Hospital hosts visioning session in Creemore

Collingwood General and Marine Hospital (CGMH) is holding a visioning session in Creemore on Nov. 25 to gather input into early design concepts for the new hospital.

"Every community has its own personality and voice," said Cathy Renaud, Vice President, Hospital Development, CGMH. "South Georgian Bay has a creative and connected energy unlike anywhere else, and we want that essence to be felt throughout our new hospital. These sessions are an opportunity to hear directly from the people who live here - to make sure the design reflects the people, stories, and values that define South Georgian Bay."

In December, the provincial government announced \$95.5 million in funding for the new hospital, planned for Poplar Sideroad, with an increased capacity of 132 private inpatient beds, up from 84 beds, and expanded access to key services, including intensive care, emergency, diagnostic imaging, and operating suites. The hospital serves more than 74,000 residents and 3.5 million annual visitors to the communities of Wasaga Beach, Collingwood, Clearview and the Blue Mountains. Construction is anticipated

to begin in fall 2028 and the new hospital set to open as early as 2033.

Community members are invited to help answer the following questions: What should it feel like to enter South Georgian Bay's future hospital? How should its spaces reflect care, connection, and belonging? And what qualities should shine through in the design of a hospital built by – and for – this community?

The drop-in session at Station on the Green from 5 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. offers a chance to provide input into early design concepts, explore ideas from other modern hospitals, and share your thoughts directly with the Hospital Development Planning Team.

Recreation prioritized during budget workshops

There was a focus on improving access to recreation during Clearview council's budget workshops this week.

Staff presented a \$22-million budget, which comes with a tax increase of just over 2.4 per cent once estimated school, county and policing costs are factored in.

During the workshops, additional spending was allocated for sports and recreation and council discussed a plan for an increased annual contribution to a parks capital projects reserve to create more recreation opportunities and enhance township facilities. As a result of the budget, residents may

see the addition of pickleball and tennis courts, basketball court and frisbee golf.

A significant portion of the sevenhour workshop held over two days saw council doing some soul searching about the Stayner pool.

The aging pool is leaking and needs a new mechanical system. Council's discussions have ranged from shutting down the pool to building a new indoor pool, with limping along and maintaining access to the pool being the current course of action.

There is currently \$150,000 in the 2026 budget, with \$32,500 coming from taxation, for the replacement of the mechanical system; security camera monitoring; interior office renovations; lane ropes; deck chairs; water bottle refill station.

Council directed staff to move forward with the mechanical work before or after the upcoming pool season, and report back to council during the first half of 2026, to address options and phases of the pool replacement project, including a redevelopment of the entire property.

Phase 2 of repairs and upgrades are estimated to cost \$217,800, not including accessibility requirements. Terry Vachon, director of parks and recreation, told council that his best guess is that it will cost \$500,000 to

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

Council votes to proceed with pool renovations

keep the pool open long-term.

Most agreed, that is a large expense considering the pool is only open for two months of the year and runs at a \$100,000 deficit each season.

Councillor **John Broderick** asked what it would take to build an indoor pool. Vachon said development charge money will be available in the near future to conduct a feasibility study but consultation for the existing 2018-2028 *Parks, Recreation, and Culture Master Plan* indicated residents were comfortable with a 25-minute drive to reach a destination facility, such as an indoor pool.

Councillor **Robert Walker** said he would like to see a survey done to see if that is still true, recognizing times have changed.

The public is invited to comment on the proposed budget at the Dec. 8 council meeting, beginning at 5:30 p.m.

With new strong mayor powers, as mandated by the province, the mayor will then present a proposed budget to council on Jan. 8. Council will have 30 days to pass a resolution to amend and the budget, thereby setting the tax rate.

The mayor then has 10 days from the end of the council review period to veto any council amendment. To veto a council amendment, the head of council must provide written documentation of the veto and rationale to each member of council and the municipal clerk on the day of the veto. Within a 15-day period after the head of council's veto period, council may override the head of council's veto of a council amendment if two-thirds of all council members vote to override the veto.

- Replace sound system \$25,000 (taxation).

- Refurbish baseball diamonds \$40,000;
- Aluminum bleachers \$10,000 (taxation).

Creemore Parks

• Gowan Park bleachers \$10,000 (taxation); \$115,000 from fundraising.

Library

Construction of the Creemore library branch's 1,000 square foot addition, funded by development charges in the amount of \$930,000, is set to begin in the fall of 2026.

