

NEW MEDI-MARIJUANA FACILITY AWAITS LICENCE

Since the 1860s, the Miller Family has been farming in the Creemore area. Now, Peter Miller is continuing the family's agricultural traditions – but with a different twist.

Miller's Creemore-based company, Agripharm Corp, has built a stateof-the-art facility in Cashtown on his uncle John Miller's farm (Jalon Farms/Miller's Dairy). The facility is part of Agripharm's application to become a licensed producer of medical marijuana under Health Canada's newest "Marihuana for Medical Purposes Regulations" program.

Miller, who is 26, grew up in Toronto and spent his childhood summers on the family farm in Creemore. After completing a Bachelor of Commerce degree at Ryerson University, he worked as an Early Stage Investment and Business Development Manager in technology and film. In 2012, he read a series of articles about the legalization of marijuana in Colorado at the same time that Health Canada issued a document about upcoming changes to the medical

marijuana industry in this country.

Miller saw it all as a new and exciting business opportunity.

"Like everybody, I was interested [in medical marijuana] from a pop culture standpoint, but once I started reading more about the science and how many people had improved their quality of life by using cannabis as medicine, I became interested in learning more. Like any other opportunity that I found exciting. I did a deep dive into every aspect of the industry and tried to soak up as much information as I could."

The long and detailed process of applying for a producer's licence began in early June 2013, and now Agripharm is in the final stages of completing its application.

To date, the production facility has been built and includes 20,000 square feet of cultivation space. While this is a large-scale operation for cannabis, it is small in comparison to most agricultural operations, Miller says.

This candidate also said he would make improvements to the baseball diamond and build a food court.

"[The students] did an amazing job," said Fettes. "Not surprisingly, their suggestions focused on sports and the library - places where kids are."

To simulate a real, grown-up election, Fettes and Falls gave each child a paper ballot to fill out behind a privacy screen, before dropping it into the ballot box.

Next, the votes were read out and counted in front of everyone by a student who was selected specifically for the task.

The candidate with great plans for the Arena came out ahead. "We had a lot of hockey players and figure skaters in the class," explained Fettes.

In a discussion about the importance of voting, the students said that voting gives people a voice and leads to important decision-making in the community.

They also felt that voters must believe in the people they elect.

As well, the Grade 5 students addressed the role of the School Board Trustee in making decisions about schools such as theirs, and safety.

Fettes hopes that children will take the "voting is important" message home to their parents in preparation of fall's municipal election.

"At the end of the visit we asked them to name three things to say to parents about voting," she said. "We are hoping this will lead to conversations between children and their parents."

Fettes plans to hold mock elections at New Lowell Central School, Nottawa Elementary School and Stayner Collegiate Institute. She last visited NCPS in October 2013 during Local Government Week and is hoping to return again in the fall.

our product, so we will sell at a fair price and our output will be determined by market demand. We have invested heavily in our electrical infrastructure, and designed our building and equipment in a modular fashion that allows for, and anticipates, rapid expansion if the market calls for it," says Miller.

Agripharm has hired an experienced biologist from the University of Toronto to head up its Quality Assurance Program and has a sophisticated system of recording and tracking every plant it will produce. The facility itself has a modern security system, including infrared cameras, motion detectors and a high razorwire fence surrounding the premises.

Throughout the application and business development process, Miller has worked hard to support the local economy and access local expertise.

"My goal from the start has been to stay as local as possible in terms of building the business and the physical plant," explains Miller. "We have injected seven figures into the Clearview economy so far, the majority of which has been spent within a short distance of the facility itself. We have taken every effort to source our aggregates, concrete, labour, and trades from local suppliers and have been incredibly impressed. We will continue to source our human resources locally, and intend to train a team of skilled workers under our head grower from Colorado over the next year, with the goal of those team members training additional team members under them. Luckily, there is a deep pool of green thumbs and agricultural expertise in the area."

Agripharm will become the second large-scale producer of medical marijuana in Clearview Township. Peace Naturals, located near Wasaga Beach, opened their doors for business in November 2013 as Canada's first licensed producer under Health Canada's new MMPR Program.

Agripharm will host a question-and-answer session for the public once they receive their licence.

Leitch posts condolence book for mentor, friend Flaherty

Simcoe-Grey MP, Dr. Kellie Leitch, has set up a book of condolences on her website for the late Jim Flaherty, Canada's Minister of Finance who died on April 10.

In a statement from her office, Leitch credited Flaherty with her entrance into politics. "Jim encouraged me to get involved in politics and was the most dedicated mentor that a person could ask for... He was my champion."

Leitch, who lives in the same Ottawa condominium building as Flaherty did, attempted to resuscitate him from the heart attack that killed him. Both Leitch and Flaherty also have properties in the Creemore area.

In a tribute to Flaherty in the House of Commons in Ottawa, Leitch, who is also the Minister of Labour and Status of Women, said: "For me, I can speak to him being my champion on two specific occasions. I was at a conference in Albuquerque, New Mexico of all places in 2006. He was a newly minted Finance Minister. He called me and asked me if I would chair a panel on the Children's Fitness Tax Credit. He said to me that they needed some health expertise, and that did not exist at Finance Canada. He wanted someone from the health care profession.

"The opportunity that he granted me in doing

that, a young Canadian, a Canadian who was but 35 years of age, was that I had my first experience of the development of excellent public policy. I could take my professional background and apply it to public policy, and millions of Canadians became the beneficiary."

She went on to explain how Flaherty's persistence led to her decision to run for office, which was, she admitted, "not something I was wont to do."

