MORE ON HALLS

Following up on last
week's decision on
community hall upgrades,
Councillor Shawn
Davidson led off Monday's
Council meeting by asking

for clarification on how the Township will fund the \$110,000 it has pledged to the halls.

Treasurer **Ed Henley** told Davidson that the \$50,000 being put into a reserve fund for the purpose in this year's budget will be used, and another \$60,000 will be taken from that reserve, leaving it in a deficit position of \$60,000. That money will then be put back into the reserve in 2014, bringing it back to zero. As a result, no amendments need to be made to this year's budget.



Community Grants Passed

Council passed the Community Assistance section of the 2013 budget Monday night, approving

grants totalling \$20,250 to community groups and non-profit organizations operating within the Township. A full list of recipients can be found by clicking on the "Budget Workshop #4" link at www.clearview.ca/home/budget.

New Pumper Truck

Council approved an expenditure of \$258,000 Monday night for the purchase of a new stock pumper truck, to be housed in Clearview Fire Department Station #5 in Singhampton.





Tin Roof gets local on water issues

Creemore-based non-profit organization Tin Roof Global has, to this point, been best known for its work in Uganda, which concentrates on installing rainwater collection systems at rural schools. But with the help of a \$66,000 grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation received last December, Tin Roof has shifted part of its focus to local water stewardship, and the importance of teaching children the value of this precious resource.

"We're really zeroing in on local water, and how it's affected by things like quarries, development and landfills," said **John Millar**, Tin Roof's founder and executive director. "The question is, how do you help students in Grades 7 and 8 contextualize these issues?"

To that end, Tin Roof has launched an in-class workshop called "Gush," and the Trillium funding will allow the organization to bring the workshop to 75 classes across the Simcoe County and York Region School Boards over the remainder of this school year and 125 more next year.

The program is extremely hands-on, and is divided into several modules that allow students to experience some of the complexity of water resource management.

In one module, students are asked to clean up a simulated oil spill by using a variety of different tools – cotton balls, j-cloths, anything that might soak up the oil sitting on the surface of the water. After discovering how difficult a challenge the clean-up is, they are provided with baking soda, which solidifies the oil and causes it to sink – a good approximation of a common real-world technique for dealing with large oil spills.

In another module, the water cycle is explored by boiling salt water and having a brave volunteer from the class drink the water that condenses from the steam—it's freshwater, of course, because salt doesn't evaporate.

A third module, perhaps the most intriguing, creates a conceptual model of a quarry in a number of tupperware buckets. Students are given various stakeholder roles – the quarry owner, the quarry employees, the neigbouring well owners, the environmentalists, even the bobolinks whose habitat is threatened. Rotating every minute, the stakeholders perform various duties – dewatering, adding water, taking aggregate, replacing vegetation – and within 10 minutes are all typically equally frustrated.

"We're not anti-quarry – we all need aggregate," said Millar. "But what this exercise teaches is that some properties may be better suited to quarries than others."


Tin Roof has hired two people to deliver the workshops, including Creemore resident Caitlin Sumner.



This week's photo is of Robert "Bob" Lackie. Bob, father of Murray Lackie and grandfather of **Kirsten** and **Nathan Lackie**, had strong ties to the area. His family was from Layender, where his great-grandfather and grandfather were blacksmiths from 1870 until the trade died out and they started farming on the west side of Centre Road just south of the Mulmur/Nottawasaga Townline. Bob's father Clarence and most of his aunts and uncles were born on that farm. Bob, who grew up in Barrie, used to come out to Lavender in the summers to stay with his Uncle Bert Heard and Aunt Edna. This photo is circa 1936 and was taken near the top of the 4th Line south of Creemore. We assume the six-shooter at his hip is not loaded, but to a young mind on a glorious summer day it no doubt had ammo enough to rid the world of all the outlaws. Bob was happy to see the family return to the area when Murray and Sandra bought their farm in Creemore in 1994. Bob passed away at Royal Victoria Hospital in Barrie last Friday.

Conservation can save billions

Dear Editor:

All the wind turbines in Ontario do not equal one Earth Hour in Toronto. Between 8:30 and 9:30 pm on March 23, 2013, Sygration reported that all the wind turbines in Ontario produced about 178 MW of power (159 MW between 8 and 9 pm and 196 MW between 9 and 10 pm, divided by two). Toronto Hydro reported that in the same Earth Hour, 205 MW were saved by some lights being turned off in Toronto. Turning off the lights cost Ontario nothing. Paying \$0.135/kW hour for wind power cost Ontario about \$24,030.

