INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT FOR MULMUR BY 2018

After a year in development, the Township of Mulmur has approved its first-ever Strategic Plan.

A blueprint for the future, the plan outlines five goals for the Township to achieve by 2018: to grow its residential and industrial/commercial development; increase awareness about Mulmur as a destination for recreation; improve local access to services; establish funding guidelines and cost-efficient purchasing protocols for major and recurring expenses; and increase public participation in Township governance and volunteerism.

"The Strategic Plan is very important because it is going to give Council direction over the next five years," said Mulmur Mayor **Paul Mills**. "It will give the Councillors focus."

Titled "Mulmur's Thriving Future," the plan sets out a vision of a Township that balances rural life with responsible economic and social development for all residents.

It contains the goal of increasing business in the area by 2 to 10 per cent and includes the recommendation to form a Development Committee. Whether this will be a Committee of Council or a community group remains to be decided by Council.

A Steering Committee headed by **Keith Lowry** and guided by **Sue Powell** of the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs, spent the past year gathering public input through surveys and Town Hall meetings. As well, the Committee considered feedback from emails it received and from public meetings held throughout 2013.

The respondents and participants included long-term residents, new-comers, weekenders, farmers and business people, who voiced opinions on such issues as traffic, agricultural heritage, land-use planning and working with other municipalities.

"We needed to have a broad-based sense of community values, issues and beliefs," said Lowry. "We were delighted about the quality and quantity of responses and suggestions."

"A key finding from the surveys," said Lowry, "is that Mulmur's beauty attracts people and keeps people." But, he added, "The composition of the Township has changed over the last 15 years. An increasing number of

Seeing the past with your very own eyes

For the past two years, one Grade 12 Centre Dufferin District High School (CDDHS) student has seen history through a local World War II veteran's eyes. Recently, he had the opportunity to see it through his own.

learning about the wartime experiences of **George Bist**, a 97-year-old family friend who lives in Dufferin Oaks in Shelburne. By talking to Bist about his early life, Hallett learned how he enlisted in the army and trained for war, as well as military history, straight from someone who was there.

Bist's daughter, **Candice Bist**, also gave Hallett other records including maps and information about her father's involvement creating the Canadian flag.

"It forces us teenagers to actually acknowledge that the past isn't just a story," said Hallett. "It happened and it happened to these people."

The research was part of a two-year program at CDDHS, which culminated in a tour of battlefields and war memorials in Belgium, Germany, Austria and France. During the trip, each student presented their research on an (See "Taking" on page 7)







people began as weekenders and became permanent residents."

He said that many people come to Mulmur who aren't totally bound by the area's agricultural past. However, Lowry says the attitude from the more established families is an open one. "I've seen the openness of families who have been here for a long time to have new people come in and take part in the community," he said.

The Steering Committee found that while costs of services are rising, tax revenues are projected to remain stable or decline. And it found that meeting the diverse needs of Mulmur's demographic mix will present a special set of challenges in the coming years.

The Strategic Plan has been drawn up to meet these challenges.

One way the Plan addresses the rising cost of delivering services is to integrate resources in Mulmur. For instance, the Honeywood Arena at the North Dufferin Community Centre and the Mansfield baseball park currently have two separate recreational boards. Under the Plan, the two facilities will be centralized under one board; a move that will save money and help integrate the two communities.

"The idea is to let people from Mansfield know what is going on in Honeywood, what facilities the two areas have, and vice versa," Mills said.

The proposed Primrose Business Park, which is located at the intersection of Highway 10 South and Highway 89, has been part of the Township's Official Plan (which the province mandates) for years. Now, the establishment of the Business Park is part of the Strategic Plan, too.

Mills said the Plan also includes initiatives intended to get people more involved in the Township by encouraging them to join committees and volunteer for local events.

"Community spirit has been lost over the years," said Mills. "Sometimes new people move in and they don't get to know the older people. We need to get people aware of what's going on and get them out."

