

LeHeup's appearance is reflective of the mandate provided to the new EDC by Council, which identifies four priority areas for development efforts: agriculture, commercial development, tourism and recreation. Prospective committee members were also given three guiding principals





during their interviews: that the physical attributes of ClearviewTownship and its strong communities are its greatest assets and should form the foundation of any efforts to brand and market the Township as a place to live and do business; that the committee should be prepared to "work with what it has" instead of wait for the establishment of new infrastructure to lure businesses; and that the EDC and Township should be willing to take bold steps that show Clearview is a progressive, creative, forward-thinking place to do business.

The committee has so far met twice and has yet to decide on a chairperson. Its membership includes Preston and Councillor **Shawn Davidson** as representatives from Council, **Bill Wall, Paul Van Staveren, Vicki Bell, Mike Schreiner, Heidi Sterrenburg, Larry Culham** from the Stayner Chamber of Commerce and **Corey Finkelstein** from the Creemore BIA.



### A response to a response re: budget

Dear Editor,

In his Letter to the Editor, April 20, Dave Huskinson states: "First, Mr. Charlton should have declared his conflict in writing this article. He is a member of the Library Board, which is seeking a new library for Stayner. The \$675,000 he mentions in his letter is the initial amount requested by the library to start their plans, and the final amount for the library building he and the library committee is seeking is over \$3 million."

Mr. Huskinson is correct when he states that I am a member of the Library Board. In fact I am currently the Vice-Chair in this, my first term with the board. However, in writing my Letter to the Editor (April 13 issue), I believe I did so without bias in favour of any Township department.

Unfortunately, Mr. Huskinson appears to have misunderstood some of the content of my letter wherein I wrote "...if we want a zero percent increase we need to cut some \$675,000 from other cost centres in the Township." What I was referring to was that after adding the increases for policing and waste management over which we have no control, \$675,000 in reductions from other sources would be required to eliminate the 4.5 per cent increase proposed.

I further contemplated, "Perhaps we could close the library? That would save just about all of the \$675,000 we are looking for." This because closing the library would eliminate the \$522,807 it will take to operate the library in 2012.

As Mr. Huskinson states, "...a new library in Stayner is badly needed," and for the last four years the Library Board has been working to that end. Some \$27,000 has been expended to date and about \$43,000 has been included in this year's budget to further the process.

The Library Board has not asked for \$675,000 to start our plans.

Mr. Huskinson also states, "Yet as Mr. Charlton outlines, Council has yet to seek the public's input on the future of their Community Halls." Nothing in my letter alludes to Council seeking public input on this matter.



### Showing art and finding inspiration in China

This story began about two years ago when one of my prints was juried into a group show titled "Canadian Cameras At



Work" that was destined to hang at the prestigious Three Shadows Gallery in Beijing, China. The purpose of the exhibit was to show Canadian culture to people in China.

Organized by Agence Contraste d'Art from Montreal and sponsored by The Canadian Embassy in China, the show was so successful it toured ten cities in China from September 2010 to September 2011. When I heard that one of the finest photographic art curators in Beijing selected my "Father and Son" print to be part of the touring exhibit I was very honoured.

After the Three Shadows Gallery show and the tour, the exhibit showed for a final time at Alliance Francaise, a French school in Beijing. I was fortunate enough to be part of a group of four Canadian artists who travelled to Beijing to attend this final gallery opening of our photography and mixed media exhibit on September 5, 2011.

During our visit to Beijing we enjoyed the "red carpet treatment," with TV interviews, show tickets, dinners etc. It seems that the Chinese people love

foreign artists. The city is a design wonder, blending the ancient and ultra modern. Where else in the world can you take a 21st century subway to visit 16th Century palaces and temples from the Ming Dynasty?

The group of four artists who travelled to Beijing also enjoyed visiting The Great Wall, 798 Art District, Yongehegong Lama Temple, Tiananmen Square, Canadian Embassy in China and The Forbidden City. While in Beijing we met with a number of gallery curators to present our latest portfolios and to

learn about how we may negotiate representation in one of their Beijing galleries.

The 798 Art District is a section of Beijing that has been converted from an old munitions factory into hundreds of exotic high end galleries, shops and restaurants all with crazy names and plenty of outdoor sculptures.

The folks at HONYO International Design invited us to an evening of wonderful food and traditional Chinese music. HONYO designs architectural features for international hotels like Four Seasons. Doing TV interviews on the red carpet and being surrounded by paparazzi, we once again felt like celebrities.

The Chinese are incredibly receptive to foreign artists. At the Bejing Art Fair, sponsored by Mercedes-Benz, we saw a large number of galleries and curators with whom we made significant contact. One area of interest for me is Tibetan culture. I was very fortunate to meet and talk with a Tibetan Monk at the show who creates sand art. He asked to have his picture taken with me. The entire trip was filled with serendipitous blessings. During our time in Beijing we had the opportunity to visit a Chinese artist's studio where we had tea and viewed his unique smoke drawings.

I took along and gave out 50 Canadian Flag lapel pins to various Chinese people we encountered on the trip. The young and old alike loved the pins.

