

DAIRY FARMERS CHEESED OFF

A new trade agreement making it much easier for European cheese manufacturers to sell their products in Canada has set a dangerous precedent that could spell doom for this country's dairy industry, says Clearview dairy farmer **John Miller**.

Last week, Ottawa agreed to allow more than twice the amount of European cheese into this country without tacking on the previous high tariffs of more than 200 per cent.

Lending his voice to the Dairy Farmers of Canada, which represents Canada's 12,529 dairy farmers, Miller, owner of Jalon Farms near Creemore, warned that the agreement sets the stage for another deal, the Trans-Pacific Partnership, which will further damage Canada's dairy industry.

The Trans-Pacific Partnership is a free-trade agreement that opens up markets between Canada, Mexico, Australia, Brunei, Chile, Malaysia, New Zealand, Peru, Singapore, the U.S. and Vietnam. Canada formally joined the Trans-Pacific Partnership trade negotiations one year ago.

Once the Europeans have open access to the Canadian market, other countries in the Trans-Pacific Partnership will want to follow suit, Miller said.

"From our perspective, if the EU trade deal is a dark cloud that came over the industry, the Trans-Pacific is the storm that will hit us," said Miller. "Now that the EU has significant access to the Canadian market, the other countries will want it, too."

But Simcoe-Grey MP, **Dr. Kellie Leitch**, said although there will be changes, the Canadian government will support the farmers through them.

The government is expected to develop the details of the EU agreement over the next few years.

At the signing of the EU agreementin-principle in Brussels last Friday, Prime Minister **Stephen Harper** said Ottawa will compensate dairy farmers if they lose sales.

"Our farmers will be supported through new markets," said Dr. Leitch. "This area exports a lot to feed Ontario and Canada, and now that is going to extend to Europe."

Has shy Singhampton ghost gone to "the other side"?

The owner of a haunted Singhampton restaurant wonders whether its ghost has finally followed the light.

Sandy Hamilton, owner of Mylar and Loreta's Restaurant, says she hasn't seen the ghost she calls Mylar since last spring, when she felt a presence and saw a shadow pass by.

Mylar and Loreta's is located in Singhampton's first tavern, which was built in the 1850s by Cyrus Sing to house travellers and survey crews who came to town. In recent decades it has operated as a hotel and a general store, and changed hands many times. Hamilton purchased it in 1983 and has

been running it as a restaurant ever since.

She says Mylar has been absent for long periods before, which always causes her to question whether she has seen him for the last time.

The wayward ghost first appeared about four months after Hamilton purchased the building.

He usually appears early in the morning or late at night, she says. Hamilton can tell it is Mylar because he is tall and thin and he always wears dark pants, a red plaid shirt and suspenders.

But Mylar is sneaky. Whenever Hamilton tries to focus on his face, she

says he disappears.

The restaurant takes its name from a tale in which two lovers, Mylar and Loreta, are separated when Mylar comes to Singhampton to "find his fame and fortune."

After settling in the new land, he sends for Loreta to join him. But she never makes it; her ship goes down at sea. Mylar, however, never stops dreaming of her and may now roam the restaurant awaiting her return.

Hamilton says that Mylar has never frightened her. "I believe in life after death," she explains.

However, one customer swore she (See "Ghost" on page 3)



Unlike European dairy farmers, who are heavily subsidized by the EU, Canadian dairy farmers do not receive government subsidies. As a result, dairy products are much less expensive in Europe than they are in Canada.

"One hundred per cent of dairy income comes from the marketplace in Canada," Miller explained. "Our product is more expensive because it's the actual cost of making it. [Our system] is extremely efficient and competitive, but we can't compete with the Europeans because they subsidize."

"[In the EU deal, Canadians] gave up significant market share for EU cheese," said Miller, whose 120 Jersey cows produce milk for bottled milk and milk products including cheese. "This will reduce our industry's quotas by $2\frac{1}{4}$ per cent. If I'm milking 100 cows, then I'm going to milk $2\frac{1}{4}$ less cows as a result.

"By signing this deal, we have moved from a nonsubsidized industry to a subsidized industry. Dairy farmers have been fighting these deals for 25 years."

Miller is also concerned about declining milk production in this country. With more cheese coming to Canada from Europe, Canada will need less milk to produce its own cheese.

"[Canadian dairy farmers are] losing the market for cheese made in Canada," he said. "This is really bad for the dairy industry."

