Campfires hot topic at Council

With a citizen petition in hand, **Doug Measures**, Councillor for Ward 1, re-opened the debate about open-air burning in the settlement areas of Creemore, New Lowell, Stayner and Nottawa.

Council revisited Clearview's Open-Air Burning Bylaw at its Monday, September 23 meeting.

Council last amended the Open-Air Burning Bylaw in December 2011. Currently, rural residents can purchase a burn permit to have an open-air fire. The bylaw prohibits residents of settlement areas from having open-air fires.

The petition, which two citizens from New Lowell and Nottawa created, contains 278 signatures from Clearview, said Measures. In total, about 300 people signed the petition, he said.

In the petition, the citizens ask Council to bring back the bylaw allowing residents of settlement areas to hold burning permits.

"People want a background campfire or barbecue," explained Councillor Measures. "It's part of our heritage as Canadians."

Alicia Savage, Deputy Mayor, disagreed. "I am against re-opening this," she stated. Savage cited improved health and air quality, and reduced pollution in the settlement areas as proof that the bylaw is working.

Acting Fire Chief Colin Shewell reported that about 2 per cent of open-air fires in rural areas result in complaints to the Clearview Township Fire Department. In 2012, the Fire Department issued 1,058 burn permits and received 23 complaints. So far this year, the Fire Department has received 13 complaints and issued 939 burn permits.

Council will use traditional and social media to engage the public on this issue, It will review the Open-Air Burning Bylaw at an upcoming meeting this fall.



See "temporary" art before it's gone

Pipes, traffic cones, road signs, caution tape. Is it art? **Ralph Hicks** thinks so.

Hicks is set to give Creemore a glimpse into his artistic process when he creates – and disassembles – an installation before viewers' eyes.

The piece, titled "Public Works," will appear at the Horticultural Garden as part of the Creemore Festival of the Arts on Saturday, October 5.

As for the form of the project, that remains a mystery – even to its creator. Hicks, who lives in Mulmur, draws his inspiration from the materials he

works with.
"I get infatuated with materials: wire, clay, styrofoam, etc., to get as many ideas as I can."

In this case, he won't know what these materials will be until he visits the Clearview Township supply yard on Friday, October 4, the day before he is scheduled to start work on the piece.

"What I do won't really be defined until the day before," Hicks explained. "It is based on what the Township won't be using on that day."

With the help of one assistant, Hicks will use the materials to build the installation. At the end of the day, they will take everything down and return the materials to the township.

This kind of art is not about making money. "It's about process. It's about using what you've got to make something that surprises and intrigues people. There is something fun about building something that's temporary," Hicks said.

The idea for "Public Works" sprang from the sight of a pile of bright yellow sewer pipes, which Hicks noticed at the side of the road one day.

When Clearview Township gave him permission to borrow materials for the installation, he visited the supply yard and saw "all sorts of neat stuff, such as road signs and traffic pylons," he said.

Hicks hopes that the piece inspires other people to create art using a similar process next year.

"I'd like people to say, 'Hey, I can do that in my own backyard!"



LETTER

John Gruetzner's long letter on the number of Clearview wards and councillors misses the point that the current study of the ward system at a cost of approximately \$37,000 is a complete waste of taxpayer dollars.

I would bet one of those dollars that when the dust settles nothing will change: we will still have seven councillors as well as a mayor and deputy mayor, all continuing to ignore the serious financial problems being faced by the Township. The ward study is akin to rearranging the deck chairs on the Titanic while the ship is sinking.

Why is that the case? Using statistics from the Township's

website, it is clear that over the past 12 years Clearview Township, under the direction of most of the current councillors and mayor, has experienced zero population growth. Overall, Simcoe County population grew by 5.7% from 2006 to 2011, while Clearview's dropped by 2.5%. Clearview population has continued to stagnate since then. However, the bad news is that not only are people leaving Clearview, but no one is coming here as a permanent resident.

The really bad news is that over the past 10 years of declining population growth, Clearview Council has increased our real estate taxes and water/sewage taxes by almost 50%.

And those taxes will continue to increase to pay for a larger staff, larger staff salaries and benefits as well as uncontrolled spending by a management with little or no true oversight by Council.

At what point, I wonder, will the voters realize that we have councillors who do not seem to care and who have no idea how to manage a cost spiral that is clearly out of control? Sadly, our mayor and the Council he leads are forgetting or ignoring their responsibilities to the taxpayers of Clearview Township. At the same time, the "family," as the Mayor likes to call the staff, are all being well looked after in terms of

salaries, pension and other benefits.

From my perspective, the question is not whether we should have more or fewer councillors, or about \$37,000 of our money that is being wasted on consultants who will tell us what we already know. The real question is when is Clearview Council going to take its responsibilities seriously and accept accountability for managing the Township on behalf of taxpayers. Taxpayers who must surely be losing patience and getting angry about a situation that is only going to get worse while the municipalities around us continue to thrive. Sad indeed!

This was our 12 noon pot luck lunch day and 25 or so partook of a delicious luncheon that was described as "a great meal – a bit heavy with desserts."


After the clean-up crew finished with their magic, the 50/50 draws went to **Phyllis Seed**, **Ron**


Great Northern Ex right as rain


The same year, she challenged the men of the fair to make a quilt. They responded with a quilt that was raffled off for \$3,000 for the fair.







Schoolhouse celebrates its centenary

To celebrate the 100th birthday of the Caine's Corners Section #8 Schoolhouse, its current residents, Mike and Connie Leishman, invite the public to an open house on Saturday, September 28 and Sunday, September 29 from 10 am to 5 pm.

The last time the building operated as a schoolhouse was in 1967. Before then, about 35 children ages 5-18 attended grades 1-8 there each year.

"More children went to school in the winter because they were helping on the farms during the spring and fall," explained Jim Harkness, who will be speaking about the schoolhouse on Saturday.

To mark the occasion, Harkness has been collecting stories from former students. So far, he has heard about escaping from the schoolhouse's back room while waiting to receive the strap; playing "cowboys and Indians" around the pine trees that were planted in the 1930s; and going down to the scary basement for activities on Hallowe'en.

One of these students, John McNiven, attended the one-room schoolhouse from 1944-1951. His mother worked as the custodian, so he would arrive at 6 am to light the furnace so the room would be warm by the time everyone arrived at 9 am.

McNiven, who was born and raised across the street from the schoolhouse, still lives there. He remembers enjoying what he learned at the school as well as the great teachers it had.

He played baseball and crokinole and sung in the choir conducted the music teacher, Mrs. Bell. When Mrs. Bell entered the choir in the Kiwanis Music Festival in Toronto, McNiven said, "she asked George Pifher and I not to sing."

He doesn't seem offended. "We ended up winning first place!"




