

Mayor reluctant to accept recommendation for Creemore bus

Clearview Transit buses will not be returning to Creemore in the short term despite a transit study presented to council this week calling for modifications to the Stayner route and the addition of three trips per weekday to Creemore.

Mayor Doug Measures noted that the Creemore route was abandoned in 2020 due to extremely low ridership, and said he has not seen any demand for reinstatement.

"Having said that, if there are Creemore residents who want to see transit service restored, they should reach out to (township) staff," he said. "For now, I think we should remove the Creemore route from this recommendation pending further discussion by council."

A report by Left Turn Right Turn transit consultants found that the transit system has been virtually unchanged since it was launched in 2017. Consultant Matthew Lattavo suggested it is probably time to adjust routes to reflect

Budget goes through painful public input process

During a meeting that lasted more than three hours and was plagued by audio problems, Clearview council reviewed the staff proposed 2026 budget Monday when the public was given the opportunity to provide input.

There were 31 questions submitted to the online portal relating to the budget, of which 30 came from self-appointed watchdog Dave Witzke. They ranged from a query about mileage on a used grader to be purchased by the public works department, to a challenge about a new parks and recreation building to be funded through development charges (DCs).

Witzke asked where the money will come from with housing starts basically

on hold. The mayor responded that the project is on hold until such time as the DCs are collected.

One question from the floor of council chambers focused on the township's reliance on outside consultants.

Treasurer Kelly McDonald informed the meeting that last year's cost for consulting was roughly \$3.5 million.

Mayor Doug Measures acknowledged that it is a big expense, but says the township has an obligation to bring in consultants where staff does not have the required expertise, as is often the case with engineering questions.

The proposed budget is \$39.1 million, reflecting a 1.99 per cent increase in municipal spending over last year.

Following some minor tweaks to the budget, Clearview Township residents can expect a property tax increase of 2.06 per cent next year.

Of each dollar collected, 56 cents remains in Clearview. The balance goes to fund county services such as long term care homes and solid waste collection; school boards, OPP policing and the Nottawasaga Valley Conservation Authority. The County of Simcoe recently approved its 2026 budget with a 3.5 per cent increase on its portion of municipal property taxes. In a news release, the county touts the budget as maintaining existing service levels while focusing on delivering value in today's challenging financial climate.

Among the changes approved

by council this week are \$2,500 to improve the sound system in the council chambers, \$5,000 to replace 23-year old-furniture in the lobby at the administration centre and \$4,000 to connect the trailer washroom at Village Green park to municipal sewer and water services.

The mayor will present the proposed budget to council on Jan. 8. Council will then have 30 days to pass any amendments. Final adoption of the budget is scheduled for Feb. 7.





Stayner man sends essential supplies home to Jamaica

After Hurricane Melissa hit Jamaica, **Desmond Herron** began ramping up his efforts to send supplies back home

Herron, a Stayner based landscaper, regularly sends supplies back home to his wife and family but after the Category 5 hurricane devastated Jamaica and cut off supplies to islanders, Herron's clients began asking what they could do to help.

He was encouraged to set up a Go Fund Me page where people could contribute funds to help Herron purchase specific items, which he ships home in crates and barrels for distribution in his home community.

"I am trying to do more but I can't do it by myself," said Herron. "I need help."

His wife and family are in Seaforth, in St. Thomas Parish, where mercifully, their house is in tact. The supplies are

being distributed there and in small communities in Portland Parish, both parishes being in Jamaica's east end. Herron said residents in the area have been reaching out to his wife for help because they are not able to get the basic supplies they need.

One crate has already been shipped and Herron said he will continue to send goods as resources allow.

To stretch every dollar, Herron shops for non-perishable food items at the dollar store, or by getting discounted products at grocery stores. His shopping list includes things like rice, flower, sugar, tinned meats like tuna, corned beef, and sardines.

Herron is close to his fundraising goal of \$5,000 but will keep the campaign going as long as needed.

