AT LONG LAST, **BUDGET PASSES** WITH 3.91% TAX INCREASE

Clearview Council passed its 2012 budget Monday night, agreeing unanimously to a 3.91 per cent net tax increase and a 5.44 per cent increase in tax-supported Township spending.

The decision came after six months of discussion, taking place over eight working sessions and one town hall public meeting. Nearly every member of Council who commented before the vote said it had been a long, arduous process, but ultimately a rewarding one.

"Every year we get better at this," said Councillor Thom Paterson, summarizing his reasons for supporting the budget while stressing his opinion that there's still work to be done.

With increases to the police budget and Simcoe County waste management fees accounting for more than two percentage points and remaining outside of Council's control, the sentiment among most Councillors was that there was little more that could be done to bring the increase further down.

"There's always going to be a segment of our population that believes we can do it for less, but I believe this municipality is already running very bare bones," said Councillor Shawn Davidson. "We did this without making any major service cuts, and I'm proud of that."



Average homeowner will pay \$106 more on 2012 tax bill

Councillor **Robert Walker** echoed that thought, saying that Council could have gone further and started cutting services, but that "you have to be careful what you wish for."

Mayor **Ken Ferguson**, meanwhile, reiterated his opinion that this is a "maintenance budget – survival without cutting services."

There was one final debate on Monday night, regarding the now infamous organizational study, which was unanimously inserted into the budget early on in the process, only to be removed, then put back in, and finally removed at the last minute.

With three members of the Township's senior staff – Clerk **Robert Campbell**, Director of Public Works **Richard Spraggs** and Chief Administrative Officer **Sue McKenzie** – all set to retire within the next two years, most Councillors had supported the organizational study at various times throughout the budget discussions as a way of discovering the most efficient way of moving forward, not just with senior staff but with the Township's workforce as a whole.

The study, with a predicted cost of \$25,000, had been left in the budget after the final Council workshop, but in the days since a memo from McKenzie had circulated stating that enough preliminary work needed to be done by staff that, should Council desire, the organizational study could be put off until early 2013.

Councillor **Brent Preston**, however, was eager for Council to include the cost in this year's budget to provide flexibility in case staff was ready to put the study to tender in the fall. He also expressed concern that, if the decision were to be left until next year, it may fall victim to the same pressures that it did this year. "Now is the time," he said, "for us to vote on this once and for all."

The inclusion of the study in the 2012 budget would have brought this year's net increase up to 4.04 per cent, with Clearview's tax-funded spending going up by 5.66 per cent. The spectre of a four-per-cent-plus tax increase seemed to dissuade most on Council however, and Preston's amendment to reinsert the study failed to pass, with only Preston and Councillors **Doug Measures** and **Deb Bronnee** voting in favour of it.


There still seemed to be a will at the table to make

a final commitment to the study, however, so after the budget vote passed unanimously at 3.91 per cent, Councillor Paterson made a motion that Council instruct staff to do all the necessary preliminary work this year so that the organizational study can be done early in 2013. That motion passed unanimously.

Clearview's 2012 operating budget now sits at \$18.7 million, compared to \$18.2 million in 2011. The capital budget is \$45 million, compared to \$35.6 million in 2011, though much of that money will only be spent if the Township secures grants.


The 3.91 per cent net tax increase means that the average family home in Clearview will see an increase of \$106 on their 2012 tax bill.

As for the work yet to be completed alluded to by Councillor Paterson, he told Council he still intends to bring forth a motion sometime in May regarding the creation of a budget/finance committee (or "working group," as he called it on Monday night). That subject did not receive much debate during the meeting, although Deputy Mayor **Alicia Savage** did note her support for such a mechanism.





Insult to Injury



I mentioned the "Conklin" family name a couple of weeks ago (specifically Ron and Bill Conklin), and it seems the family was much better known, with farflung relations in this area, than I realized. Several people mentioned remembering



the family at school and around Creemore, and then **Shirley Hemsley** mentioned having worked with Mary (Bill's mother) some years ago. Then I got a call from **Nonie**, wife of the late **George Price**, who spent a lot of her married life in Creemore, to tell me that she

gets the Creemore Echo from a friend up at the Beach, and enjoys reading about the folks she used to know. When she saw the item in the paper about the Conklins, she phoned to say she was also related as her mother was Gertrude Conklin who married Ross White – so it seems that she would also be related to the "White's Sideroad" Whites. Nonie's grandparents on her mother's side were, I believe, John and Ginette Conklin. I find it fascinating when a name from the past triggers memories and stories from a far-flung area – and era – and the Conklin family is one family that reached much further than I thought.















The South Simcoe Arts Council is delighted to present a collection of contemporary sculpture by renowned sculptor Ralph Hicks, who lives near Creemore.

