Walker expansion allowed to proceed

Walker Aggregates will be allowed to proceed with the expansion of its Duntroon quarry, after a court dismissed the Niagara Escarpment Commission's legal challenge of the Consolidated Hearings Board's approval of the project this week.

The challenge was heard before three judges of the superior court on April 25, 2013. The NEC argued that the two members of the Consolidated Board who supported granting Walker a new licence had made an error of law by failing to give proper weight to the Niagara Escarpment Plan, a position bolstered by the fact that a third dissenting member of the Board had argued against the proposal on those grounds.

But the court disagreed, stating that "the decision of the majority Joint Board reveals no legal error and is reasonable, given the governing legislation and policies and evidence before it."

The court has directed the NEC to pay legal costs of \$15,000 to Walker Aggregates, and \$5,000 to each of the County of Simcoe and Clearview

In a press release issued Wednesday, Walker Aggregates vice-president Ken **Lucyshyn** was in a celebratory mood.

"This is a great day for us, especially for the Duntroon Quarry employees and for the many individuals and businesses that will be supported economically by the quarry expansion," said Lucyshyn.

The Clearview Community Coalition, who opposed the expansion alongside the NEC at the Consolidated Board Hearing, released a statement thanking its followers for their support. "This is not the decision the CCC had hoped

The CCC statement also called for a provision for intervener funding to be placed into the Aggregate Resources Act, which is currently under review, so that the onus doesn't rest with citizens' groups to bear the cost of protecting the environment.

COUNCIL TO ASK PUBLIC ABOUT WARD CHANGES

Monday's meeting also sees decision to use Internet voting in 2014

The 2014 municipal election dominated conversation at Clearview Council's Monday night meeting, with two important decisions being made: first, to proceed with a public review of the Township's ward system this fall in advance of the election, and second, to utilize Internet and telephone voting when the time comes for residents to make their decision in October 2014.

Discussion about the electoral review started with a report from clerk Pamela Fettes, requested in a unanimous resolution moved by Councillor Brent Preston two weeks ago.

In the report, Fettes reiterated her support for conducting a review of Clearview Township's governance structure, but listed several concerns with timing and funding. With nominations opening for the 2014 election on January 2, Fettes said any bylaw to adjust ward boundaries or abolish the ward system would need to be passed by October 21. That way, the 45-day Ontario Municipal Board appeal period that would follow would be done by December 5, giving staff just under a month to make appropriate changes and be ready for the nomination period. If an appeal were to be filed, she said, the current electoral system would have to be utilized for the 2014 election.

Given the complexity of the work and the fact that the clerk's department is already busy preparing for the election, Fettes recommended that Council hire a consultant to guide the process. She estimated that would cost \$35,000, and pointed to the Township's Election Reserve, with a current balance of (See "Electoral" on page 3)



Electoral review to begin with public meeting

\$37,500, as a source of funding for the initiative. That would mean, however, that the 2014 election, estimated to cost around \$50,000, would have to be fully paid for out of the Township's 2014 budget.

Despite these hesitations, the consensus of Council remained that the time is right for such an exercise, given its been 20 years since amalgamation and given the growing population disparity between the Township's seven wards. However, the extent to which a consultant is needed was the subject of some debate.

Councillor Preston, for one, offered that much of the work could be done by Council, and that a consultant could be hired merely to help with the technical aspect of redrawing ward boundaries.

Councillor **Shawn Davidson**, on the other hand, argued that a consultant would be impartial, and would have the skills and expertise to get the job done on a tight time line. "If we don't hire a consultant, it's not going to get done," he said.

That said, Councillor **Thom Paterson** pointed out that the public had not yet been approached on such a big question, and that their perspective should be sought before deciding to hire a consultant.

"What is our objective?" asked Paterson. "What is our problem statement? These are questions that need to be formulated before we go and hire somebody."

Eventually, Council decided to have staff issue a request for proposals from consultants, but to hold a public meeting before making the final decision to hire one.

At that meeting, it's hoped that members of the public will present their views to Council on what does and doesn't need to be changed with the current ward system.

"What this comes down to is wards or no wards," said Deputy Mayor **Alicia Savage**. "That's the bottom line. And if we do stick with wards, we clearly have to make some changes."

The public meeting – likely the first of several on the subject throughout the fall – will be held at 7 pm on Monday, July 22.


It's anticipated that other aspects of the governance review, including Councillors' job descriptions and remuneration, will be done in-house by Council and staff.

How do you want to be represented?

PATERSON

Last Monday night Council approved an amended staff report to review and possibly change the way we elect your 2014 Council.