Transit consultants recommend route changes to address growth

(Continued from page 1) changes in population density.

"There has been significant growth in the east and southern portions of Stayner," he said. "The four most popular destinations on the Stayner route are Stayner Collegiate, the arena, the Superior Street residential area and the former Foodland location."

He noted a significant increase in use

of the stop servicing the new Foodland location at Highway 26 and Grand Trunk Road. Since 2023, the system has been providing 13,000-16,000 trips per year, which works out to an average of 2.5-3 trips per service hour. Lattavo says that is well in line with expectations for this type of local service with regional connectivity.

In addition to the scheduled Stayner

route, Clearview Transit offers specialized door-to-door service for riders in Stayner and Nottawa with disabilities. Lattovo says 40 per cent of those trips go to Wasaga Beach and 59 per cent go to Collingwood showing that specialized transit plays a critical role in connecting Clearview residents to services in neighbouring municipalities.

The recommendation adopted by

council will be cost-neutral, according to Lattavo, and will involve some route changes to eliminate tricky left hand turns. Buses will depart from the administration centre on Gideon Street and travel a clockwise loop through Stayner with connections to Simcoe County's LINX system and Wasaga Beach. Changes will take effect in Spring of 2026.

We can eliminate cervical cancer with the bulletproof HPV vaccine

A new report from the Canadian Cancer Statistics Advisory Committee shows that cancer mortality rates are going down and this is great news. However, cervical cancer rates have stopped declining in Canada. More than 99 per cent of all cervical cancers are caused by the human papillomavirus (HPV). A safe and effective HPV vaccine has been available through Ontario's School Immunization Program since 2007. This vaccine not only prevents cervical cancer but protects against several other cancers caused by HPV infection, such as oral, throat, anal and penile, types of cancer that many of us have seen affect people we know.

Unfortunately, in Simcoe Muskoka only about 63 per cent of Grade 7 students receive this important cancer prevention vaccine, leaving more than 2,000 Grade 7 youth each year unprotected against several types of cancer that could impact them in the future.

Locally, the rate of cervical cancer for females aged 20 to 44 years is about 50 per cent higher in Simcoe Muskoka than in Ontario. It is estimated that over 75 per cent of Canadians will have an HPV infection at some point in their lifetime, as it is easily transmitted through skin-to-skin contact during sex. Condoms provide only partial protection against HPV infection. By contrast, HPV immunization offers lifelong, bulletproof protection against HPV—a fact supported by a 2024 study in Scotland that found zero cases of cervical cancer among young women fully vaccinated against HPV.

If you are still in high school and missed the HPV vaccine in Grade 7, it is not too late. In Ontario, students can receive the HPV vaccine for free until the end of Grade 12, and men who have sex with men are eligible until age 26. Talk with your health care provider about the vaccine or book an appointment at a health unit immunization clinic.

The Public Health Agency of Canada shares that the risk of cancer from HPV goes beyond cervical cancer as there are more than 100 types of HPV and it is one of the most common sexually transmitted infections (STI). Both men and women can get HPV which is responsible for 80-90 per cent of anal cancers, 40 per cent of vaginal and vulvar cancers, 40 to 50 per cent of penile cancers, and 25 to 35 per cent of mouth and throat cancers in Canada.

The HPV vaccine is 99 per cent effective at preventing HPV infections, as well as the cancers and warts they can cause. In my clinical practice, I have seen young people devastated when they seek medical care for their genital warts. None of these patients had received the HPV vaccine and all of them wish they had.

Vaccines work best when given before someone is exposed to a disease which is why the vaccine is offered to students in Ontario in Grade 7 through inschool immunization programs, along with vaccines for meningococcal disease and hepatitis B. Vaccines are also more effective when given to young teens

when their immune systems are most responsive to the vaccine.