She scales snowdrifts with ease

The arrival of a new automobile in Creemore doesn't get the attention it once did. But we have to remember that a vehicle with a gas motor was once as much a miracle (or even more so) as the latest electronic devices are today. Here's an account of the attention given

to a new Ford model which arrived in Creemore just before Christmas, 1927.

"At last, after weeks of anticipation, we got a glimpse of her. We mean Henry Ford's latest achievement, a Tudor design. We called it 'she' and 'her' right away, because it is so neat and trim and possessing such straight lines that it must be female. The old Model 'T' was always referred to as 'it.' This new one which was shown for the first time in Creemore on Wednesday, was generally referred to by the large crowd as 'she,' just like a captain refers to his ship.

"She' arrived in Creemore in the wee small hours of Wednesday morning from Collingwood, under her own power. Snow drifts that might have stopped



an ordinary car were scaled with ease (This isn't our own statement). But anyway she was here and honestly, it has better appearance than we were expecting. From early morning until near midnight, this new model was inspected by hundreds of interested motorists. The

motor was not started. This was a slight disappointment to us, because everybody likes to see a car in motion, and many were a little sceptical as to its wonderful power and speed. It would doubtless be impossible to let everybody have a trial ride in the one day at the disposal of the demonstrator. With this in view, head office had decreed that the car was to make its debut in Ontario agency showrooms quietly and with ignition disconnected."

After this preview, car enthusiasts waited patiently until March, when the model officially arrived at the local dealership. Here's the account of that exciting day.

"For weeks the Star [the Creemore

Star, that is] has stated she was due to arrive any day. That day came on Thursday and our reputation for veracity was saved.

"Our local Ford dealer, Mr. J.P. Lawrence, drove the new Ford from Toronto as far as Alliston, and the car was loaded onto a CNR flat car, which conveyed the new Lady to her future haunts. On arrival here Henry's new model was quickly unloaded and, finding her stride, passed down the street like the fire reel going to a blaze hitched to Art May's truck. The crowd running behind was similarly as curious. Everybody seemed afraid the other fellow would beat him to it. At last we got our chance,

and in spite of various tips, satisfied ourselves that it was a real replica of the one shown here for one day last December.

"On several points we satisfied ourselves. We now know that she will go, and real fast if you want to. The lines are beautiful and generally those of a higher priced car. She rides much more smoothly than old Lizzie ever did. Her honk is loud but mellow. She has fourwheel brakes and the usual equipment found on a Lincoln.

"In a sentence she is a smart bus, and we are forced to predict for her a keen demand when her capabilities are generally known."

This weekend teams will hit the field in the North Dufferin Baseball League as the season officially gets underway.



As time passes, it becomes evident how much gainful knowledge is available from those we mistakenly take for granted before learning of their accomplishments. Such a person is **Jim Richards**, who in his humble manner revealed to me information


concerning his activities that I was unaware of.

A resident of Creemore since 1970, Jim has the unique distinction of being born on Christmas Day – in his case in 1941 in Toronto. Following public school at Rose Avenue in the same city, he enrolled at Central Tech. 
years.

There is no question that Jim has had an active and successful life. To wit, note the following activities:

He has been a member of the Creemore Legion for 34 years, and has served on the Executive Board of Directors and as the Sergeant at Arms. He is currently Vice President.

He served as president of the Firefighters' Association of Ontario on two occasions, in 2001 and 2004. He marched on the field with that

organization during the first Blue Jays game after the tragedy of September

He was Vice President of the Ontario Fire Fighters' Memorial Foundation and helped oversee the construction of the Memorial at Queen's Park, which was dedicated in 2005.

He worked with the MTO Board of Intermittent Fire Fighters.

Rounding out this melange of commitments, Jim also drives for the Red Cross, sometimes putting in 40 hours a week.

In his personal time, Jim enjoys

camping and working on old cars. He still owns a 1939 Studebaker, which he used to enjoy driving in the Creemore Valley Street and Custom Car Show (he was an avid member of that organization, serving for a time as president). Over the years, Jim has also owned a 1932 Chevrolet Roadster, a 1940 Chevrolet Sedan and a 1970 Pontiac.

Keep up the good work, Jim. Your contribution in the interest of your community is not only admirable but highly respected. Thank you for your untiring efforts, as we wish you and Dawn much happiness on your well-deserved retirement.

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Placing Old Age Security on a Sustainable Path


Canadians are living longer and costs for the Old Age Security (OAS) are rising. On April 1, 2023 the Government of Canada plans to start raising the age of eligibility for OAS and the Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS) from 65 to 67.*

What does this mean for you?

54 or older as of March 31, 2012	You may still obtain OAS/GIS at age 65			
53 or younger as of March 31, 2012	The age of eligibility for OAS/GIS will change gradually between 2023 and 2029			

Starting in July 2013, Canadians who are eligible for, but not yet receiving OAS will have the <u>flexibility to delay</u> receiving it in exchange for a higher monthly amount at a later date.


The number of working-age Canadians for every senior is decreasing**