Ironically, I live where we enjoy a dark night sky – we can wave to the Space Station as it passes by – yet, the Provincial government wants to litter our fields with flashing red lights on wind turbines! For what? If the Provincial government puts energy conservation back in the budget, Ontario can save billions. Conservation would also save our rural economies, communities, and environment from the impact of wind turbines.



In search of the Spirit Bears, part 1

In the northwest corner of British Columbia is the Great Bear Rainforest, five times the size of Banff National Park and twice the size of the Serengeti. Covering eight million acres, the rainforest boasts a biomass of 500 tones per acre, 40 per cent greater than the Amazon. It is the

largest temperate rainforest in the world and has some of the most spectacular flora, fauna and vistas to been seen any where on the planet—yet most Canadians don't know it even exists. In fact, more Canadians have visited the Serengeti and the Amazon than the Great Bear Rainforest, which is a a real shame.

What excites me most about the place is that it's home to the elusive Kermode Bear, otherwise known as the Spirit Bear, a rare black bear with a genetic anomaly that sometimes makes it white. Less than 10 per cent of this isolated black bear population is white, and their remoteness in this impermeable old growth forest makes a Spirit Bear sighting very rare and special. They inhabit a small and remote area of northwestern British Columbia, principally on Princess Royal Island, which is why my daughter Tory and I journeyed there last fall. We flew to Vancouver, took a small plane north to Bella Bella, stayed over night in Shearwater and on the next day took a four-hour boat ride north to Klemtu on



Princess Royal Island.

The Spirit Bear Lodge was to be our base for the next five days. Owned and operated by the Kitasoo people, the lodge is very modern and wonderfully located at the water's edge. As for guests, there was an Australian family of six,

two French veterinarian couples, a German BMW CEO and his wife, two unusual women from Vermont who were travelling the world in an attempt to observe every bear species, and Tory and I, the only Canadians.

Sometimes things turn out to be better than anyone could ever have hoped for – so it was for my trip to the Great Bear Rainforest. I purposely chose a date in mid-September to coincide with the salmon runs and maximize our chances of sighting Spirit and grizzly bears. At this time of year bears come out of the dense forest and feed on the spawning salmon in the shallow waters of the mountain streams. It also happens that my anniversary falls during that time, so I incorporated the trip as an anniversary gift. Surprisingly, I don't have a good track record when it comes to anniversary presents – in fact the Leafs probably have a better win-loss record than I do – vet I have remained married for some 34 years. I think the secret is that like most Leaf supporters, Jacquie has adjusted her expectations to avoid disappointment. Unfortunately, events transpired to prevent Jacquie from being able to go, but in the end that turned out to be the best anniversary present I could have gotten her, and Tory was able to take her spot. This pleased Jacquie, because Tory and I have shared an avid interest in the Spirit Bears for decades, since long before their existence was common knowledge outside of the lands of Kitasoo people.

The trip up was spectacular, but nothing compared to the five-day experience we had once there. On the first night we were invited to a potluck dinner in the native village and Tory and I had the honour of sitting with the Hereditary Chief Charlie Mason. He guided us through the many fish dishes and personally recommended the sea urchin and the herring roe; thankfully, we took small portions. The Kitasoo people are a marine culture and eat very few terrestrial foods. In fact, they take a strong anti-hunting stance, particularly with regard to the trophy hunting of bears, and there are very few deer and no moose in the area. Over dinner, the chief shared some traditional stories about the Spirit Bears and, to our delight, the Sasquatch.


The Sasquatch has always played a vibrant and important role in Kitasoo oral history. To them they are very real, and to laugh or snicker is to be disrespectful. In Tory and me they found kindred spirits, which opened us to a number

of fascinating stories of first-hand encounters. Most of the stories relate to the disappearance of natives after being taken by Sasquatch, and we were warned that, should we encounter one, never to look directly into their eyes as they have spiritual powers that can possess you. One island in particular seemed to be a hotbed of activity, and after a very compelling account of a large manlike figure emerging in the glow of a campfire sent chills down our spines, they offered to take us to camp out there. Our status as true believers spread and the name and location of the island was subsequently entrusted to us and the camping invitation repeated. On the way home several guides went out of their way to intercept our boat to present Tory with a book on Sasquatch and thank us for our sincere interest.

Sensing smirks of derision on the faces of my readers, I leave you one thought: there could very easily be more hairy things in eight million acres of primordial Great Bear Rainforest, Horatio, than are dreamt of in your philosophy.

Points leader for the season was **Jeff** Fawcett, who notched 36 goals and 10 assists for a total of 46 points.




