Lest We Forget: A Local Boy's Story

C tanley Royal was a Young man in 1914. He grew up on the Sixth Line, south of County Road 9 and west of Creemore. As he was out of work he enlisted with the 48th Highlanders under Col. J.A. Currie. On his return home after



the Armistice he spent many evenings with his neighbours, Frank and Alice Webster, recounting his experiences. They compiled his accounts of the war and made a typed copy.

Last year in November I wrote of his enlistment, trip across the Atlantic, and the enthusiastic welcome give to Stanley and his comrades in England. He was in England for a time, training on the Salisbury Plains near Stonehenge. We begin today with his description of his trip to France.

"When we embarked at Birkenhead going to France we went around by the Bay of Biscay to avoid submarines and landed at Saint-Nazaire. It was a frightfully rough trip in an old CPR cattle boat called the Mount Temple.

"We were all sick. As the boat rolled and took nose dives, we were pitched from side to side, unable to help ourselves. Someone said, 'Let her go down, she doesn't belong to me.' This raised the only laugh we had on the trip.


"The machine guns and mules were on the upper deck. The guns and lifeboats were swept overboard and some of the boats went ashore. When they were found, our boat was reported lost. We were four days making the journey.

"At Saint-Nazaire we were loaded onto some little boxcars and were packed in so tightly that some of us had to stand to let others lie down and try to sleep.

"We were on that train four days making the trip to Hazebrouck, where we detrained and remained overnight, being billeted in a piggery. Next morning we marched four miles to Castres. Here we were billeted in a barn for two days.

"From there we marched 17 miles in new Kitchener army boots over cobblestones to Armentières. That was one of the hardest marches we ever had.

Mad and Noisy Gallery announces search for buyer

After eight successful years of operation, the Creemore Artists' Centre has decided to seek a buyer for the Mad and Noisy Gallery.

"We're pleased with what the gallery has become," said founding member Peter Adams in a press release issued Wednesday afternoon. "But if the gallery is to continue growing, it needs the energy and vision of an art-loving entrepreneur."

Founded in 2004 by eight local artists, the co-operative now represents over 50 area painters, sculptors, photographers, and jewelers. According to Adams, the gallery is on track for its best sales year ever. "The co-op model works well when you're small, but we've grown beyond that, and a new business model is a logical step in the gallery's growth."

The ideal candidate, according to Adams, is "someone who will continue to build on our connection with the community." The gallery's past community initiatives have included CreemoreCentric, a popular local amateur art exhibition, art classes in local schools, children's summer art programs and adult art workshops.

Members approved a motion to seek offers from interested parties at the gallery's annual general meeting, held on Wednesday morning. The deadline for submission of expressions of interest was set for November 23. Further information can be obtained from the gallery website at www. madandnoisy.com.


Mulmur finds 2013 funds for **Creemore Medical Centre**

by Brad Holden Despite previously deciding to hold off on making a commitment to the Creemore Medical Centre until after its budget deliberations for next

year, Mulmur Council voted Tuesday to commit itself to donating \$5,000 to the Centre's expansion effort in 2013.

This decision came after Council received a letter from Don MacFarlane, chair of the Mono Mulmur Citizens' Coalition. MacFarlane reported that the board of (MC)² and some of its members had raised concerns over Council's lack of immediate support for the project, and that they considered such support an important priority.

"Many Mulmur residents, particularly in the north part of the



MacFarlane. "The proposal to upgrade the facility to improve services available, to improve access, and other changes will benefit the Mulmur residents (particularly seniors) who make up 30 per cent of the users of the facility."

MacFarlane noted that the Medical Centre needs to have made significant progress toward its \$350,000 fundraising target by February 1, 2013, or postpone the project indefinitely. He further recommended that Mulmur Council donate between \$2,500 and

Mulmur will contribute \$5,000 to Med Centre in 2013

\$5,000 to the cause immediately, and make a commitment to find another \$10,000 per year for the next two

Mayor Paul Mills opened the debate on the subject by restating his opinion that there was no money to be found in Mulmur's 2012 budget for an immediate donation. He also expressed misgivings about committing any money at all, given the fact that Mulmur's residents use several medical facilities outside of the Township in Orangeville, Alliston, Creemore, Collingwood and Markdale.

