Local Tea Company is Steeped in Tradition

Sometimes you can rack your brain trying to come up with a name for your business. And really, names are easy, compared to the careful branding exercise that must follow.

And then there are times when it all falls into place, like it was meant to be. The Clearview Tea Company, which will celebrate its first anniversary in April, is an example of the latter.

A tea drinker all her life, **Rebecca Brown** was laid up with a hip injury three years ago when she got to thinking – over a cup of tea, of course – what she might like to do with the rest of her life. Her daughter **Maggie** was about to finish high school, she and her husband **Glenn** were contemplating a move back to the country after a few years in Toronto, and it seemed like the right time to try something different.

Inspired by her longtime passion, she enrolled in the Tea Sommelier program at Georgian College, and soon after that she made a day trip to Creemore with Glenn and Maggie and they all fell in love. They bought an old house on Mill Street, and by the time they moved in Rebecca had decided to start her own

\$5 Million for Infrastructure from Feds

Monday's meeting of Clearview Council saw Mayor **Ken Ferguson** dance with joy.

His moves were inspired by a visit from MP **Dr. Kellie Leitch** with an announcement of the Federal Government's \$5 million commitment to the Stayner wastewater project. The province will also step up and match these funds for a total investment of \$10 million into the community from other levels of government.

"This guarantees our future," said Ferguson after a heartfelt "yippee" and a standing ovation from Council.

Council chose to go ahead with the first phase of this project last November before money from sources other than Development Charges were confirmed knowing the future development of Clearview, and Stayner in particular, depends on greater sewage capacity. The announcement will mean the project will be funded without debt or cost to existing taxpayers.

Other good news at Monday's meeting was the approval for the Creemore Medical Centre to proceed to the building phase of their expansion project, a water rebate for home dialysis patients and the formation of a municipal heritage program.

Recognizing similarities between her new home and the age-old ritual of drinking tea - "In a busy world, it's an intentional thing to do... to boil the kettle, to have a cup of tea and to just pause. And coming to Creemore feels like that too – it's got a bit of yesteryear to it, a bit of the old world," she says – she originally contemplated calling her venture the Creemore Tea Company. But since there was already a Creemore Coffee Company, she cast her sights to the wider municipality.

"I think it's perfect," she said of the name that she chose. "When you sit down and have a cup of tea, you have time to think about your life – and if you're lucky, or if the tea is really good, you might see things clearly for a few moments."

So Clearview Tea Company it is, and the logo on the Victorian-looking labels she chose – another throwback to an older time – also fell into her lap. "When we bought this house, they gave us an antique key," she said. Hence the logo – two keys crossed, a vintage image that also hints at the insights that your few moments of contemplation might unlock.

Rebecca incorporated the company in April 2012, after several conversations with Sarah Hallett of the Creemore Farmers' Market. Hallett helped her through much of the branding, and encouraged her to set up shop on Saturday mornings at Station on the Green.

That's where most people have got to know the product, at a booth manned by Rebecca and Maggie (who decided to take a year off between high school and university, and has thrown herself right into the company's operations). Displayed in little "smell jars," the large and eclectic display of teas has enchanted many a market-goer.

There's the basic Creemore Market Blend, a Sri Lankan variation on Earl Grey that's won many fans. There's the Mad River Black Current, a black tea from Ceylon mixed with black current leaves that's great with milk. There are three different green teas, one from Japan, one from China and one with Siberian ginseng mixed in for good measure. There are white teas, including the fantastic Purity White, which has flavours of vanilla and pomegranate. There's the Lapsang Souchong, a tea that's dried over pine fires in China and boasts an intense smoky fragrance and flavour. There's Oolong and Pu-erh and Chai, and non-caffeinated Rooibos.

In all, there are more than 40 varieties, and Rebecca and Maggie can tell you the history of each one. "We've had a blast," said Maggie of the past nine months. When the market's not on, Clearview Tea can be purchased at the 100 Mile Store and the Bank Café, as well as a couple of small shops in Collingwood and Barrie. There's also a great website, www.clearviewtea.ca, with a full online

But more than anything, Rebecca and Maggie are looking forward to getting back to the market, where they can talk one-on-one with customers about their tea. "The best thing about starting this company is that we've managed to introduce ourselves to this community," said Rebecca. "We've met so many great people, and we're thrilled to be a part of Creemore."



