# ELECTORAL REVIEW GETS UNDERWAY

Clearview Township's Electoral Review Committee held its first meeting on Tuesday, outlining the four possible recommendations it could eventually make to Council: to reconfigure the municipality's existing ward system, to decrease the number of wards, to maintain the status quo, or to dissolve the wards in favour of an at-large system.

The committee also spent much of the night grappling with how to engage the public at large, across all demographics and the entire municipality, on the subject of electoral review, especially considering that most of the 15 or so residents who sat in the audience at

Tuesday's meeting were of retirement age and from the Creemore area.

Those members of the public were free to voice their opinions throughout the meeting, as Councillor **Brent Preston**, who was elected chair by both the committee and a show of hands from the audience, set up a meeting structure that encouraged free discussion among all present.

An initial move by Councillor Thom Paterson to have two members of the public officially sit on the committee, which also includes Councillor Deb Bronee and Mayor Ken Ferguson as an ex officio member, was rebuffed given the tight time line governing the electoral (See "Electoral" on page 3)

# Wind farm opponents ordered to pay costs

The 21 neighbours of the proposed Fairview Wind Farm who unsuccessfully sued developer wpd Canada and the two Beattie families who would host the turbines have been ordered to pay legal costs of \$107,370.78.

The plaintiffs, who had been seeking more than \$17 million in damages due to loss of property value, will instead have to pay \$68,498.59 to wpd Canada and \$38,872.19 to Beattie Brothers Farms Ltd. and Ed Beattie & Sons Ltd.

Justice **S.E. Healey**'s decision on costs, issued on Wednesday, July 24 reiterated her earlier findings that a loss in property value could not be

determined at this point, given that the Fairview Wind Farm project has yet to be approved and it is therefore impossible to know exactly what form it will take.

Healey rejected the plaintiffs' arguments that, despite losing the case, they had raised novel points of law, and that the court's decision would have valuable bearing on future cases – both acceptable defences against having to pay legal costs.

Further, Healey criticized the plaintiffs' lawyer's assertion in press releases and media interviews that a decision to hear the plaintiffs' case in the best light during the prehearing – in essence, to pretend that the

### Electoral Review Committee begins work

review process. With the Township's policy requiring that any public openings on committees of Council be advertised, Preston instead suggested that the entire scope of the electoral review be split in two. The existing Electoral Review Committee, he said, could continue without representation from the public and deal strictly with the question of wards versus no wards, making a recommendation to Council by October 21 and leaving time for any appeals of that decision to occur within the statutory 45-day period before nominations for the 2014 election get underway on January 2.

A second committee, Preston offered, could be struck to deal with roles, responsibilities and remuneration of Council members. That committee could include representation from the public and could continue its work into the new year if necessary, unhindered by the deadline imposed by the nomination period.

A motion was then passed by the committee to make a recommendation to Council at its August 12 meeting that it form this second committee.

Other decisions made Tuesday night included the setting of the Electoral Review Committee's terms of reference and the formulation of a communication plan.

The terms of reference, as passed, state that the committee will evaluate consultants' responses to the Township's Request for Proposals and report back to Council on August 12. The extent to which a consultant will be involved in the process will depend on the committee's recommendation and Council's decision. Once that decision is made, the Electoral Review Committee will "provide forums for educating and informing the community," and

"collect and compile all information received from the community concerning the four options for consideration."

As for the nature of those public forums, it was decided Tuesday night that the Committee will hold four town hall meetings during the first two weeks of September – one in Creemore, one in New Lowell, one in Nottawa and one in Stayner. Two of the meetings will take place on weekends and two will take place on different days of the week, in an effort to give people maximum opportunity to attend.

How the Township will get the word out to the public about those meetings and what's to be discussed at them was a topic of great discussion on Tuesday. While Preston and Paterson promised to write columns in the local media and everyone agreed that a concerted effort should be made to communicate to the public on Facebook and Twitter, consensus was also reached on the possibility of a direct mailing or two. A decision on that approach will be made at the Committee's next meeting, pending a report on the cost of making a Townshipwide mail drop.

Clerk **Pamela Fettes** also pointed out that a dedicated "Electoral Review" page has been set up on the Township's website (clearview.ca) and an email address, electoralreview@clearview.ca, has been established to receive comments from the public.