While the vaccines for HPV and hepatitis B are not required to attend school, they are strongly recommended. The fact that HPV and hepatitis B are sexually transmitted viruses adds a stigma that can cause parents to hesitate to vaccinate against those diseases, and there is also confusion about who needs to get vaccinated for HPV due to its link to cervical cancer. However, because HPV can cause other types of cancers and warts that affect males and females, the vaccine has been available to both sexes since 2016.

Grade 7 might seem too early to worry about protecting them from STIs and it is natural to want to wait until they are "ready" or are an adult, but

vaccines are needed before a person is exposed to infection. Moreover, the vaccines do not cause or lead them to be sexually active sooner. The HPV and hepatitis B vaccines each need two doses, and the body needs time to build up strong immunity. This is why we offer these vaccines to students when they are in Grade 7 — so they can grow up to be healthy and protected from these preventable diseases.

Until the latest Canadian Cancer Statistic report showed the plateau in cervical cancer rates, Canada had been on target to eliminate HPV by 2040. Australia is on track to reach HPV elimination status by 2035, so it is possible to eliminate it here as well. By preventing the spread of HPV with vaccination, we can protect people's health and ultimately, eliminate cervical and HPV-related cancers, and

genital warts. Getting students vaccinated against HPV is not just about reducing the spread of an STI, it is about protecting people from an entirely preventable cancer.



Township to connect washroom trailer to services to solve capacity issues

The Township of Clearview will allocate money in the 2026 parks and recreation budget to address problems with three washroom trailer units purchased last year. The portable trailer-style washrooms were positioned this year at Creemore Village Green, the Nottawa Baseball Park and Station Park in Stayner.

It quickly became apparent that the trailer in Creemore could not handle the crowds at major events. In a typical weekend, the holding tank would be full by Sunday evening or Monday morning. During major weekend events, once tanks were full, toilets were overflowing and washrooms had to be closed in keeping with Ministry of Health regulations.

Scheduled maintenance included weekly pumping by a local contractor and daily cleaning by parks staff for a total annual budget of \$15,000. In fact, tanks needed to be pumped twice per week, and vandalism necessitated extra cleaning.

Washrooms inside Station on the Green building are unavailable for major events, due to the need to keep them for the use of people renting the facility.

Mayor **Doug Measures** suggested that the capacity issue could be resolved by connecting the trailer to municipal water and sewer services.

"It would be great if we could build permanent washroom facilities but that is going to take time and money," he said. "In the meantime, we can install plumbing to connect the trailer to water and sewer, much in the same way you would connect an RV at a campground."

Measures asked council to allocate \$4,000 to install the connections, and said this is a significant opportunity for the public works and parks departments to work together.

Council agreed to start with the Village Green washroom trailer and then decide whether to proceed with more permanent installation of the two remaining trailers.

Police warn of speed camera text scam

Dufferin OPP is warning residents about a text message scam circulating in the area that falsely claims recipients have incurred a speed camera fine.

In a incident reported to the Dufferin OPP, a victim received a text message stating that a speed camera fine had been issued, along with a link appearing to direct the individual to a secure Service Ontario payment page. Believing the message to be legitimate, the victim paid what appeared to be a \$12 fine.

By submitting the payment, the victim unknowingly provided scammers with access to their credit card information. Fraudsters then attempted to withdraw \$750 from the card. Fortunately, the suspicious transaction was detected by the credit card company, the card was cancelled, and no further losses occurred.

The victim later received a second, similar text message.

Police want the public to know:

• The Ministry of Transportation of Ontario (MTO) does not send notifications of fines by text message.

- The MTO does not collect or use personal phone numbers for enforcement or fine notifications.
- Legitimate provincial offence notices, including speed camera fines, are delivered by mail only.
- Do not click on links in unsolicited text messages-even if they appear to be from official agencies or government services.
- If you receive a suspicious message, delete it immediately and do not provide any personal or financial information.

Anyone who believes they may have been a victim of fraud is encouraged to contact police and report the incident to the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre at 1-888-495-8501 or antifraudcentrecentreantifraude.ca.






