# "FOOD AND WATER FIRST" COMES TO MULMUR

by Brad Holden The North Dufferin Agricultural Task Force is rolling out its next phase of advocacy



following its successful, if precarious, defeat of the mega quarry proposal in Melancthon. On Wednesday, spokesperson **Shirley Boxem** brought NDACT's new "Food and Water First" message to Mulmur Council, hoping that the municipality will lend its support to the new campaign once it gets fully underway.

"The main goal of Food and Water First is to ensure that farmers across Ontario are never again in the position of having to defend their precious land and water against inappropriate development," said Boxem.

# Changes to garbage services in effect

This Friday, April 5 marks the first day Creemore's waste is being picked up by Simcoe County's new waste disposal contractors. There are a few changes to the service that residents should be aware of.

Residential pickup will now take place on Friday mornings across all of Clearview Township, and unlike in the past, waste collection will no longer be delayed by a day due to holidays. The only exception to this rule will be when Christmas or New Year's Day falls on a Friday.

Residents will also enjoy expanded yard waste pickup, with four bi-weekly collections in the spring and five in the fall. Spring yard waste pickups in Creemore will take place on the weeks of April 2, April 15, April 29 and May 13. Yard waste should be on the curb by 7 am on Monday morning of each of these weeks.

The County's recycling program has been expanded to include all recyclables from #1 to #7, including clamshell packages, yogurt containers, fruit cups, coffee cup lids and plant pots and trays.

The County will also be picking up compostables from commercial, industrial and multi-family buildings for the first time. These properties will be limited to one untagged bag of garbage per week, six standard recycling boxes and six standard green bins.

# Cybergnomes top six in Ontario

As befits their name, the CyberGnomes Robotics Team 2013 is small. With only 12 student members the team is one of the smallest, if not the smallest, in the FIRST (For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology ) Robotics League which stretches over 60 countries and nearly 5,000 teams. But size definitely isn't everything, as the Gnomes proved at their latest competition at the Hershey Centre in Mississauga, Ontario this past weekend (March 28, 29 and 30).

The start of competition saw the team rested and ready,

setting up their pit area and having their robot inspected very early. Qualifying matches began on Friday and saw a very successful CyberGnomes team complete the first 30-point climb and finish the day undefeated and seeded in second place. The CyberGnomes award-winning climber enabled them to achieve the first 30-point climb at every competition they attended this season, garnering two prestigious Excellence in Engineering Awards. Only about 10 per cent of all teams competing have managed to make a 30-point climb to the top of the eight-foot tower.

Saturday saw them face some of their hardest opponents and suffer two hard-fought losses. Undeterred, they battled on and, after winning their last match handily, finished the qualifying rounds in 4<sup>th</sup> place out of 44 teams.

Entering the Elimination rounds, the CyberGnomes captained their alliance through to the semi-finals where they were finally eliminated, narrowly missing out on a World Championship berth.

Clearview Township should be very proud to have one of the top six robotics teams in Ontario this year. The CyberGnomes have shown the world that rural Ontario has everything it takes to provide innovative and creative technology.

The new campaign, she said, would "augment and expand" the successful communications framework that NDACT built during the Stop the Mega Quarry fight.

A new website, foodandwaterfirst.com, will go live in mid-April, and businesses, organizations and municipal governments will be encouraged to put a "Food and Water First" button on their own websites, linking them to the new NDACT site. In doing so, they will also be asked to sign a pledge. In a municipality's case, Boxem said this would let developers know in advance that "this is a community that has planning in place," that weighs the benefits of all development versus its potential impact on prime farmland and source water.

Boxem said the campaign would also utilize social media, which played a key role in growing the movement during the quarry fight, and involve a "spring planting" of Food and Water First signs across the province in May.

Mayor **Paul Mills** followed Boxem's presentation by asserting Mulmur's continuing support for NDACT's work, and said Council would debate the inclusion of the button on the Township's website when the time came.

# Talking local, diverse food at Mad Maple Country Inn

Mad Maple Country Inn, a bed & breakfast and "agritourismo" located on County Road 124 just south of Maple Valley, has been upping the ante on local food advocacy since it opened last summer. **Miriam Streiman**, who owns the establishment with her husband **Neil Epstein**, was an instrumental part of the team that organized Foodstock two years ago, and Mad Maple has already hosted several big-name chefs and food activists.

