EMERGENCY HUB GRAND OPENING ON JUNE 16

The Clearview Emergency Hub and Fire Administration Centre, the first building in Simcoe County to combine local fire service, County

paramedics and a satellite office of the Ontario Provincial Police, will have its official grand opening on Saturday, June 16.

That was announced by Mayor **Ken Ferguson** at Monday's Council meeting after Council had a look at a video about the facility that's been produced by the County's public relations department. The video will be part of an application for the Peter J. Marshall Award for Innovative Projects, which is handed out annually by the Association of Municipalities of Ontario.

The Hub has been up and operating since late winter.



Budget Passed

After voting unanimously for a 3.91 per cent net tax increase at its last meeting, Council made things official Monday night by officially adopting the 2012 budget and

setting this year's tax rates.

Procedural Bylaw Passed

Council also gave the nod to its procedural bylaw, which has been in the works since this term began at the start of 2011. Township Clerk **Bob Campbell** thanked his assistant, **Brenda Falls**, for her work on the document.

Housing Presentation

Council was visited by Gail Michalenko of the Georgian Triangle Housing Centre, who presented that organization's recent housing study. Deputy Mayor Alicia Savage said the findings would be valuable as the Township works on its new Official Plan.

That may be a slight exaggeration, we suppose, but it does kind of feel that way during that first stroll into the market on a sunny opening day. And this year, the 15-year-old institution is aiming to be bigger and better than ever, under the guidance of new president **Sarah Hallett**.

Hallett is replacing **Jean Brownfield**, who has led the market

from the very beginning (along with co-founder **Sandra Lackie**, who left the board a few years ago to start the 100 Mile Store), and she's a little concerned about following in such large footsteps.



Anyone and everyone who's had anything to do with Duntroon Central Public School over the years is invited to what's sure to be a bittersweet community occasion.




THE WAY WE WERE


Creemore Big Heart Seniors

Brian Neale spends six months of the year entertaining folks during happy hour in the British Virgin Islands, and the other six months recreating that same Carribean vibe in venues around North America. He's the real deal, every bit as much of a beach troubadour as the man he emulates, Jimmy Buffett.

"Most of the songs I sing either have something to do with boats, with some kind of drinking, or with laying in the sun," says Neale. "You can't really go wrong with that."

On Saturday, June 2, for the second year in a row, Neale will bring his band, Northern Harbour, to the

Creemore Arena for a beach party bonanza. Entitled "Margaritas in the Valley," the event is being organized by the Creemore Nitetis Lodge #444, with proceeds going to Heart & Stroke Foundation of Ontario.

A longtime musician and fan of Jimmy Buffett, Neale didn't start performing covers of his hero's music until he won a contest to perform a song onstage with Buffett at a Molson Amphitheatre concert in the late 1990s. The moment was captured on video and can be seen on the Northern Harbour website (www. northernharbour.com). It's clear from the footage that the two men share a common attitude, and not long after the concert Neale was contacted by one of the 18,000 "parrotheads" in the audience, who suggested he should form a Buffett tribute band.

Fast forward 15 years and Northern Harbour has perfected the Hawaiian shirt and barefoot look, travelling all over Ontario and farther afield to give audiences a taste of the good life. They play a lot of Buffett songs, and throw in some **Van Morrison**, **Bruce Springsteen**, **Neil Diamond** and others as well.

"Come to our shows and you'll hear a bit of country, a bit of rock'n'roll, a bit of salsa... the main thing is that it's all fun," says Neale.

Northern Harbour's biggest gig is in Midland, where their annual "Party on the Dock" draws thousands and



has raised more than \$700,000 for various causes in that community over the past seven years.

It's that kind of model that the local Masons would like to imitate, and you can expect the Creemore Arena to be decked out in full Caribbean style, complete with palm trees, tiki huts and a margarita bar. Expect to dance and go home with a smile on your face.

Tickets for "Margaritas in the Valley" are \$20, available at Creemore Foodland.



the fresh made pasta dishes, grilled local fish and wood oven pizza. The hotel we stayed in outside of Sorrento was a lovely place, owned by the Francischielli family. Not only did we have a beautiful view of the Isle of Capri from our room, but four nights out of five we ate in their dining room where Nonna Francischielli held court every night, overseeing all the vegetables and salads (fresh from her garden). It was a very special trip and we enjoyed it immensely.