He would particularly like to see greater participation from area youth. To that end, the Strategic Plan will hire a Recreational Coordinator or appoint a member of the community to coordinate recreational activities in the Township.

"We want to get youth involved," said Mills, adding that he would like to see a 15- or 16-year-old on the Recreational Committee so Council could hear their perspective.

The new Strategic Plan is the result of Mayor Paul Mills's promise to create one during his 2010 election campaign.

Fairview wind project ready for comment

On Wednesday, December 4, the Ministry of the Environment deemed wpd's project application for Clearview "complete." This means that the wind energy company has submitted the required forms and applications to the Ministry, and a full technical review of the application has begun, said **Kevin Surette**, a spokesperson for wpd.

The Fairview Wind Project, which consists of eight turbines west of Stayner (see map, below), will produce an estimated 39,838,000 kWh annually for the local electricity grid, which is equivalent to the average annual power use of 2,276 homes, wpd's website says.

This application was posted on the Ministry of the Environment's Environmental Registry website on Tuesday, December 3 for a 60-day public review and comment period.



LETTER Dufferin Wind Power

Dufferin Wind Power would like to correct some serious errors in the letter written by **John Wiggins** of Collingwood and published in your paper on Friday, November 21 entitled, "Manure doesn't polish."

Firstly, the decision to form a Community Liaison Committee (CLC) was not made in order to simply "put a good face on the project." It is a condition of the Renewable Energy Approval given to DWPI by the Ministry of Environment. Dillon Consulting is proceeding with forming the CLC to help Dufferin Wind Power fulfill this obligation.

Secondly, Dufferin Wind Power Inc. has committed to decommissioning the project and has guaranteed it by posting a decommissioning security with the Township of Melancthon as part of the agreement made with the Township. The project will not be abandoned.

Thirdly, the concrete foundations for each turbine are between 16 and 18.5 meters in diameter, not 30 as stated in the letter.

Lastly, Ontario needs clean, renewable energy for today and for the future and it needs to have more than one source for reliability. Wind energy is a natural partner with hydro, another valuable energy asset. The wind blows strongest in winter when water reservoirs are lowest; water reserves are often highest when wind resources are typically lower.



Crazy weather kept many away this week, as well as the big euchre tournament in Wasaga Beach, but we had a good time anyway.


We had seven full tables for cards and there were four moon shots played by Jim Rigney, Phyllis Seed and Isabelle Gubbels, and

Taking the history lesson out of the classroom

Ontario veteran at the Juno Beach
Centre in Normandy.

The program is run by **Neil Orford**, who has taught history at CDDHS since 1997. CDDHS has a formal partnership with the Dufferin County Museum and Archives in Mulmur. In November, Orford won a Governor General's History Award for Excellence in Teaching Canadian History.

"Canadians have always had the difficulty of defining an identity for themselves," says Orford. "In the difficulties and sacrifices that came before us, we find a common purpose. As a history teacher, I have a duty to make these connections for kids. The reward of it is that you get to be part of seeing how it will change the kids' lives."

Orford got the idea for the "Batallion Tour" in 2006 when he met a D-Day veteran named **Ken Wallace**. After hearing Wallace's story, Orford began collecting the names and stories of veterans in Dufferin County on his own. When he had about 700 stories, he donated his work to the Dufferin County Museum, where he was a board member.

"Dufferin doesn't have a World War II memorial, or one for the Korean War, for that matter," Orford says. By archiving students' research, he says the museum is able to make it available for the next generation.

In an effort to honour the veterans, Orford decided to reach out to the Juno Beach Centre, which is based in Burlington. Then, he made the research part of the high school curriculum.

Now, Grade 10 students choose a veteran and learn about their story by meeting people (such as the veteran's family members) and conducting research.

"I realized I could teach the students through the museum how to be local archivists, and how to make that part of a very broad great Canadian narrative. It's something you could never do in a classroom."

This year, 35 Grade 12 students accompanied Orford to Europe where they visited Dieppe, Ypres, Juno Beach, Vimy Ridge, Dachau and Nuremberg.