On Friday, April 12 from 7 to 9 pm, one of the movement's international leaders will pay a visit to Mad Maple for a talk and a tasting. Danish chef **Trine Hahnemann** is a restaurateur, a best-selling cookbook author and a globe-trotting proponent of healthy, local eating. She believes that through cooking, eating, and exchanging stories and beliefs we can create a better world, and she focuses her work on one goal: that everybody in the world should have access to a decent, daily meal.

Hahnemann will spend the days before her visit to Mad Maple Country Inn at Toronto's seventh annual Terroir Symposium, where she will speak about "food memory" and the importance of carrying culinary traditions through generations.

At the Mad Maple, Hahnemann will focus on the makeup of our diets, and the need for keeping biodiversity on our plates instead of in gene banks. Long an advocate of a diet that's 80 per cent local, in-season vegetables, fruits and grains and 20 per cent meat, Hahnemann also believes that eating is a political act. At the Mad Maple, she will explain why.


She'll also talk about the Rye Bread Project, a partnership between herself and the New Amsterdam Market in New York City. Rye bread, and especially the Scandinavian open-faced rye sandwich known as the "smørrebrød," is a healthy, traditional food that can easily be transferred around the world by introducing farmers to good rye seeds and bakers to old recipes. At the New Amsterdam Market, events have been held challenging dozens of high-end chefs to come up with the most original smørrebrød lunches, using bread made from rye grown organically in upstate New York. The project is a great example of Hahnemann's various passions coming together in the real world – traditional food, healthy meals and agricultural diversity.

"I have cooked more than a hundred thousand meals in my career," Hannehman said during a recent speech at the United Nations. "For me the produce that enters my kitchen has to be manifold. My cooking can only be as diverse and tasty as the produce that the farmers grow. I need diversity to choose from."



# Food and water first

Dear Editor:

The proposed mega quarry application exposed the sorry state of the provincial legislation regarding quarries and provoked such public protest that before the election, then Premier McGuinty ordered an environmental review of the proposed mega quarry and a review of the Aggregate Resources Act (ARA), resulting in Highland's withdrawal (temporarily I'm sure) of its application. The legislature has now resumed sitting and has introduced the Local Food Act. However, the legislation does nothing to protect our valuable water and farmland resources. Also, it seems uncertain that the review of the Aggregate Resources Act (ARA) will resume.

The aggregate industry has been allowed to operate unfettered in the province for years, not even required to undergo an environmental assessment. This must not be allowed to continue and can only be stopped by a huge public protest as was done regarding the mega quarry. Please help put the pressure on the government to make these essential changes to the legislation so that prime farmland is protected and no quarrying is permitted below the water level. 





track the big animals by recording the patterns on their flukes. As the whale made its terminal dive, we were told its specific pattern was in the registry – the whale's name was Susan.

Walking into the rainforest along a stream, we came across enormous, moss-covered, old-growth cedars six feet in diameter. We saw a giant, six-inch banana slug, a plant with a five-foot leaves, and streams with so many salmon you could walk across them. Everything in the rainforest seems prehistoric and larger than life.

On our second day, up the Princess Royal Channel, we waited all day in the rain. We saw no bears but we did enjoy a very rare sighting of the elusive wolverine. Tory spotted it first and got a very good look at it. The rarity of the sighting was brought home to us when one of the Kitasoo elders told Tory that he had never seen one

Up Mussel Inlet on day three, we watched a mother grizzly and her cub feed in the stream for an hour



before wandering away. Unexpectedly, a large male grizzly weighing at least 900 pounds came directly toward us. He was upwind and didn't notice us until the last minute – their eyesight is notoriously bad – and he turned and crossed 15 yards in front of us. **Doug Neasloss**, our guide, told us there was a 1,200-pound male in the area but he hadn't seen him in a few days. We also observed two or three other grizzlies with older cubs 100 yards upstream. A good day for grizzlies.

The guides don't carry guns but large pepper spray containers. The week before our adventure, Doug was "false-charged" by a large male grizzly. This is where the bear charges to establish dominance, and we were assured that they always stop short of you. In Doug's

case, the bear stopped just four feet from him. We were instructed that should this happen, we were to assume a submissive pose and back away slowly. There was no advice on lower bowel activity, but I assume that's optional. Regardless, never turn and run—this triggers a predator-prey response in the bear and you're toast. The ranger confirmed the false charge, and suggested that the best use of the pepper spray is to forget the bear and spray it all over yourself—that way, it would at least act as a marinade and add flavour when the bear ate you. Personally, I found it difficult to enjoy bear humour while I was afoot in bear country armed with only pepper spay.