Library CAO Jennifer LaChapelle said the board seeking grants to fund accessible washrooms and is developing a fundraising campaign for things like shelving and maker space equipment such as 3D printers and button makers.

Planning

The development of the Stayner Secondary Plan in the amount of \$350,000-\$500,000, to be done over 18-24 months.

It was referred to as one of the most significant planning initiatives, looking out 50 years or more,

and a critical component of the development charge early payment project funding and water capacity allocation agreement related to the Klondike Park water servicing project for Stayner.

Roads

Road paving projects (pulverize, add gravel, pave and shouldering) on Concession 6 North Nottwasaga from County Road 91 to 33/34 Sideroad in the amount of \$1,225,500; and Concession 10 South Nottwasaga from County Road 91 to County Road 124 in the amount of \$780,000.




2014 two-seat utility terrain vehicle (UTV) to be replaced with a four-seat UTV with fire suppression and rescue drop-in unite, at a cost of \$50,000, for off-road medical calls

Fire Chief **Scott Davison** proposed a future discussion about an aerial fire truck, to be funded through development charges, and the replacement of a 2010 pumper truck.

Youth centre

The Clearview Youth Centre (currently in a temporary location until it moves into its new location in the former Stayner Care Centre) is requesting a second part-time staff to extend youth centre hours from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m.

Where am I at war with myself?

"As within, so without; as above, so below; as the universe, so the soul." This quote is a modern paraphrase of words found on the Emerald Tablet, a short mystical text attributed to Hermes Trismegistus.



This philosophical

perspective promotes the idea that who we are on the inside is mirrored in the world around us, and vice versa. The microcosm (individual) is interconnected with the macrocosm (universe). November has had me thinking a lot about this quote and how it relates to peace.

When I was young I believed that peace was outside of myself. That peace could only be achieved when "those people" stopped fighting or when "those people" learned to get along. In school we learned about the United Nations and the Peacekeepers. We learned about war and how bad people do bad things to good people. How there are victims and perpetrators. How power differentials – those that have and those that don't – make peace hard.

These concepts of non-peace are true, but lately I've been hearing whispers of another truth. A truth that enables me to add or take away from the vibration of peace. A truth that asks how am I promoting peace instead of expecting someone else to take up the charge. That whisper has lead to shining light on shadows that would rather stay in the dark. November began with the question, "where am I at war with myself?" I'm at war with my body when I judge it and compare myself to others. I'm at war with the part of me that doesn't want to hurt other people's feelings so I don't say how I really feel.

I'm at war with the part of me that feels I haven't helped enough people so what am I really doing with my one wild and precious life? I'm at war with the part of me that wants to howl and dance naked in the moonlight, but also cares what the neighbours think. Many of these battles are present because of my upbringing and societal conditioning. To break free I stepped on the path of healing which exposes internal struggles and offers opportunities to begin again. This path also presented me with the cold hard truth that it's hard to stand for peace when there's war going on inside of you.

As I age, the more I understand "as within, so without." What I do to myself ripples out and impacts others. If I engage the world from my wounded places I'm not a nice person and I do not add to the peace quotient. If I choose to look with curiosity at my inner "wars" and engage in healing practices to transmute them I can be in the world from a more peaceful place. I've found that the more peaceful I become the more I see peace all around me. For me peace is not about the bad guys out there its about how I show up in the world. I believe if enough of us did the work to live from the still point of inner peace we would find ourselves in a more peaceful and loving world.

At its September meeting, 100 Men Who Care Southern Georgian Bay chose to support Brad's Place Addiction Treatment of Southern Georgian Bay with a \$12,229 donation.

"We are pleased to support the kick-off of Brad's Place's Mentorship Program," said **David Trafford**, Leadership Team Member of 100 Men Who Care Southern Georgian Bay. "This donation will not only support the operational needs of Brad's Place but also help inspire a new approach to recovery — one that shifts the narrative from stigma and shame to hope and empowerment."

Brad's Place was formed in 2018 by 18 individuals, galvanized by the passing of someone close to them due to drug addiction. Clearview Township is once again supporting the Simcoe County Paramedics Food and Toy Drive through the 'Toys for Tickets' initiative.



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JS Bach's odyssey imagined in chamber musical

As a young man, Johann Sebastian Bach made a long journey on foot to see a famous organist perform. Bach, a gifted performer but not yet a composer, was given one month leave from his employer in Arnstadt, Germany to make the 450-kilometre trek to Lübeck to hear the renowned organist Dietrich Buxtehude, a journey that stretched to four months.

