COUNCIL LOOKS TO ELECTORAL REFORM

In the 20 years since amalgamation, Clearview Township's electoral model has remained the same – a Mayor and Deputy Mayor are elected by the entire municipality, and the populations of seven wards, roughly centred on Nottawa, Duntroon, Dunedin, Creemore, New Lowell, Sunnidale Corners and Stayner, each elect a Councillor to join them.

On Monday night, Council indicated the time might have come for a change, directing staff to bring a report back to the table setting out a process for a comprehensive review of Council's structure, which would consider possible changes to ward boundaries, the size of Council, the election method (either by ward or at large), Councillor remuneration and the job descriptions of the Township's elected representatives.

Councillor **Brent Preston** brought the motion to the table after indicating his plans to do so at the last meeting, and there was unanimous support for the idea on Monday night.

Preston said he was primarily motivated by the growing population inequality between the Township's wards – in the last election, Ward 3 (Dunedin) had the least electors with 1,259, while Ward 6 (New Lowell) had the most with 2,199. Current development patterns will only exacerbate these differences, said Preston, threatening a fundamental tenet of democracy, that each vote should carry more or less equal weight.

May the Best Duck Win







Great Gardens





EDITORIAL The march of generations | **THE WAY WE WERE**

Graduation ceremonies at our local schools are always events of great pomp and circumstance, and this year was no difference. Here in Creemore we don't get to witness our high school graduates experience their big night first hand, but the commencement ceremony at Nottawasaga & Creemore Public School, and the grand entrances that preceed it, provides a pretty amazing spectacle of transition, all the more so because for many of the young graduates, it's one of the first times they've donned a suit or a fancy dress.

This year was an extra special one for followers of Creemore history, as several of the area's old farm families – the Millsaps, the Taylors, the Whitleys, the Carruthers, the McLeods and others – had yet another descendent make the jump from Creemore to high school in Stayner.

The *Creemore Echo* sincerely congratulates all who graduated this week, whether from elementary or high school. These rites of passage are important milestones, and our children deserve the spotlight that's shone upon them as they're honoured for their achievements.

Of course, when you've been doing this long enough, graduations also provide a chance to marvel at the neverending march of generations. As always, there's another crop of kids coming up through the ranks, and this Monday, on Canada Day, the village of Creemore will provide one of the best events to witness our evolving population. Starting at 12:15 pm, the youngest among us will temporarily take over the main street, piloting their festive rides in the annual Harold Crawford Memorial Bike Parade. Like this past week's commencement festivities, the parade is a spectacle that must be seen to be believed. The future lies in the energy of our youth, and on Monday it will be racing forward on two wheels.



Last week we wondered about the location of this picture, one of Viola Rawn's collection of photographs of the original paving of Mill Street in 1928, provided to us by **Reg Rawn**. We had responses from two noted historians – **Gerry Blackburn** and **Bob Curran**. They explained that the building seen directly behind the asphalt machine in the foreground was known as the "apple storage" building, one of several building associated with the Hisey mill complex. Located in behind St. Luke's Anglican Church about halfway between Mill and Collingwood Streets, the building must have been used for apples at some point. Blackburn doesn't remember that usage, but he does remember the building as a venue for baking and arts & craft displays during Creemore's annual Winter Fairs. With country roads as unreliable as they were, it would have been the practice to bring a large asphalt machine like this one onsite rather than truck the material in. The small truck seen in the dugout below the hopper can be seen in the other photographs in the series, delivering asphalt from this site to the main street.

Green energy is "bankrupting our province"

Dear Editor:

Premier Wynne and Energy Minister Chiarelli: congratulations on taking advantage of Samsung's failing to meet their contract deadlines by reducing Ontario's commitment to them by \$2 billion. It's an encouraging crack in the government's adamant stance on its Green Energy policy.