The Electoral Committee will next meet at 9 am on Tuesday, August 6 in the Clearview Council Chambers. The public is invited to the meeting and will be allowed to participate as the Committee opens and evaluates responses to the Township's request for proposals from consultants.


plaintiffs' points were proven in order to decide whether an actual trial was warranted – signalled any acceptance by the court that the plaintiffs had already suffered significant losses in property value.

"It is erroneous to interpret [this] as establishing a precedent for the degree of proof required to establish a decrease in property values in these circumstances," said Healey. Instead, she explained that the court had been engaged in a "legal fiction" in order to ascertain the best way forward.

In awarding the costs to wpd and the Beattie farms, Healey used the following rationale: "The plaintiffs may have a political agenda," she wrote, "but they also have private and community interest to protect, and potentially valid reasons for doing so. They should not be punished through an award of costs for attempting to vigorously advance their concerns. But nor will the defendants be required to bear the cost of those concerns when the claims were brought without foundation or basis in law at the time that they were advanced."



## Ready for round two, if necessary

Dear Editor:

In a preliminary legal challenge by we 27 local residents to wpd Canada Corp., Beattie Brothers Farms Ltd & Ed Beattie and Sons Ltd., objecting to the erection of eight, 475-foot-high, industrial wind turbines, adjacent to our properties, ironically known as the "Fairview Project," the court has awarded costs to the defendants on the basis that the court case was premature, citing that the project had not yet been

The value of our homes and the enjoyment of their use is worth fighting for. It's a fight to protect them from the monstrous incursion of wind turbines in our midst. It's not just our homes, but all the homes and businesses in the area that will be negatively affected.

Who will want to buy into an area where mammoth wind turbines are constantly churning away day and night? And how many will move away, rather than endure them? The negative impact on our community will be a lasting one.

If the Ministry of the Environment approves the project, it will be a dereliction of conscience and a complete disregard of Clearview Council's vote to denounce the project, the registered safety concerns of Collingwood Airport and the voice of Clearview constituents against it. We, as a group, are determined to deter the incursion of an economic catastrophe, caused by the greed of wpd and their host farmers, who are mindless to the effect on their neighbours. How sad, in an idyllic area such as ours where there's always been a tradition of neighbours working in each other's interest, that neighbours are now pitted against each other.

People have always been attracted to this area, and people will continue to be attracted, unless wind turbines make it become anything but a "fair view."

## The werewolves among us

A multi-generational pack of werewolves, led by the "Alpha of Creemore." A fairy pond in the middle of town, home to a door to another realm.


While these may not be features on your mental map of Creemore, they feature prominently, believe it or not, in *The Trouble With Fate* and *The Thing About Weres*, the first two installments in the *Mystwalker* series of paranormal novels by Toronto writer **Leigh Evans**.

And while she's been writing the books for a few years and has made several covert trips to town for inspiration, her appearance at Curiosity House for a reading and signing on Saturday, August 10 will be the first time she faces the residents of Creemore and explains why she chose their village as the settings for her tale of werewolves and "faes."

"I'm really nervous," said Evans in a phone conversation this week. "But also excited... I love Creemore, and I really want to be part of the community."

Evans was a mom-at-home whose kids had moved on when she struck up an online friendship with **Charlaine Harris**, the author of the *Southern Vampire Mysteries*, the books on which the popular HBO TV series *True Blood* were based.

Harris encouraged Evans to take some writing classes and entertain a

long-standing desire to write. Around that time, about seven years ago, as Evans was starting to formulate a plot, her sister came back from a day trip to Creemore and told her she just had to visit.

"I took a drive up and said, 'this is the place,'" remembers Evans. "It's off the beaten track, it has all kinds of old-world charm, there's all these artistic vibes that could easily trigger the paranormal. And besides, once I started saying 'the Alpha

of Creemore' over and over in my head – how perfect is that?"

While the first book in the series features the main character Hedi Peacock, a native of Creemore, eluding the werewolves that originate in the village, the bulk of the action takes place in and around the University of Toronto.

The second installment, just released last week, however, is set almost entirely in Creemore. And it's a Creemore that readers will recognize, as well.

"If I say a book is set in Toronto, I'm going to put as many Toronto landmarks in there as possible – and the same goes for Creemore," said Evans. "Early on, I decided that since most fantasy novels are set in the United States, I was going to make these very obviously Canadian. It's time that readers saw us up here as well."