What happened or might have happened on Bach's odyssey in 1705, at the age of 20, is the inspiration for JS Bach's Long Walk in the Snow, the fifth chamber musical from Tom Allen, a familiar voice on CBC Radio.

He said the genre of his own invention combines musical theatre, chamber music and storytelling.

JS Bach's Long Walk promises street fights, big business, insight, fulfillment, the father figure Bach didn't know he needed and, quite possibly, love.

Allen explains that the love story, and for him the most fascinating part of the tale, emerges when it is imagined that Bach considers marriage to Buxtehude's eldest daughter Anna Margareta. Allen explains that it was not uncommon in that time and place for it to be stipulated that a predecessor marry one of their children, as Buxtehude had done. As Buxtehude was nearing retirement from his appointment as organist at the Marienkirche, a medieval basilica in Lübeck, he was searching for a predecessor. At least three other composers and organists did consider offers, including George Friedrich Handel.

"The fact that Bach went and stayed for four months is a really intriguing thought to me that says he was at least considering it," said Allen. "I don't believe he could have lived under the same roof which he did. He was housed by Buxtehude - and not given very serious thought to this job and the possibility of marrying Anna Margareta. And so that adds a kind of a mystery, a love aspect to the story. But most accounts that look at this don't take Anna Margareta's perspective into account at all, perhaps not surprisingly, given that most of music history at the time was written by men."

Anna Margareta was 30 at the time, and Allen presumes that few of the young musicians auditioning for her father would have been very impressive in comparison.

Ultimately, Bach walked away.

Because there is little historical record of Bach's time in Lübeck, Allen narrates a historical fiction based on the events of the time.

"Both in music and in story, it's an exploration of









the little we know and the great amount that might have been," said Allen.

The show opened last year and has been performed across the country almost 50 times.







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The HUB provides space for connection, empowerment

If a hub is the centre from which other things radiate, Duntroon may seem like an unlikely place for a business hub. Not so, according to **Ashley Lougheed** founder and CEO of Girl Time Inc and The HUB. Lougheed grew up in the area, attending Duntroon Central Public School. She lived in London, Ontario and Ottawa before moving home in 2015.

"Suddenly, we were considered newcomers and I was craving connection, community and collaboration," she said. "I found myself connecting with other women who were new to the area, and old friends who were going back to work after having children or starting side hustles. I decided to create events and activities to connect them all."

Lougheed launched her business, Girl Time Inc in 2020, although she said she had been working on ideas to bring women together for some years prior to that.

"I see myself as an ambassador for women," she said. "In 2020, there was fear everywhere. I focused on bringing women together in a safe environment."

The HUB, at 2791 County Road 124 is a new bricks and mortar location for Girl Time Inc. Lougheed's 14-year-old daughter said HUB could be an acronym for Her Unified Beginning. The centre will offer business events

and activities as well as purely social events like a book club, a running club and weekly "coffee and connections" sessions.

"The HUB is not just me," said Lougheed. "It's other women and other businesses. If there is something that women want and I don't have the expertise to facilitate it, I will find someone who does."

The space includes a cozy meeting space, a boardroom and display space showcasing work by local painters and crafters.

"I looked for four years in

Collingwood and Stayner and all around the area for this kind of connection and it didn't exist. Duntroon really is a hub, connecting Collingwood, Stayner and Singhampton. It's an ideal location with ample parking and we're connected to outdoor everything," said Lougheed. "Our goal is to inspire and empower women through fitness and well being, social and business events."

The space will be available for rental by community groups. The calendar of upcoming events includes a book launch, an art show and events to celebrate International Women's Day. Beginning in the New Year, the HUB will host a Girl Code Program for nine- to 12-year-olds focused on developing inner confidence and fostering relationships.

"We'll be showing them how they can be ambassadors for each other," said Lougheed.

Memberships are available, or events can be booked a la carte.

"We had women purchasing memberships before we actually opened our doors on Nov. 1. There are currently 63 members of our 'Women of the Round Table,' a group of women in business and leadership that meets regularly to discuss business and personal issues. Recently, a group of 21 women gathered for a social event to discuss issues around menopause. Annual memberships are currently offered at \$33.30 per month. "I am not fixated on numbers to measure my success. One of the greatest compliments I've every received was from a woman who said you created a warm space where I can relax and be mvself."

Lougheed has a three-year lease on the Duntroon space and is hopeful that before it's time to renew, The HUB will be looking for larger premises. Her vision is that eventually, it will expand to include work spaces for female professionals.