After our hiking trip to the Great Wall near Zhangdaokou, we had lunch at a village café. There, I gave a young Chinese boy and his Mom a Canadian Flag pin. They were thrilled with the gift

from Canada

We rode the high speed electric train (built and installed by Bombardier of Quebec) from Beijing to Shanghai, a five hour trip south. In Shanghai we had a two-day visit to enjoy the food and scenic nightlife and to meet with the Director of the China International Cultural Association, the group responsible for coordinating Expo 2010 in Shanghai. Our group also met with a Korean photographer, living and working in Shanghai. We showed him our portfolios and he showed us his amazing work in commercial, fashion and fine art photography. Commercial photography is very advanced in China, since advertising

The entire trip was planned, organized and directed by **Travis Joern** of The Canada China Business Council (Montreal) and Agence Contraste d'Art. The main reason that Travis organized the exhibition was that there wasn't much recognition of Canadian artwork in China. "International artists are sought after," says Travis, "but my mission is to ensure that there is more awareness of Canadian artists."

On the last night in Beijing we met and had dinner with two Canadian gentlemen from the Beijing office of The Canada China Business Council. They were preparing for a visit to China by Prime Minister Stephen Harper. North America has much to learn from China!

This incredible cultural exchange tour was highly successful in allowing me to meet and learn from Chinese artists, curators and photographers and as well in opening my mind to the potential of having my more of my fine art photography represented by a high end gallery in China. It was also a fun way to experience China's unique blend of ancient history and culture with ultramodern arts and architecture. The four artists from different parts of Canada were certainly inspired to move forward.

Several images from Bryan's trip will be part of the May show at the Mad & Noisy Gallery.





proposed is 3.91 per cent (Clearview, County and School Board combined) representing a 5.66 per cent increase in Clearview's tax-funded spending.

This latest reduction in the 2012 property tax increase is pimarily as a result of the Township Management Team recommending deferral of a \$25,000 Organization Study until next year, giving time for both Staff and Council to better prepare for this review.

While it has been a long and some would say arduous process, progress has been made in producing a budget more in line with our residents' needs and ability to pay, as well as the economic climate.

As in every budget, there is more work that needs to be done and improvements to be made in both process and outcomes. On balance, however, this year's series of eight budget workshops and a Township townhall, and the public participation they have generated, has raised the awareness on several longstanding concerns. Residents have made it clear at public meetings, in the media and to Council members one-on-one that they have real concerns about the ability to maintain a household in Clearview Township given rising municipal costs.

Residents have been vocal in unprecedented numbers about their concerns. Property taxes have to be affordable, while at the same time continuing to support an expected level of services. At the same time, not all services are viewed as equally necessary by all residents.

Many have said they have reached

their limit, not wanting to pay more taxes for more new services, especially those they do not use. Residents want to know how the size and cost of the Township's employee base will be contained and how large capital projects can be better planned to mitigate the impact of growth on their municipal fees and taxes.

The work on many of these issues needs to continue and a proposal will be coming to Council in May to form a working group to build on the discussions started during this year's budget process.

To the credit of our Township staff, the level of departmental discussion available to both Council and the public continues to improve each year. In particular the Finance Department, through the leadership of Treasurer **Edward Henley** and the personal efforts of his staff to prepare and present informative budget packages, made working through the budget details productive.

Residents played an imprtant role in both persistently pointing out where the consultation process can be improved and by offering their opinions, in near real time, on the decisions being made by Council and staff.

So, consider attending the Council meeting on Monday evening to hear the discussion to approve the proposed 2012 Budget, remembering that it is a regular meeting format and the opportunity for public comment is limited to the Public Participation Period. The public portion of the meeting begins immediately after a 5:30 pm In Camera session that is expected to last about 30 minutes.

### **Project Description:**

Pursuant to the Act and Regulation, the facility, in respect of which the project is to be engaged in, is considered a Class 4 wind facility. If approved, the facility would have a total maximum nameplate capacity of 100 MW. This project is being proposed in accordance with the requirements of the Act and Regulation. The project will consist of 49 General Electric wind turbines. The project would also include a 34.5 kilovolt (kV) underground electrical power line collector system, fibre optic data lines from each turbine and/or wireless technology for the communication of data, an operations and maintenance building, a substation, a transformer station, two meteorological towers, as well as access roads to turbine components and infrastructure with culvert locations, as required, at associated watercourse crossings.

The project is currently seeking permitting on two transmission line alternatives. Only one option would be constructed. The first is a 69kV power line crossing the Townships of Melancthon, Mulmur and Amaranth to connect to the provincial grid in the Town of Mono. The second power line option is a 230kV power line that would head west from the wind farm through a private easement in the Township of Melancthon, head south down an abandoned rail corridor, crossing the Town of Shelburne and connect to the Orangeville Transformer Station located in the Township of Amaranth.

A **Draft Project Description Report** has been prepared, and provides details on the project, including information on wind energy and associated project components and activities.

A **Draft Site Plan**, including the proposal turbine layout, has been issued for the project.