Council has started the process to review ward boundaries, the number of Councillors, the



While the report, as originally received, outlined very well the legislative requirements under which this review has to be carried out, it stopped short of examining the need for the review and especially concerning, it did not emphasize the primary role of the public in this process. It also outlined the role of Council members as participants in the process rather than leaders in determining how residents are to be represented. I feel strongly that it is a fundamental responsibility of the each member on current Council to engage their electorate with assistance from staff, not the other way around as outlined.

The report also recommended the use of an expert consultant at a cost of approximately \$35,000 to, in addition to other legislative duties, be responsible for public consultation. This was done in part to assist staff in meeting tight and perhaps unrealistic 2014 election timeframes. Under this plan, public consultation would be scheduled later in the process, in late August and September. I think the public should be consulted first and much of this workload should be borne by Council members.

Thankfully, Council listened to this concern and has scheduled the first public consultation session during the next Council meeting on Monday, July 22, starting at 7 pm.

The terms of reference in the report outlined guiding principles to help advise Council on possible changes. They included seeking equality in the number of voters per Councillor; accounting for future population growth in each Township community; considering the rearrangements of boundaries by roads, telephone exhanges, postal codes to help identify neighbourhood groupings; accounting for geography, community of interest; and the need for effective representation (as defined

by the Supreme Court of Canada).

To my mind the ward system already accommodates these principles that apply, with or without a little tinkering of the numbers and the boundaries, depending on the final number of Council members.

As for the number of Councillors, I would agree we have more members than needed if the way the job is done now continues. However there is much work to be done to be more representative and I am leaving the option open as to Council size in favour of a concerted effort to be more representative out in the community and at the Council table.

I am more confident that representation can be improved by looking at the way the job is currently being done rather than by spending resources and scarce funds on re-structuring what the job could be

Of course this is all dependent on the overall goal, being to improve effective representation and not just to achieve streamlined and potentially less representative decision-making in the guise of administrative efficiencies.


I have long advocated improving the way the public is engaged in Council business, the public's business. Voters feel left out of the process. We have all heard the comments that indicate that people feel under represented - "No one is listening to us." That many residents feel they have little or no say in how their tax dollar is spent - "Spending is out of control." That residents think the Township in general and Council members in particular do not respond timely or responsibly to their attempts to engage - "We either don't get a response or just a polite non-answer." That residents often do not feel welcomed at Council meetings – "Why bother, they don't want us there anyways." That one community's interest is favoured over the others "They don't like us, we complain too much."


Sound familiar? I'm not saying all these statements are fair or true, but they are expressions of wanting to be involved in the way we are governed.

On the positive side, the public feels engaged when decisions are made that are both in local and Township-wide interest. We need to hear more of what we are doing right, and what we can do better.

So please attend the first of the public meetings on Monday, July 22, at 7 pm to help answer the question, "How do you want to be represented in Clearview Township?"



To run or not to run?

On July 6, Dunedin's **Peter Taylor** knew there was only one answer to that question. He was at the start line for his second Sinister Seven – 148 kilometres, 7 stages ranging from 12 to 35 kilometres, with elevation gain/loss of 5,320 metres that must be finished in less than 27 hours. Last year, Taylor finished the grueling wilderness ultramarathon held at Crowsnest Pass, Alberta in the amazing time of 19 hours and 17 minutes and placed 6th.

This year, Taylor came to run. And run he did... for 17 hours and 57 minutes, which gave him a 2nd place finish. Taylor attributes his improved result to the extra strength he gained by pushing his baby daughter, **Isla**, in her stroller on many of his training runs. He also acknowledges the effort

of his support team Leslie, Kareen, Kev, Jay and Ty.

As an example of how tough this race is, another local resident, Collingwood's **Nick Brindisi**, no slouch of a long-distance runner himself, was forced to withdraw from his first attempt at the Sinister Seven after 100 kilometres, having lost all of his toenails and become hypothermic.

To run or not to run? In Taylor's own words, "the ultra marathon is something I do and love because its one of the ways I can celebrate my health that I have right now. You never know when it will be taken away from you."

Water woes after big rain

Clearview Township general manager of transportation **Steve Sage** estimates that last Monday's torrential downpour caused about \$100,000 worth of damages to the municipality's roads and infrastructure.

The worst damage by far, he said, was to the section of Nottawasaga Concession 6 that extends south from Riverside Drive. That road, which is summer-use only, was still closed at the *Echo*'s press time on Thursday.

Other roads that were washed out to varying degrees, including sections of Riverside Drive, the intersection of Nottawasaga Concession 5 and 6/7 Sideroad and the corner where Caroline Street West becomes Concession 5, were cleaned up and repaired over the course of Tuesday.

In Clearview, Sage said, extreme

rainfall was limited to an area stretching from New Lowell in the east to Glen Huron in the west, with the north and south boundaries being just one either side of Creemore. Stayner and Nottawa, for instance, received hardly any rain at all.

As for the areas that experienced overland flooding, Sage blamed the resulting damage more on debris than on the flowing water.