Surgery amid fire

Every once in a while I get out some scrapbooks given to me by the late Jack Heslip, a well-known Creemore druggist and a man also interested in local history. These scrapbooks, I believe, were prepared by Christine Linton, a longtime local resident. The one I am looking at now, which contains items from Creemore and Collingwood papers, was made with an old book. The print in the book is covered

by newspaper items. Most dates are missing but the news appears to be that of the early 1940s.

Collingwood's General and Marine Hospital is frequently used by Creemore people and so the following account will be of interest to the *Echo* readers.

"Collingwood, July 24 – Working in an operating room with swirling thick smoke and flames perilously close, doctors completed an appendectomy operation upon a woman when fire gutted the roof and attics of the Collingwood hospital yesterday. At the same time patients were being rushed to safety.

"The operation was about half-completed when smoke started to seep into the operating theatre, Dr. C.H. Maitland stated. 'There was nothing to do but to continue,' the doctor said, 'so we got on with the job. What was most disturbing was the shouts of those fighting the fire and the noise of the fire truck beneath the window of the operating theatre. They were shouting that those patients on the second floor were to be removed at once, and we were on the second floor.'

"Dr. Maitland was assisted by Doctors B.F. Boettger and J.R.N. Graham [from Creemore] and Nurses Mabel and Myrtle Cherry, cousins, and Maud Buchanan. When the operation was completed the unconscious woman was taken from the hospital down the fire escape to Mrs. Warren's nursing home. At 7 pm Dr. Maitland said that the woman was progressing favourably.



"Dr. Maitland was unstinting in his praise of the actions of the nurses, some of whom are only girls. Without any excitement or panic they started removing the patients, some of them critically ill. As they were taken from the hospital willing neighbours opened their homes to see them and the sick were instantly taken care of.

"Others were taken to the parish hall of All Saints' Anglican Church, which was

soon transformed into a hospital ward. The patients in there told The Telegram that they were quite comfortable and felt no ill effects from their hurried evacuation.

"As soon as the fire alarm sounded more than 100 men from the Collingwood Shipyards and a great number from the Clyde Aircraft works rushed to the hospital. Whey they got there most of the patients had been removed, and an amazing sight met their eyes. About 15 minutes after the fire was discovered, rain fell heavily, and the patients, lying on the rain-drenched grass, were protected by blankets, umbrellas and coats brought by people who had hurried to the scene of the fire.

"The men from the town's two main industries in a very short time removed the rest of the patients, and also most of the furnishings. The men did a fine job. Ambulances raced to and from homes in town, and folding beds and cots were hastily rigged up in the parish hall of All Saints Anglican Church.

"As it is now, the 55 or more patients, including several mothers with babies only a few days old, are housed in homes in Collingwood, and the five hospital doctors will have their hands full visiting their patients. They have no idea when they will be able to get back into the hospital. The roof in the centre of the hospital – the old wing – is gone, and four rooms on the second floor are badly damaged."





GUEST EDITORIAL

A Night to be Proud Of

We all know that governments at all levels get their fair share of criticism and more often than not contribute to the growing cynicism directed at politicians and public officials. There are days when politicians and



bureaucrats just can't seem to do anything right. Clearview Township has not been spared.

Monday evening at Clearview Council was not one of those days.

The night was highlighted by the announcement from both the Provincial and Federal governments, that Clearview would be receiving a combined grant of \$10 million towards the Stayner wastewater project. This grant secures the promise by Council that the agreement to share facilities with Wasaga Beach would proceed, funded largely through grants and development contributions with no impact on residential taxes.

Not to be lost in the excitement of the grant announcements, Council moved on several other important community initiatives.