No rest for the wicked when we got back though! I already had a two-day Gourmet Getaway weekend booked for six, and managed to get through it even though we both picked up some strange bug on the plane(s) coming back home. Italy already seems a distant memory, but the brief respite has recharged my culinary batteries, that's for sure!

One of the most common dishes you will see in Italy is Pasta Bolognese – better known as your local spaghetti with meat sauce. However, a Bolognese sauce in Italy is not quite as heavy and thick as you might find here. There is meat in it but not a lot, and a few simple ingredients simmering on the stove for a number of hours produces a rich sauce that clings nicely to the pasta. I learned that to make it true Bolognese style, tagliatelle pasta should be used – long, flat egg noodles known as "little ribbons." You can buy them here and you will generally see them twirled into little nests in the package.

This week I'm going to pass on my current version of Bolognese sauce. I say "current" because this sauce is a work in progress and I am always fine-tuning it. However, the basics are all there and I hope you enjoy making it as much as I do!

1/3 pound sweet pancetta (or bacon)

2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil (EVOO)

1 large cooking onion, diced

2 cloves of garlic, minced

1/2 pound lean ground beef

1/2 pound ground pork 4 ounces red wine

1 teaspoon chopped fresh rosemary leaves (or 1/2 teaspoon dry)

1 teaspoon dried oregano

1- 28 ounce can whole Italian tomatoes (preferably San Marzano if you can find them) 15.5 ounce can tomato paste

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon fresh ground black pepper

Sweet pancetta is Italian bacon – you can get it at the deli counter. Ask for a small chunk, and dice it. Using a large saucepan or Dutch oven, heat pan to medium high, add EVOO and pancetta. Fry for a few minutes until pancetta is lightly browned. Add onion and garlic, sautéing until soft and very lightly browned. Add ground beef and pork to pan. Sauté until browned, then add the red wine and stir. Reduce pan liquids slightly, then add the rosemary, oregano, tomatoes, tomato paste, salt and pepper. Bring mixture to a boil, then move to the back of your stove and leave on simmer for at least one hour, preferably longer for flavours to develop.

When sauce is ready, cook your favourite pasta as package directs. Top cooked pasta with Bolognese sauce, some freshly grated parmesan cheese and dig right in!

First off is the sheer number of vendors. While last year saw about 25 booths on average, Hallett has signed up 32, the maximum capacity, and has had to turn down an extra seven.

Among the new full-time vendors are three new vegetable producers, one certified organic and the other two operating in an organic manner; a meat and cheese operation; a jam-maker; a tea company; and a savoury baker.

Showing up on a part-time basis for the first time this year will be a gardener, a pie-maker, a furniture-maker, an "upcycled" clothing booth and a maker of cold-pressed oils.

In an effort to make the vendors more visible, they will all be wearing green aprons branded with the Creemore Farmers' Market logo.

The marquee event this year will also work towards developing relationships between vendors and market-goers. Taking place on July 21, the event will be entitled "Sample the Market." You might want to skip breakfast that day, as each booth will be offering samples of their wares.

"The plan is to encourage people to talk to the stall-holders," said Hallett. "The more people know each other, the more people see the market as a community place."

In general, the event schedule will be lighter this year, with more emphasis on the vendors and their goods. Curiosity House will still be partnering with the market, hosting book signings there, and the area around the fountain will still be designated for community organizations (there are seven signed up for this Saturday, including the Creemore BIA, which will have a booth there all summer, acting as a tourist information stop for those wishing to explore the village).

As is tradition, market-goers will still have the opportunity to take home a free plant on opening day, but this year, that honour will go to the first three customers at each booth.

For more information about the market, or to find out what fresh goods are available from its vendors on a weekto-week basis, people can now go to the new Farmers' Market website, developed by Shane Durnford and found at www.

"All in all, it's going to be a busy year, and hopefully we'll see everyone out at the market," said Hallett, who of course will also be offering her trademark delectable baked goods at her Roseberry Farm booth. Drop in and say hi, she'd