In addition, European regulations that prohibit farmers from feeding genetically modified foods to their animals will make it difficult for Canadian farmers to send their products to Europe, Miller said.

Under Canadian regulations, farmers are permitted to feed their animals genetically modified foods.

"That is a barrier that is not under the trade agreement," said Miller. "Europe is very happy to give us access to their market because they know we wouldn't be able to send it over there."

Once, Hamilton saw a man standing at the back door. But when she asked, "Can we help you?" he disappeared.


at the window at the kitchen.


Perhaps Mylar is shy. "He doesn't come when we're really busy," Hamilton says.

Province sings praises of volunteer

For the past 26 years, Creemore's **Norma Friest** has been "keeping the music alive" for countless kids at Nottawasaga and Creemore Public School (NCPS). Now the province's Ministry of Citizenship and Immigration has recognized her dedication with a Senior Achievement Award.

The award recognizes seniors who have made an outstanding contribution to their community through voluntary or professional activities. It is Ontario's highest honour for seniors over 65.

With characteristic modesty, Friest, a longtime community volunteer, said she was surprised when she learned she had won an award. "I'm very honoured, but I don't like the publicity," she said.

Kathy Whitley, a former teacher at NCPS, nominated Friest for her work managing the school's instrumental music program, encouraging afterschool activities and promoting the importance of accepting people with different abilities.

As well, Friest has been raising funds for musical instruments for the school since 1986.

As Chairman of the Band Association at the school, Friest organizes fundraising events such as silent auctions. The group is currently holding a poinsettia sale for December.

"I think children need music," Friest told the *Echo* this week. "I think it teaches them to interact together, and to enjoy something that's extremely gifted. Music also takes away barriers like race or handicaps."

And music is not her only passion. At NCPS, where she has volunteered for 23 years, Friest works with students from kindergarten to grade 8 who need extra help in subjects such as math and English.

"I enjoy it or I wouldn't be doing it," Friest explained simply.


At a ceremony and reception on Monday, October 21 in Toronto, **Lieutenant Governor David Langley** presented Friest and 20 other recipients with their awards.

While Creemore is hoping to fill every seat at the International Festival of Authors (IFOA) event on Saturday, one chair will remain conspicuously empty.


The "Empty Chair," which is placed onstage alongside the four featured authors, stands for one writer whose voice has been silenced.


This year, the chair will represent Eskinder Nega, a jailed Ethiopian journalist and blogger who advocates for freedom of expression, publicly calling for an end to political corruption and repression in that country.

For the last 19 years, Pen Canada has placed an Empty Chair onstage at all IFOA events in place of a writer who is not permitted to travel freely. In the past, IFOA Empty Chairs have "sat" in for Nigerian activist Ken Saro Wiwa and Iranian blogger Hossein Derakhshan.

PEN Canada is a nonpartisan organization of writers that promotes literature, fights censorship, helps free persecuted writers from prison, and helps writers living in exile in Canada. It works with others to defend freedom of expression as a basic human right, at home and abroad.

During Saturday's event at Station on the Green, Creemore will welcome four writers who are able to travel around the world to attend writer's festivals, from Ireland, Canada and the U.S. They will read from their new works and participate in a discussion moderated





by Curiosity House Books manager, Jenn Hubbs.

Janet E. Cameron will present her debut novel, Cinnamon Toast and the End of the World. The Halifaxborn author has spent the last 10 years in Ireland, where the book won the Irish Writers' Centre Novel Fair Competition.

Born in South Africa, Lewis De Soto moved to Canada as a teenager. His first novel, A Blade of Grass, was an international bestseller and was longlisted for both the Man Booker Prize and the Prix du Meilleur Livre *Étranger*. He is also the author of a biography of the painter Emily Carr. On Saturday, he will read from his new work, The Restoration Artist.

Time magazine called American author Sam Lipsyte "the most consistently funny fiction writer working today." His new short story collection, The Fun Parts, promises even more laughs. Lipsyte is a New York Times-bestselling author and the winner of the first annual Believer Book Award. His writing has appeared in The New Yorker, Tin House and the Los Angeles Times.

Council briefs

APPROVED

New ward boundaries

At its Monday, October 21 meeting, Council voted to dissolve the municipality's existing wards, redivide the municipality into wards and consider ward boundary realignments as a result of the recent electoral review. At the meeting, Thom Paterson, Councillor for Ward 4, requested an amendment to the boundaries between Wards 2 and 5 on Riverside Drive.

