals and weddings, flower shows, bowling leagues, card games, baby showers and birthday parties.

The grand re-opening will be marked with a ribbon cutting at 2 p.m., remarks at 2:30 p.m., afternoon tea, and tours of the

facility. Dignitaries, past volunteer board members, and community members should be in receipt of invites but all are welcome.

Visitors will notice that no changes have been made to the main hall, its original character perfectly preserved. The only exception is the installation of an upgraded sound system funded by donations. The bowling alleys are in the process of being refurbished by **Murray Lackie**, and have already been used several times since the hall opened last month.

According to Let's Celebrate Nottawasaga's Sesquicentennial and Ontario's Bicentennial, the prospect of a community centre started with Avening and Banda Farm Forums which had begun in 1941. In 1950 Jack Rainbird, president of Avening Farm Forum, learned that an Air Force hut was available from Edenvale Aerodrome for \$1,000.

Rainbird, Lorne Sutherland and Howard Noble were the key men who approached the bank, and put in money besides, to start the fund. Members of Avening and Banda donated \$60 each with the result the hut was purchased for cash.

The hut, 30 feet by 130 feet, was dismantled and moved to Avening. All work was done by community volunteers, except the head electrician, the plasterer and the installation of the furnace.

Beef barbecues, since 1980, have raised considerable funds for renovations and upgrades over the years, along with Wintario grants.

Since 2002, the hall has been a concert venue featuring some of Canada's top performers, with bar proceeds going to maintenance and upkeep of the hall.

Community dispersed when encampment dismantled

Editor:

I am writing this to inform our community about a situation that is happening in another closely knit community. The Kensington Market in Toronto has historically been an inclusive community which values diversity and change. The Rev. Maggie Helwig and the people of St. Stephens-in-the Fields Anglican Church have been supporting an encampment in their church yard for some years. On Oct. 16, I bore witness as the city removed the personal belongings of the residents. St. Stephens has been supporting this community with outreach support, daily meals, and personal contact.

Currently the church yard is fenced off and covered with cement blocks with no removal date given. Private security has been monitoring this church yard, and several other parkettes in the area 24/7. As a result the entire Kensington Market neighbourhood has become an unwelcoming security zone, in response from a small number of loud voices.

In Creemore and our surrounding beautiful escarpment we are also a diversified community.

We have the privilege of open spaces, trees, parks for our children to enjoy, and the Bruce Trail to hike on.

We also are privileged in many ways. We have food, warm homes and a community to help in times of need. The people that I met that day, were a community amongst themselves. They passed around the food for breakfast, such as it was, to share amongst themselves. Now they are separated, and living in alleys, and in some cases have not yet been found.

I urge you to write to Mayor Olivia Chow and ask how much money is being spent on security that could be spent to enhance social services for the most vulnerable of our society.

Food bank manager, Rev. Lorna May received the donation, which will help feed the 52 families who currently rely on the service.







100+ Women Who Care South Georgian Triangle surpasses \$600,000 in funds

Members of 100+ Women Who Care South Georgian Triangle (SGT) continue to make a remarkable impact across South Georgian Bay, surpassing \$600,000 in collective donations since the chapter's founding eight years ago.


Beach. The funds will enable the Mobile Soup Kitchen to purchase fresh food and expand its meal service to reach even more community members.

Young athlete training for biathlon at top tier

He's become a familiar sight in Creemore: 13-yearold **Nolan Martin-Mills** whipping around town on his roller skis. Martin-Mills is training for the biathlon – an event which pairs cross country skiing and shooting. He is already competing at an advanced level, and his coach says an Olympic berth is a reasonable goal.

Martin-Mills advanced from Development 2 level to Development 3 in the past year.

"Now there are more races and I'm training about 350 hours over the course of the season."

He trains along with five other Development 3 athletes at Highlands Nordic in Duntroon where he and two others moved up to the top tier this year. Three senior members of the team train more than 550 hours per season. Many athletes max out at Development Level 2 by the time they are 16-18 years of age. Only the most dedicated advance to Level 3.

Martin-Mills trains with his teammates at Highlands Nordic on Wednesday, Saturday and Sunday. The rest of his training is self directed, based on a program set out by his coach.

"We can only get out on skis here once there is enough snow, probably in late December or early January. Until then, it's all roller skiing. It's harder to practice at speed because if you fall you're not landing on snow. It's concrete. There are no brakes on roller skis but it's a great way to work on technique."

Shooting practise also continues year-round. Martin-Mills says the focus shifts with the season. "In summer, we work on precision shooting, trying to put five bullets one right on top of the other. Once we get into biathlon season, we are trying to get all five bullets somewhere on the target."

In addition to Nolan, mom **Sarah Martin-Mills** has two younger children in the program.

"We are a volunteer organization and every parent pitches in to keep it as affordable as possible. Even so, the cost of equipment and travel adds up."

"If you want to be competitive, you need race skis plus rock skis, classic roller skis and skate roller skis, two pairs of boots and three sets of poles, "according to Sarah. "Fortunately you can get some bargains at the ski swap at Highlands, and the club leases equipment."

Each pair of skis can cost \$500 plus, if purchased new and the rifles used for the shooting portion of the competition can be \$4,000 used, or about \$8,000 new.

Competitions last for a full weekend with sprint races on Day 1 to earn starting placements in the pursuit races on Day 2. A sprint race typically involves three bouts of shooting and four legs of skiing. The pursuit races involve shooting four times and skiing five legs.

Biathlon is a very popular winter sport in Europe. Within Canada, it's most popular in Alberta and British Columbia and not so well known in Ontario. There are a limited number of races at the Development 3 level including a big annual competition in Van Cartier, Quebec. This year's Nationals will be held in Canmore, Alberta. Nolan says in a typical season, the team might travel south of the border three or four times for races and training camps. This year, they will go to the U.S. only once.





Developer unveils vision for restored Sovereign

Progress on two in-fill projects on Creemore's Mill Street is slow but steady, according to principal **Frank Domenichiello**.

Domenichiello, a Woodbridge based builder is restoring the historic Sovereign building, which was heavily damaged by fire in December 2022, and constructing a mixed use building dubbed Casa Riccia at 143 and 145 Mill St.

Architect **Nolan Bentley**, of D&H Architects in Orangeville, says the roof is scheduled to go on Casa Riccia this week.

"Then we can proceed with the stone and brick veneer, firewalls and fire separation, framing, plumbing and HVAC."

Domenichiello says interior

Domenichiello says interior finishing will not happen until spring, and at that time, they will begin marketing the building.

"We've already had lots of interest. There will be one or two commercial units on the ground floor, with a total of about 4,500 square feet plus four second floor apartments and a roof top terrace. We have designed the commercial space to be flexible with good ceiling height and accessibility features."

Over at the Sovereign, Phase 1 has been reinforcement of the existing building. With that work largely completed, the owners have applied for building permits for a Phase 2 addition. Ultimately, Domenichiello says the building will have about 6,000 square feet of ground floor commercial space and seven apartments.

"The footprint will be the same as the previous building, but there will be plenty of upgrades including a fully accessible elevator and handicapped washrooms," he said. "We stripped all the paint off the brick on the original building. We want this to be a quality restoration so we needed to know what we were working with."

It is possible that the foundation for the addition will be poured before winter fully sets in. That depends on the timing of permits.

He predicts that the revitalized Sovereign will be ready for occupancy sometime in 2026.