"The tour was more than a trip to Europe, however – more than a chance to shop and see some landmarks," explained Hallett. "We knew that we were in Europe to

remember the veterans of the two World Wars more than to gawk at scenery and landmarks."

In Dieppe, Hallett layed a wreath at the Remembrance Day service there. "As we laid the wreath down, the weight of the memorial's names became heavier than that of the eyes on me. Nothing came easier to me in that moment than bowing my head in simple and personal respect," he said

The cost of the trip for each student was \$5,000 plus meals. Hallett spent the last two years raising the money by working different jobs at Curiosity House Books, the Mansfield Ski Club and the Terra Nova pub.

For Hallett, the effects of the trip will last a lifetime. "All the places you hear and read about in history are actual places. Seeing them as real places and not as imagined concepts is striking."

After returning from the trip, Hallett wrote down some of his recollections. Here is his impression of visiting Germany's Dachau concentration camp:

"We all had a feeling of trepidation about entering this former concentration camp. But I couldn't have anticipated the effect it would have. Walking in through those black iron gates, I felt as if I'd been punched. The silence was instant and painful. It

swallowed sounds such as footsteps and breathing, but amplified voices until they seemed painfully loud. The camp had a chill that soon had me shivering, and after 10 minutes there I felt as if someone had been screaming. Some of the monuments built for the

victims were powerful enough that I had to resist turning on my heel and running away from them.

"I am glad that our tour visited the camp, however that does not mean that I was reluctant in anyway to leave it behind."

Get home safely with RIDE

Constable **Mark Kinney** is concerned you might not get it.

Kinney, who works with the Huronia West detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) in Wasaga Beach, would like to remind citizens not to avoid any Reduced Impaired Driving Everywhere (RIDE) programs they encounter during the holidays.

"I don't think people grasp the concept of RIDE," he says. "If the OPP stops you at a RIDE, you will get home. But if you circumvent a RIDE program and you have had too much to drink, you could get into a collision and even kill yourself."

The repercussions of drunk driving go past the person behind the wheel of the car, Kinney says. "It goes beyond the criminal aspect. It's about your safety, the safety of your neighbours and of your community."

On Friday, November 29, the OPP held a RIDE program on Frances Street West in Creemore at 3:30 pm. Of the 60 vehicles the OPP officers checked, not one driver was found to be under the influence of alcohol.

"It's a success," says Kinney. "It is very positive that we checked so many vehicles and found that everybody was conscious of being safe on the road and not drinking and driving."

Afternoon checks are just as important as having RIDE programs at night, Kinney says. "People drink at different times of the day. One-year results from our research showed that almost as many individuals drink in the morning as in the afternoon and at night."

Kinney also mentioned that alcohol addiction or substance abuse issues can rear their ugly heads at any time of the day. As well, some people might consume alcohol until the early morning hours, and still have it in their system when they wake up.

"At this time of year, it is not uncommon for people in the holiday spirit drink at lunch or in the afternoon," adds Kinney. "It can be easy to consume too much alcohol at a festive event before realizing you shouldn't drive home."

Local Food Act passes; tax credit for farmers

Earlier this month, the Legislative Assembly of Ontario passed *Bill 36, Local Food Act, 2013*.

The Act is part of the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs' (OMAFRA's) efforts to promote the consumption of local food. Bill 36 also amended the *Taxation Act, 2007* to create a non-refundable tax credit of 25 per cent for farmers who donate their agricultural products to eligible community food programs such as food banks.

OMAFRA says that the Act is meant to foster successful and resilient local food economies and systems in Ontario; help increase awareness of local food in Ontario; and develop new markets for local food.

The Ministry also reports the Act will help build Ontario's economy, create more jobs, and expand the agri-food sector, by making more local food available in markets, schools, cafeterias, grocery stores and restaurants throughout the province.

Under the Act, the Minister of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs, the Honourable **Kathleen Wynne**, will establish local food goals and targets, in consultation with interested organizations.