Bridge rebuild

Council supported the rebuilding of the Collingwood Street bridge in Creemore (into a two-lane bridge) as well as the commemoration of the old bridge structure. It did not accept the application to designate the bridge as a heritage structure.

Viewscape protection

Council approved Clearview Heritage Conservation Project's plan to protect the viewscape over the westerly half of the Township, looking to and from the Niagara Escarpment corridor, from the disturbance of proposed large, non-farm development, under the Ontario Heritage Act.

Dog licence fee increase

The fees for dog licences will increase in 2014 and 2015 to keep pace with inflation. This will be the first fee increase since 2005.

Workplace respect policy

To support Clearview's goal to be a progressive employer and a desirable place to work, Clearview Township has developed a Respect in the Workplace policy that complies with the Occupational Health and Safety Code Act and the Human Rights Code. Under the policy, employers are responsible for preventing workplace violence, harassment and discriminatory behaviour. They are also expected to take every necessary precaution for protecting the safety of their employees.

Accessibility plan and policy


Council approved a Multi-Year Accessibility Plan and Corporate Accessibility Policy for Clearview to identify, remove and prevent barriers for people with disabilities, and ensure equal access opportunities to Clearview's goods, services, facilities and employment. Financial help for high school grads

Every year, thousands of dollars in university scholarship money go wasted because students don't know the money exists. Ray's Place, Creemore's youth centre, wants to change that.

Ray's Place is a youth resource centre that helps kids ages 13 to 17 stay in

Beginning this Sunday, grade 12 students and their parents can attend workshops to learn about scholarships, bursaries and grants, budgeting, creating applications, cover letters, essays and resumes. The sessions will also help students develop skills for postsecondary program interviews.

The workshops are open to all students in Clearview Township who are considering post-secondary education.

Also, for the third year in a row, Ray's Place will offer a \$20,000 scholarship to one student from Clearview to contribute toward their post-secondary

Last year, the youth centre received 15 applications for the scholarship, which is funded through private donations.

"That's a one-in-fifteen shot of winning," says Corey Finkelstein, Manager of Ray's Place. "It's really good – so you may as well apply!"

Finkelstein also says the Rent-A-Youth program is still in high-gear and is available for fall clean-up projects such as raking leaves, garden work and helping winter tenants move in.

Rent-A-Youth is a work program in which students are linked with shortterm, part-time, hourly jobs in Creemore and the surrounding area.

"Unlike other employers, Ray's Place provides support for your family life

in 2007, Rent-A-Youth will continue during the winter months and year round "This is our most successful Rent-A-Youth year to date," Finkelstein said.



Clearview's own music man brings the community together

Gren Bray, the stage and musical director for Clearview Community Theatre, says that his latest production, "The Music Man," has "taken over his life."

Luckily, he doesn't seem to mind.

"I can't even begin to guess how much time I spend organizing shows every year," he said on the telephone between final rehearsals at Nottawasaga Community Hall in Duntroon earlier this week. Because each show requires so much work, he "only" puts on one per year.

"The Music Man," by Meredith Wilson, is a story about a con man (played by Ken Wilson, pictured at right) who poses as a boys' band leader and risks being caught when he falls in love with the local librarian.

Bray said the theatre group chose the musical, which was written in the 1950s, because its plot and dialogue are kid-friendly, and it has many parts for different age groups. "We have built a reputation for presenting family entertainment, so people count on us to be able to bring their kids."

This is Bray's 13th major production. He started producing musicals when he was an elementary school teacher in the early 1980s. Since retiring in 2001, he has followed his passion for community theatre full-time.


"I want to give everyone – but especially youth – the opportunity to figure out what they like about theatre," he said. "Youth theatre is my passion, but I wanted to take it a step further and open it up to more people."



So, in 1996, Bray started Clearview Community Theatre, a group whose goal is to bring all age groups together to create a supportive environment for local productions, with a special emphasis on youth theatre.

Auditions are usually held about four months before the show. No experience is necessary to try out.


The current production has 40 cast members, ranging in age from seven to senior citizen. For some in the troupe, this is their first stage production.


Last year, the figure skaters teamed up with members of Stayner Minor Hockey. This time, the pairs include hockey players from Collingwood, too.

There will be 13 pairs in this year's competition. For the first time, more hockey players applied to participate in the Battle of the Blades than the Skating Club could accommodate.


"For the first couple of years it was harder to find hockey players. But now the hockey players talk about how much fun they have, so this year there are more," Trott explained.