"How far do we go here?" asked Mills. "Health care funding is not up to municipalities, it's up to the Province. If the Creemore Medical Centre needs money, I really feel that this should be a user-pay scenario."

The rest of Council was feeling more charitable, however, with Councillor Lynn Hilchey speaking up first.

"We are always looking for input on how we spend ratepayers' money,"

she said. "And with this letter we've been clearly told that we should be supportive."

Conceding that Mulmur currently has no money budgeted for the cause, Hilchey proposed that Council go into next year's budget process with a commitment for the Medical Centre.

With that, a motion by Hilchey and seconded by Deputy Mayor Rhonda Campbell Moon commit to a \$5,000 donation in 2013 was passed. No commitment for 2014 was made at this point.

Greenhouse Decision

Mulmur Council met in camera for 90 minutes Tuesday morning to discuss the ongoing dispute regarding a large greenhouse on the property of Councillor Lynn Hilchey and her husband John, which was erected without a building permit and, in the opinion of Township planner Ron Mills, is in contravention of Mulmur's zoning bylaw.

On the agenda Tuesday was a request

from John Hilchey for Council to give the structure "municipal approval." With this, Hilchey could then theoretically approach the Dufferin County Building Department and retroactively apply for a building

A decision on the request was put off until after the in camera session, however, during which Council met with Dufferin County Chief Building Inspector Mike Giles. Following the session, Council reopened its doors to the public and passed a motion stating that the Hilcheys must remove the greenhouse by November 30, unless a complete application to amend the Township zoning bylaw has been made by that date. If an application is made but eventually turned down, the structure must then be removed.

In a recorded vote, Mayor Mills and Councillors Heather Hayes and Earl Hawkins voted in favour of the motion and Deputy Mayor Rhonda Campbell Moon abstained from voting. Councillor Hilchey was not present for either the in camera session or the vote, having declared a conflict of interest.

New Meeting Schedule

After several discussions about Mulmur's procedural bylaw over the past few meetings, Council agreed Tuesday to change its meeting schedule so that its daytime meetings take place on the first Wednesday of the month, rather than the first Tuesday. Evening meetings will remain on the the third Wednesday of the month. It's hoped the change will provide more consistency, as well as give Councillors more time to prepare for daytime meetings after long weekends. The schedule change will take effect starting in January 2013.




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EDITORIAL An Important Tradition



Remember that which our forefathers fought to protect

An open letter to Simcoe-Grey MP Kellie Leitch: (cc. the *Creemore Echo*)

Today I learned that my father has terminal cancer, which his British doctors believe is an outcome of his wartime job wearing an asbestos fire suit to pull the burning bodies of dead and dying airman from crashed planes, all the time breathing the smoke from those crashed planes during the Second World War.

Until last year my father would never tell me what he did during the war, and although I knew he had emphysema, I never suspected that it might have been due to five years of wartime exposure to asbestos and burning fuel fumes manning a crash tender.

For over 65 years my father has been paying with every breath for the freedom from the tyranny and oppression that would have been forthcoming if the free world had lost WWII. It was because of the efforts of my father and other veterans like him that we have been able to enjoy the freedoms that you and the "Harper government" now seem bent on destroying.

From your support of the failed attempt to continue exporting asbestos to less fortunate residents of our planet; to the ramming through last week of the Canada-China Foreign Investment Protection Agreement (FIPA) that will remove our sovereignty and potentially allow China to sue Canadian municipalities outside of the Canadian legal system; to the new EU agreements that soon will eliminate "natural health foods" (medicinals that cannot be patented), it appears that Mr. Harper, "blindly"

supported by others such as yourself, is bent on undoing what my father fought to protect over 65 years ago!

I fear that you are not even aware of the ramifications of FIPA. Each time you vote by the command of your "master" you are aiding and abetting the same autocratic form of government my father and millions of others fought against so many years ago.

For once, please stand alongside the likes of my father and be counted as protecting the future rights and freedoms of Canadians by voting against these sellouts of the sovereignty that he fought for and is now finally paying for with his life.