However, to state that this will save every household \$24 annually is a spit in the ocean, when the government's own agencies project a 250 per cent increase in the annual cost of electricity within six years! The average household's electricity cost last year of \$1,700 is expected to become \$4,000 by 2020! Ontario will face "electricity poverty." Many won't be able to afford it. Industries will go elsewhere and institutions will stifle, as we all suffer the consequences.

Contrary to the prediction of a 15-per-cent increase in power required, the need for power has declined in the last few years, and will continue to decrease as the price goes up and industries move to the USA and Quebec where power is cheaper.

Government statements of available megawatts

of green energy are misleading, when you consider that wind turbines generate electricity only 28 per cent of the time and 87 per cent of that time when not needed. The 3 per cent of the total electricity generated in Ontario last year by wind turbines was prioritized, so we paid 13.5¢ per kwh for wind energy, while hydro plants (3.5¢ per kwh) were shut down and sometimes nuclear plants as well(5.6¢ per kwh), to accommodate the intermittent input of wind power. Ontario's householders paid a "globalized" charge of 8¢ per kwh while the wholesale rate was 2.8¢ per kwh. It's unfortunate that the marginal contribution of wind energy to Ontario's total consumption is driving up the cost of electricity so disproportionately.

Eventually, Ms. Wynne and Mr. Chiarelli, the Ontario government will have to face the fact that its green energy policy is bankrupting our province. If you think the gas plant fiasco was embarrassing enough to prorogue parliament, what will happen when you have to unwind your agreements with Samsung and all the other provider agreements in place?

Why are we spending billions on unneeded wind power, while starving funding for education, health care and infrastructure?

There is one sobering fact: When the 20-year subsidy agreements expire and there is no longer a subsidy program, what will we do for electricity, if an adequate generation infrastructure of nuclear, hydro and gas are not in place?


Flack et al who took notes and relayed the info to me.

Council contemplates electoral review

(Continued from page 1)

Municipal governance has also become far more complex over the past two decades, said Preston, and the responsibilities of Council and demands on individual Councillors have changed significantly. "A review of ward boundaries presents an opportunity to examine the role of Council in Clearview Township in a comprehensive way, to ensure that our democratic governance model is suited to the changing nature of our municipal government," he wrote in the backgrounder accompanying his motion.

Township clerk Pamela Fettes, who Preston joked he had bonded with over a "mutual love of electoral process," told Council she supported the initiative, despite some concerns about timing and funding.

Any decisions would have to be made before the end of the year, she said, as nominations open for the next municipal election in January 2014. She also predicted that some expert help might be needed to deal with the complexities of such reform, and warned that any changes could be appealed to the Ontario Municipal Board. Despite those caveats, however, Fettes agreed with Preston that a review is warranted.

Others on Council agreed, with Mayor Ken Ferguson pointing out that he'd brought the idea up before on occasion. "Hopefully, we'll be provided with many avenues, and we can pick and choose what works best for us."


Deputy Mayor Alicia Savage also voiced her support, stressing that anything done in the name of efficiency is a worthwhile endeavour. "If we don't do it now, it's another five years until the opportunity comes back," she said.

With that, Preston's motion passed unanimously. It's anticipated that a staff report will come back to Council by September. Whatever process unfolds after that, Preston's motion pointed out, will include some measure of public consultation.

Roughly 75 residents dropped into the Clearview Township Planning Department's Heritage Conservation Open House Tuesday night, and most of the evening's conversation centred on the possible establishment of a "heritage viewscape" regulation within the Township.

Several maps were laid out around the Council chambers, and attendees were asked to comment on a draft version of where the policy might

apply (as seen above).

As explained by planning director Michael Wynia, restrictions in the area would not be placed on structures or activities that are in keeping with historical activities, such as barns or silos, but rather on additions to the landscape that impact negatively on the area's iconic views.

According to Wynia, such a designation could be a first step toward more traditional forms of heritage preservation, such as designation of individual neighbourhoods or buildings.

A report will likely come back to Council on the subject in September.
