

now seeking to designate and zone approximately 41.7 ha to Extractive Industrial, of which 36 ha is proposed to be extracted. If granted approval, the company would extract a maximum of 500,000 tonnes of aggregate from the site per year, with no more than 187,000 tonnes being removed from below the water table.

The company held its own public meeting to deal with its accompanying Aggregate Resources Act application earlier this year. That meeting was held on a Thursday night, and ratepayers at that time requested that Mulmur Township hold its public meeting on the planning applications on a Saturday so as to allow attendance from the 40 per cent of Mulmur residents who spend weekends only in the municipality.

More Fire Discussion

Mulmur Council continued to struggle Wednesday with what to do with a report from the Office of the Ontario Fire Marshall, received in February, which lists 30 recommendations for improving the delivery of fire protection and prevention services in the Township.

At the outset of the discussion, Mayor Paul Mills reported that he had met with a representative from the Fire Marshall's Office, along with the Mayors and CEOs of the three municipalities - Shelburne, Mono and Melancthon – who share fire services with Mulmur. He was told at that meeting, he said, that the main thing the FMO would like to see is the hiring of a Fire Prevention Officer that would serve all four municipalities. As for the recommendations in the report, the FMO representative informed the mayors that they are working with the chiefs of the three departments - Mulmur-Melancthon, Shelburne and Rosemont – and that it's hoped that all recommendations could be adopted in 18 to 24 months.

The fact that the meeting Mills spoke of took place was a surprise to Deputy Mayor Rhonda Campbell **Moon**, who said she understood from the last Council meeting that the next step was to be a report from the three chiefs on how they were going to meet the recommendations. Campbell Moon continues to press for a proactive response to the recommendations on behalf of Council, who ultimately are responsible for fire protection and prevention in the Township. The Township's Enabling and Enacting Bylaw, which sets out the responsibilities of the fire departments, is the first thing that Council needs to look at, according to Campbell Moon.

The rest of Council, however, seems more keen to have the work done by the FMO and the chiefs. To that end, consensus was reached Wednesday that the members of Council who sit on the fire boards that govern the departments will place an item on each of the boards' next meeting agendas, requesting an interim report from the chief about how the station is responding to the recommendations.

Campbell Moon pushed for a motion from Council to that effect, or at least a politely worded letter that incuded a deadline for the chiefs' reports, but neither of those ideas were picked up on by the rest of Council.

The situation is complicated by the fact that Mulmur does not have a majority vote on the Shelburne or Rosemont Fire Boards.




Miller encourages both accomplished painters and total beginners to come

Walker expansion should be suspended

Last Thursday I went to the Divisional Court hearing at Osgoode Hall re: the Niagara Escarpment Commission (NEC) versus Walker Aggregates' proposed Duntroon quarry expansion. The NEC tried desperately to prove that the quarry proposal was not in accord with the intent of the legislation protecting the world-recognized Niagara Escarpment (NE) biosphere.

On the same day, I returned home to learn that the provincial Liberals had motioned to complete the Aggregate Resources Act (ARA) Review and that the motion was unanimously approved at Queen's Park. (Congratulations everyone!)

Fact is that the current Aggregate Resources Act (ARA) and its underlying policies are so skewed toward the provision of "cheap" aggregate that nothing is sacred – not residences, not farmland, not source water, not environmentally protected land.

Fact is we are dangerously close to losing a large chunk of escarpment at one of the narrowest points in the corridor.

At the court hearing I didn't know whether to laugh or cry when I heard the simple three-point test of acceptable NE development:

- 1. Would there be environmental damage?
- 2. Would there be disruption to the local residents?
- 3. Is the proposal in the spirit of protective legislation and planning policies?

Yes, Yes, No. How could the proponents argue

otherwise? Amazed, I listened to the dozen or so lawyers at the hearing bandying around phases such as "significant woodlands," "no negative impact," "as much as possible," and "maintain and enhance" as if the game did not have the very real outcome of destroying 64 football fields of forest and digging a 168-acre hole 128 feet (39 metres) deep.

Who is looking at the big picture? Who is looking at the cumulative impact? There is already a new MAQ Aggregate quarry (247 acres) approved next to the existing 116-acre Walkers hole – do we really want another one?

I would like to see this "expansion" in the Niagara Escarpment suspended and reconsidered under a new Aggregate Resources Act, after the review has been completed and the Act is brought in line with today's values. Making a mistake at this point would be irreversible.