It was my pleasure to share coffee with her recently, and to glean a few highlights from her about her life.

hobbies include knitting, reading, tai chi, yoga, snowshoeing, hiking and....oh yes, I neglected to mention her love for Zumba.


Deirdre and John love to travel. Having recently returned from a trip to Eastern Europe and Roatan, Honduras, they are currently arranging artifacts in their new home.





159 birthday cards for Sylvia's 75th

Sometimes the smallest thing can cause a ripple effect, which can be felt across Canada.

Take Canada Post, for instance. With a declining market and rising costs, the business is struggling to survive in today's world of email and instant messaging.

The "Avening ripple" started innocently enough. We simply wanted to plan a large 75th surprise birthday party (from three provinces away – we live in Alberta) without a very sharp lady (our Mom, Sylvia Gale) finding out about it.

Due to her recent health issues, it was almost immediately scaled back to having a dozen close friends over to the house for lunch. That still didn't sit right with us kids, as we had tried to throw a birthday bash for her five years previously and she had promptly shut us down saying she "didn't want any fuss" over her and besides, "I quit having birthdays years ago."

With help from the staff at *The Creemore Echo*, a request to the community was strategically placed beneath Sylvia's "Big Heart Seniors" column in the Friday, October 18 edition, asking people to send a "snail mail" birthday card to Sylvia, in the hopes of getting 75 cards.

Now, mail pranks are not new to our family, the Jordans. In 1997, our Aunt Joyce (Miller, née Jordan) was having her own health battles, so we started the "Letters from the West" campaign to cheer her up.

Aunt Joyce was notorious for using a dishcloth that should have bypassed the rag bag and gone straight into the garbage bin, so in our eyes this was a needed item. A local store had a sale on 10-packs of dischloths, so we each grabbed a dishcloth, addressed the envelope (*sans* return address) and mailed it off.

The prank instantly snowballed with co-workers addressing envelopes stuffed with dishcloths for us, friends taking envelopes with them on trips to mail

from Abu Dhabi, England, France, Thailand, Australia and yes, even Creemore. We even arranged for one to be stamped "Return to Sender" with her own address as the return address. Over 60 dishcloths travelled to Feversham that summer via Canada Post.

Sylvia's first birthday card arrived with her *Echo* on Friday, October 18 and she commented what a great bunch they were up at the *Echo* to remember her birthday, although they were a bit early. Then she read the paper. At that point I suspect she (calmly) remarked "**Warren**! Those young buggers!" and reached for the phone to start the interrogation of each of the "Wicked Westerners" a.k.a the kids in the west to try to ascertain guilt.

On Monday, the post box held a single card from the west (mailed the week before). On Tuesday, another card from the west, and on Wednesday, Prime Minister **Stephen Harper**'s Certificate of Congratulations was joined by four more birthday cards.

A prized card simply read, "You don't know me, but I read your column every week! **Scott**." Others mentioned Sylvia being "a special person in my youth memory bank"; tales of sitting at the kitchen table

enjoying "conversations, stories and most fondly your Magic Tablecloth" and her warmth and kindness in the community. Many mention the laughter, good food, rowdy card games and "door's always open" acceptance that was found at Sylvia and Warren's.

Ten days later, Sylvia had received many, many cards; each one opened, comments treasured as she marvelled that **Tyler/J'bai/Bryce/Grace** would take the time to send her a card, when they all had such busy lives. She mentioned that postage was 63 cents for a Canadian stamp these days.

A day or two later, when Mom was so very tired at the hospital, we asked her if she wanted us to open the cards that had arrived that day and read them to her. She said, "No, I don't think so, I'll get to them." So her hospital wall became a colourful mural of birthday cards and unopened envelopes.

A lone, final card arrived on the day of Sylvia's funeral and joined the 158 birthday cards already posted on the wall of the Creemore Legion. A comment was overheard that "we had somehow single-handedly managed to save Canada Post from bankruptcy." I can hear her chuckle now.