"The rain came down so hard that there was a lot of debris," he said. "That's what caused us the real grief, when the debris clogged culverts and ditches."

With three storm events in the past week, Sage said the Township is not out of the woods yet.

"The ground is so saturated at this point, any more rain is likely to cause more problems," he said.

Laid Back Lemon Fluff

Serves 6 to 8

1 package lemon pie filling and dessert mix plus:

Lemony Mixture:

2 large egg yolks

1/3 cup cold water

1/2 cups hot water

1/2 cup freshly squeezed lemon juice

1 tablespoon butter

Meringue:

3 egg whites (large eggs)

1/4 cup white sugar

Make lemony mixture first. Whisk 2 egg yolks and 1/3 cup cold water in a medium saucepan until smooth. Add 1 1/2 cups hot water and 1/2 cup fresh lemon juice. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly. When mixture thickens, cook for 1 additional minute and remove from burner. Stir in 1 tablespoon butter. Set mixture aside to cool.

Now you are ready for the meringue. In a copper or glass bowl and using an electric mixer, beat 3 egg whites until soft peaks form. Gradually beat in 1/4 cup white sugar. Beat again until stiff peaks form.

Last but not least, get out some pretty dessert dishes, preferably glass. If you don't have any, use wine glasses. Gradually fold the cooled lemon mixture into the meringue until well incorporated. Use a gentle touch so that the meringue remains as "fluffy" as possible. Fill dessert dishes, and then chill in the refrigerator for at least 1 hour. Top with a mint or lemon balm leaf, a sliced strawberry or even a lemon candy and serve. Put your feet up on the lounger and enjoy this tangy summer treat!





The Villages of Mulmur, Part 2

If you read the first instalment about villages in Mulmur that appeared about a month ago, you might wonder if Mulmur has a population at all. But it does, as the accounts of Honeywood, Terra Nova, Mansfield and Violet Hill will prove to you. This



history first appeared in the Creemore Star of July 8, 1981.

"Honeywood quickly grew to be the largest hamlet in the Township. With its two stores, butcher shop, two churches and hall, it, for many years, served as the centre for a prosperous farming community, and its main street, lined with tall trees, was indeed a place of beauty. Now the trees are gone and one of the churches has been torn down, but the North Dufferin Community Centre stands in the village. The stores remain, some new houses have been added and Honeywood today serves as the centre of an even larger rural area.

"Terra Nova, the last of these hamlets to come into being, received its name when a post office was established there in 1891. The name, Terra Nova (New Land), suggested by the first postmaster, John Walker, more probably by one of his sons, was accepted as the name of the new post office and thus

became the name of the hamlet. Some people, years ago, used to call it Turnover, in fact that was what it was called by a considerable number of people.

"In the days when the forests were being cleared off the hills along the valley there were sawmills at Terra Nova, and it was quite a bustling little place. But after the mills left, it settled down to be a small rural hamlet. It is near the centre of the Township and the erection of the Township's municipal buildings nearby added something towards guaranteeing that this hamlet will continue to exist.

"Mansfield got its name when a post office was opened there in 1859. While it did not grow to be as big as Honeywood, it, with its two taverns, blacksmith shop, one and sometimes two stores, quickly became the local centre for a large section of the eastern part of the Township.

"There never was a church built within the hamlet until a United Church was built there in 1925. In the earlier days, however, there were three churches close by. One of them, St. Andrew's south of the village, still remains.

"The taverns were both gone by 1900 and one store was destroyed by fire, but the one on the northwest corner, owned by Hezekiah Gilbert, remained to become the chief place of business in Mansfield with Campbell's Blacksmith Shop across the road to the south being next.

"The Orange Hall, originally erected on Lot 9,

was moved up to the hamlet sometime around 1880. This building was torn down in 1927 and a new hall erected just to the south of where it stood. In 1925, land just north of the village was purchased for a community park and in 1969 a new subdivision was laid out to the southwest of the older village. While this increased somewhat the size of the village, Mansfield has not grown much through the years. Its location on a main road, for recreation purposes, and the increase in population in the south-eastern part of the Township, would seem to ensure that it will continue to be an active and thriving little village.

"Violet Hill, though now in a hollow, is said to have gotten its name from the wild violets that grew on the hill where the 4th Line meets the South Townline, when a post office was established there in a house owned by Francis Robinson. The post office was later moved over to the hamlet that grew up in the valley just west of the 3rd Line. While many similar little villages have disappeared, and despite the fact that Highway 89 was laid out to go around it, Violet Hill is still a pleasant little hamlet.

"Many of the original hamlets have gone but subdivisions have been laid out in several places throughout the Township. Many of the houses are now summer homes but as more and more people live in them throughout the whole year, they could become the villages of the future."