The Township approved the creation of a service board to ensure the continuation of The Robotics Team at Stayner Collegiate Institute. The team was notified by the school in December that the program would not be continued. The Cyber Gnomes have been competing successfully in robotic competitions for several years. The program encourages students to further their education and aspire to careers in related science and technology fields. In the resolution passed on Monday the Council stated "a desire to ensure that the youth involved in this program continue to compete and develop skills that are crucial to today's fast paced society". This service board will bring together a student team and parent volunteers to oversee the teams activities. The team will benefit from banking and insurance support from the Township, while continuing to raise funds from the community to cover all their expenses.

Monday night also saw the initiation of the Clearview Heritage Conservation Project, a project focussed on identifying and protecting our naural landscapes and our distinct heritage structures. Council approved the first step to consult with the public and interested community partners to seek their input. A public meeting will be scheduled to make the residents aware of the Township's interest in identifying significant heritage resources and to assess the public desire to move forward on this initiative.

Creemore Medical Centre was given Council approval to proceed with the expansion of its building. Having access to a medical centre in the village has been an essential part of life in Creemore. Its expansion is necessary to ensure that health care will continue to be available locally

and that the facility will be made more flexible to accommodate additional health care professionals and services such as laboratory, physiotherapy and clinic services. The expansion will also ensure that the building will meet new accessibility standards and is provided with a much needed face-lift.

On Monday night, the Township also responded to a request from residents who depend on kidney dialysis for their continued health and who use a hemodialysis machine in their homes. The daily use of this machine consumes a large amount of water and a request was made for a water bill subsidy. Council approved a 90% rebate to qualifying residents, a savings of approximately \$150 per month.

There was even a discussion at Council about the real possibility of a bus route linking Clearview to Wasaga Beach and Collingwood and our volunteer firefighters were praised for their performance from the Fire Marshall's office and thanked for their help with the Stayner Food Bank Christmas Hamper distribution.

Overall a good night's work for Council and Staff and one that I hope you can be as proud of as I was to be a Council member.





You don't have to be gifted to be good

Martha Bull was a successful businesswoman before a divorce and a recession-driven bankruptcy made her reconsider her priorities in the mid-1980s. Deciding it was time for a bold new direction, she enrolled in a three-year full-time program at the Ontario College of Art, and discovered a love for watercolour painting.

"It was liberating," she remembers. "It felt like, for the first time in a long time, I was taking time to do something I really wanted to do."

In the ensuing years, she has worked in several different fields, but she has also joined a friend who runs an adventure tourism company on countless canoe trips to Ontario's north, taking along her art supplies and giving fellow trippers lessons in *en plein air* watercolour painting. And she has discovered a passion for teaching, one that's just as strong as her

love for creating art.

Last year, she started a company, My Time Watercolour, and set about merging her two loves professionally. Named for that feeling she had back at OCA, her lessons are aimed at those who are approaching watercolour and feel that it's "their time" to finally explore their creativity in a different way.

Based in Toronto, Bull has been conducting classes in that city primarily, but this winter she's spending weekends at the Mulmur farm that her parents left to her and her siblings. So she's bringing her lessons northward, and is hoping to find a group of people who would like to try their hands at watercolour at a series of workshops. The first, on January 25 and 26, will take place at the Honeywood School House, and feature a hot lunch on both days. The second will be at the same venue from February 14 to 17 and feature **Sue Miller** as a guest instructor as well as Bull herself. After that, she's hoping her students will join her in the great outdoors – her favourite place to paint – for a summer of creativity.

"What I really want people to know is that painting is not difficult," said Bull, her passion for teaching coming through in her voice. "And also, that you don't have to be gifted to be good at it. It's about coming at it from the right angle and then practicing."

Over the years, Bull has refined a teaching approach that has guaranteed results, she said. The key, the first time students put paint to paper, is to keep things abstract. "The first session is all about water and paint, and lines and texture." The second session is about the establishment of a scene... but really, only the outline of a scene. "I can promise you that you'll be proud of that one," she said.

Once you have those two paintings under your belt, it's all about discovering what you're good at – some people are line and texture people, and some people are shape and colour people, says Bull. She loves to help students discover their own creative personalities and gets a thrill out of guiding them to that point.