Grizzlies are actually herbivores – they principally eat sedge grass and starchy tubers, but come fall and the salmon run they gorge themselves on fish to build up winter fat reserves, spending their days eating, sleeping and defecating. There's no mistaking an active bear area, as the ground is littered with salmon carcasses and bear feces and it's odoriferous. I can't remember which day we spent crawling through underbrush in such an area in a relentless drizzle, fruitlessly searching for grizzlies, but I do remember that as soon we got a cell signal, Tory called her mom and explained that missing this trip was her best anniversary present ever. Finally, I got an anniversary present in the plus column.





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

# and pasta Bacon and eggs

I hope everyone had a Happy Easter! The weather certainly seemed to cooperate for a sunny spring weekend, although on Monday, as I write this article, I'm getting pretty tired of seeing it snow out there. On the weekend, we went to see a special



showing of the digitally remastered Ten Commandments at the Cineplex in Collingwood, starring Charlton Heston. Being old movie buffs, we also tuned in to Turner Classics where they ran a number of Easter-themed pictures starring, as a matter of fact, Charlton Heston. He sure did get around in those Bible films!

After getting more than enough of Mr. Heston, we enjoyed one of my traditional Easter dinners - baked ham with my sister's mustardy brown sugar glaze, scalloped potatoes, creamed corn and buttered carrots. I didn't really notice that the ham I picked up was 10 pounds. Even with the bone weighing in, that is a lot of ham... I guess we'll be enjoying ham sandwiches, ham casseroles, western omelettes and split pea soup with the ham bone until it gets all used up!

While you would think I might tempt you with some new ham recipe this week, I have to say, "Not quite, but at least I'm working from the same meat family." This week's recipe is one of

my favourite pull-together meals. More commonly known as Spaghetti alla Carbonara, it is a creamy, rich pasta which will satisfy young and old alike. Pancetta is known as Italian bacon, with a slightly different taste than bacon from your locally bred Ontario porker. Who doesn't like bacon and eggs for dinner every once in a while? Throw in some spaghetti and you'll have quite the slap-up meal from simple ingredients.

I've adapted this recipe from one of Nigella Lawson's, from her cookbook Feast – Food that Celebrates Life. While you have to work fast, this recipe is not hard once you get the hang of it.

The most important thing to remember is to make sure you've removed the pasta pot from the heat before you add the egg mixture. Otherwise, you will end up with scrambled eggs instead of a creamy sauce!

# **Bacon & Eggs Spaghetti (adapted from Nigella Lawson's Feast)**

Serves 4

- 3/4 lb. pancetta, diced into small cubes (substitute finely chopped bacon if desired)
- 1 teaspoon olive oil
- 1/2 cup white wine
- 4 large eggs
- 1/4 cup freshly grated parmesan cheese
- 1/4 cup 35% cream
- 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 1 lb. of dry spaghetti
- Freshly grated nutmeg (or 1/4 teaspoon ground)

Preheat a large pasta pot with salted water until boiling. While water is heating up, heat a large frying pan to medium high. Add olive oil and swirl around pan. Add cubed pancetta (or bacon) to the pan. Cook pancetta until it is browned but not too well done (e.g. too crispy). Add white wine to deglaze the pan. Reduce heat to low and let the mixture simmer until slightly thickened. Remove from heat and set aside.

In a medium size bowl, add the eggs and beat until frothy. Add the parmesan cheese, 35% cream and black pepper, then beat to incorporate. Break the dry spaghetti in half, add to the boiling water, and cook it according to package directions until "al dente" about 7 minutes or so – you don't want the pasta overdone or you will end up with a soggy result. Before draining the spaghetti, carefully remove 1/2 cup of the pasta water. Drain the pasta into a colander. Then working quickly, turn burner on low, add the pancetta mixture to the empty pasta pot, and reheat. Add in cooked pasta. Using tongs toss the pasta to coat with the pancetta mixture. If necessary, add some of the reserved pasta water to lubricate the pasta so it doesn't clump together. Take the pot off the heat (very important), and add the egg/cheese mixture, quickly giving the pasta another good toss or two to mix everything together. Place spaghetti into a large warmed pasta dish, then grate fresh nutmeg over top. Serve immediately with extra parmesan cheese and freshly ground black pepper on the side.