Casino debate Monday night

On Monday, November 12, Clearview Council will debate the possibility of hosting a casino facility in the portion of the Township designated by the OLG as included in the C7 gaming zone.

The meeting follows decisions made by two of the other municipalities in the C7 zone. Last week, Collingwood Council voted 5-4 against hosting a gaming facility, while Wasaga Beach voted 6-1 in favour of being a host municipality.

At the outset of the Clearview meeting, representatives from the local family physicians and churches will address Council with their concerns over a gaming facility in the area. While this will not be a formal public meeting, there will be some opportunity for the public to speak during the Public Participation Period. The Council meeting is scheduled to begin at 5:30 pm.

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





Local told of horrific conditions at Ypres

(Continued from page 1)

When we got within half-a-mile of Armentières, there was a railing along an embankment, and the men, staggering under heavy packs, dumped them over the rail to roll down the bank. Here we were billeted in a cow barn.

"We remained [in this area] until we were taken to the Ypres salient in April."

Royal goes on to describe the organization of the various Canadian brigades. The battle with the Germans at Ypres was one of the First World War's famous battles and was disastrous for the Canadians. He continues describing what happened at Ypres.

"The first day was uneventful. We further consolidated our parapets with sandbags. The trenches were only half manned. The ground was low and swampy. The trenches could not be dug more than a foot deep and at that point there was water in them. We had to creep from one parapet to the next, about 50 or 60 feet apart.

"On April 22 we saw the greenish yellow fog coming towards us. This was the gas attack. Along with it came a heavy bombardment of artillery from the German front. It was the gas that played havoc with us. We all felt the smothering, deadening effect of it. We soaked our handkerchiefs in the trench water and held them over our faces. It was of some help."

At first the Canadians were able to repulse the German attack but in a day


both the front and the flanks. There was no communication from headquarters. Brigadier General Turner was eight or ten miles away and wasn't aware of what was happening or able to give orders, leaving Royal's group open to fire. On the third day of battle Royal and a fellow soldier were out guiding back wounded parties. Before they got back the bombardment began. They had to dive into a shell hole. After a time the men made it back to

Royal tells of his feelings. "I was so depressed with gas that I did not want to be disturbed. I felt that death would be welcome. However, my pals didn't take that view of it and helped me back to a dressing station. There, after a spell of vomiting, I felt better and made my way back to where the straggling units of the 15th were gathering together by ones and twos in a hedged enclosure. We had starved for 50 hours. We were blackened with the effects of gas. We were sick, bedraggled, worn-out men who didn't care whether we lived or not.

"When Col. Currie arrived to join his men and saw the dilapidated handful that remained of his fine battalion, he broke down. He and Major Marshall were the only officers left.

"In our company only 13 remained. Every officer was a casualty. Only 90 of our battalion were left to answer roll call. There were over 900 casualties in the battalion."

SNOW REMOVAL

NOTICE OF SNOW REMOVAL

The Municipality or its' employees will not be responsible for any damage done to vehicles parked or abandoned on Township Road Allowances, sidewalks or parking lots, by the Township Snow Removal or sand forces.

Any vehicle left on road allowances, sidewalks or parking lots under the jurisdiction of the Township of Clearview may be referred to the Ontario Provincial Police and removed at the owner's expense.

As per the Highway Traffic Act, Section 170 Subsection (12) no person shall park or stand a vehicle on a highway in such a manner as to interfere with the movement of traffic or the clearing of snow from the highway.

No vehicle shall be parked or left standing on any street, road allowance, sidewalk or municipal parking lot within the Township of Clearview between the hours of 12:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. during the winter season from November 1st, 2012 until March 31st, 2013. Any vehicles parked or left standing during the aforementioned period may be charged to and collected from the owner of the offending vehicle and the matter may be referred to the Ontario Provincial Police.

Moreover, anyone guilty of depositing snow on roads, sidewalks or parking lots under the jurisdiction of the Township of Clearview while cleaning lanes, etc. causing an obstruction to traffic or causing damage to snow removal equipment is liable for any damages that may result from same and may be charged under the Highway Traffic Act.