"It turns my crank to see people exploring," said Bull. "And they need to do that to find out what they like to do. What I can do is help push them in the right direction."

appreciative we are of the community's support to date.

Along with the Township's approval of the expansion, Clearview has agreed to apply for an interim loan to cover the balance of the construction not yet raised through community donations. The cost of borrowing will be paid from medical centre rent payments ensuring that no taxpayer revenues will be used to fund the expansion.

With the support of the community and the endorsement of this project by Council, construction is expected to begin in May of this year.

The Creemore Medical Centre exists because of the foresight and generosity of the residents of Creemore. Expansion will ensure that the village will continue to have health service provided locally and that the facility will be much more flexible in accommodating additional health care professionals and future needs such as laboratory, physiotherapy and possibly walk-in clinic services. As part of the construction, new accessibility standards will also be met and the overall appearance updated.

This expansion is very much in line with the direction our provincial health care system is being asked to take. Hospitals are being asked to move more patient care into the community. Municipalities are being asked to take on a bigger role in ensuring that health care facilities are provided in their communities.

Dr. Lorna MacDougall, who has been a fixture at the Creemore Medical Centre for 22 years, has informed her patients that she will be moving her practice to Nottawa on January 28.

"I'm ready to take on new challenges, and this opportunity came up," said MacDougall of the move, which she explained would put her office in a more central location for her patients, who come from the Creemore and Mulmur areas but also from Collingwood, Stayner and as far away as Thornbury.

MacDougall arrived at the Creemore Medical Centre four years after it was built in 1987. She took over Dr. Luscott's practice after he left the Centre.

"I've loved working in Creemore," she said. "It was a matter of being in the right place at the right time that brought me here, and over the years it has definitely continued to be the right place for my practice."

The fact that she is moving at the same time that the Creemore Medical Centre is fundraising to build an expansion on the building is coincidental, and she said those efforts have her full support.

Meanwhile, Medical Centre Service Board chair **Bill Mann** said work is underway to bring in a new doctor, who could take on some of MacDougall's old patients – she anticipates most will follow her to Nottawa, but there's sure to be some who can't travel that distance – as well as accept new patients from the area.

"This is another reason why we need to make sure we get this expansion done," said Mann, explaining that a modernized facility and added space are sure to be attractive to a physician looking for a place to practice.

Once the expansion is complete, there will be enough space for a doctor to replace MacDougall and one additional one to set up shop, depending on the population demand of the area. Mann is hoping that this eventuality will also prompt people to contribute to the fundraising drive.

"I think it's imperative that we all chip in," he said.

Covering All the Bases Salad - Serves 4

1/2 cup walnuts, toasted

1/4 cup dried cranberries

1/4 cup dried blueberries

1/2 cup low fat feta cheese, cut into small cubes

1 small butternut squash

1 - 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil

1/4 teaspoon each sea salt and black pepper

Salad greens for 4 people

Dressing:

3 tablespoons white wine vinegar

1 clove garlic, minced

1 tablespoon Dijon mustard

1 tablespoon liquid honey

1/4 cup vegetable oil

1/4 teaspoon fresh ground black pepper

1/4 teaspoon sea salt

A few hours ahead of time, whisk all salad dressing ingredients together in a small bowl until well blended. Let sit in the fridge until needed. Remove from the fridge and re-whisk just before using.

Preheat oven to 400°. Peel and seed the butternut squash, and cut into 1 inch cubes. Place cubes on a rimmed baking sheet; drizzle with extra virgin olive oil. Sprinkle with 1/4 teaspoon each sea salt and black pepper. Roast in oven for about 20 minutes, turning cubes over once. When squash is cooked through and slightly golden, remove from oven and set aside.

Place salad greens in the bottom of a large salad bowl. Sprinkle toasted walnuts, dried blueberries, dried cranberries, feta cheese cubes and warm butternut squash on top, then pour on salad dressing. Toss gently to coat all ingredients, then serve immediately.