Flaherty held the federal Finance post since 2003, but retired in March to return to the private sector after experiencing health issues. To sign Leitch's book of condolences, visit www.kellieleitchmp.com.





April is National Poetry Month, and who better to celebrate with than Creemore's own Poet Laureate, Tim Armour, who brings us a treatise on the terrors of the text message; a subject that never ceases to make him sore...

"Carry on, Carrion"

I am living with misgivings That our culture has now faltered I despair we can repair the mess Unless our course is altered.

I'm in anguish o'er a language Which was once so rich and flowery. At one time 'twas so sublime, 'Twas like a princess royal's dowery.

A wealth of words like birds All flocking for a great migration; When one looks though classic books These words become our transportation.

I've a passion for that fashion So ornate, yet now outmoded, Ne'er lament the hours spent Perusing pages overloaded;

Not to rue nor to eschew Old rambling verses so romantic, Indeed, I revel when a level Is achieved that's pure pedantic.

When I view our youth, in sooth I feel a cold, uneasy presage That the vulture o'er our culture's Bones must be the dread text message!

LETTER Logo by numbers

The proposed logo as shown in *The Creemore Echo* on Friday, April 11 is ineffective and should be radically modified, if not scrapped entirely.

In a nutshell, it's unclear about what it is – is that really a "C"? – and about what it's selling. Worse, it works against its dual purposes of clearly identifying the Clearview name and giving some idea of what the area is about.

Bad branding is one thing. Confusing branding is much worse. The proposed logo has nothing to do with – nor says anything about – the hopeful tagline, "In Clearview you can live your best life."

A confession. I have not followed the procedures leading to the creation of this logo. I have no idea of the costs involved or savings made. Yes, the use of multiple colour is always an added expense, but this concern is certainly not part of my argument against such use in this context.

I do sense the care, intelligence and effort involved. Maybe that's part of the problem. As it now stands – or droops, rather – the logo looks fussy and overdesigned.

I also sense the wish on the part of everyone involved to celebrate our natural settings: hence the blue (sky) over the green (fields) – and yes, let's leave the discussion of industrial wind turbines out of this for a minute.

But all this raises a question: did all the shared, positive feelings that went into crafting the proposed logo – feelings which I share, by the way – only serve to obscure the reality that the logo still doesn't do the job intended?

"Yes" would seem to be the answer. Let me count the ways:

1. A logo is intended as instant communication, something grasped in its entirety when passing it by in a car. A good logo is sharp, concise, direct, powerfully simple and simply powerful. A great logo - such as the curving "CN" for Canadian National Railways designed in 1960 by Allan Robb Fleming and James Valkus - can also carry with it a wealth of information; the way the "C" and the "N" suggest the shape of Canada itself. Anything that gets in the way of such clarity should be shelved completely. The current Clearview logo suggests we are fuzzy thinkers. Bottom line: it is simply wrong because it isn't simple.

2. Its general shape is meant to represent the "C" in Clearview. But it doesn't. Not really. Look closely. Notice how the dark green bottom portion of the "C" – representing our tree land and bush area, yes? – does not truly complete the "C," but seemingly flips back up on the rest of the letter. The bottom actually subverts our ability to see the letter clearly. This bottom chunk looks as if it's the "C" bottom bent up – or bending up as if part of some giant worm with a leaf-shaped head crawling our way from over the horizon. Yikes.

3. Then there's the question of colour confusion. Blue and green are wretchedly difficult to work together – ask the Vancouver Canucks whose green/blue uniform has been a design quagmire since forever. Both green and blue show up poorly against a white background if each/either colour is not intense enough. Note the intensity of the Toronto Maple Leafs blue. This blue forces the Leafs team name and logo in white to pop out of a dark background. As is, neither the green

or blue used in the proposed Clearview logo contrast sharply against a white background. Indeed, the white is so intense that it blurs the edges of the big "C." (Yes, we all get the idea of the sun blasting through the blue.)

4. But what of the sky? It appears to be an afterthought. Given all the thinking going on here, why was the blue left so bland and uniform – something that cannot be said of a Georgian Bay sky. If some form of this concept is eventually retained, the sky needs fixing.

Is any of the proposed design necessary at all? It's hardly original. I can't image one Ontario constituency north of Bloor Street West in Toronto that doesn't imagine itself as a paradise of natural beauty with lots of, uh, blue and green colour all around. Why not take this in another direction because what does distinguish us is the name "Clearview." Heaven knows we have a lot of clear views (again leaving wind turbines out of the equation). Dozens of logo possibilities can be found in the name alone starting with the dramatic telescope-view possibilities inherent in the letter "C."

This is not nitpicking. Crisp clear logo design results from a confluence of multiple considerations and decisions. I'd like this email to be one of those considerations before the new logo is chosen.

So here's a radical idea: Why not let the public decide by way of a contest of the top logo entrants? Amateurs could compete against the pros. Debate would be generated. And it would feel as if it were taking place in a democratic fashion. Or is this going too far?

In the April 11 issue of *The Creemore Echo*, I wrote about Hunt's Bakery being where the Old Mill House Pub is located. I was wrong. Thanks to **Paul Woolner** who grew up in Creemore, we can set the matter straight.

Percy Hunt's bakery was located behind Alburn Dickinson's grocery, the second building south of the Meat Market. It burned down many years ago and was never re-established. The bakery, now the Old Mill, was operated by Frank Soules, Harold Carscadden, Herb Newell and Mr. McDonald (probably others, too).

Wes Ferguson used to drive the horse and wagon for Hunt's. There is a story regarding the horse running away, throwing Wes out on Paul's front lawn, then wrecking it as it rounded the corner at the house on the southeast corner of Elizabeth Street and Library Street.
