THINGS LOOK SUNNY FOR FACILITIES GOING SOLAR

Four years after solar energy panels at Station on the Green exceeded revenue projections, Clearview will get eight more facilities generating solar power by summer.

At its April 28 meeting, Council accepted 13 contracts totalling \$460,883 for Creemore company, Gravity Sun Power, to install the 10 kW micro-fit solar systems at a cost of \$300,000.

Since then, Collingwood company R.J. Burnside approved the structural engineering of eight of the proposed facilities.

The solar power systems will be installed on Avening Community Centre, Clearview Administration Centre, Nottawa Community Hall, Clearview Works Building, Duntroon (Nottawasaga) Hall, Stayner Community Centre, Stayner Granite Club and the Creemore Medical Centre.

At press time, the structural engineering approval for the building at 200 Huron Street in Stayner was still pending.

The revenue generated by the solar panels will be applied to each facility to offset its operating costs.

Because the Stayner Granite Club is the only (See "Eight" on page 3)

Postcards aimed at politicians

Wondering who to vote for in June's provincial election? Food and Water First is here to help.

Ontario Premier **Kathleen Wynne** called the Thursday, June 12 election last week after NDP leader **Andrea Horwath** announced that her party would not support the Liberal's budget.

In a new campaign, the Food and Water First group has printed special post cards that voters can use to ask their candidates questions about the agri-food sector, water resources and farmland

"Food and Water First is a nonpartisan, grassroots organization," said **Shirley Boxem**, Vice Chair of North Dufferin Agricultural Community Task Force. "This is not a Liberal issue or a Conservative issue or a Green issue. We are concerned about issues of fundamental importance for every person that all four parties should address."

The post card highlights key messages about agri-food, water sources and farmland. It also asks residents and election hopefuls to protect and preserve the land and water that sustain us, for future generations.

Members of Food and Water First have already started distributing the post cards across Ontario. Creemore voters can find them at the 100 Mile Store, Curiosity House Books or Creemore Kitchen.

Food and Water First was formed to protest the mega-quarry that Highland Companies planned to build in Melancthon Township.

Although the Highland Companies withdrew its application for the megaquarry in 2012, Food and Water First is still active in demanding the protection of our food and water. Simcoe-Grey candidates in provincial election on Thursday, June 12:





approved facility that does not have a committee of Council, its revenue will be placed in reserve for the Granite Club to use for future improvements.

The estimated completion date for the solar power systems is June 2014.

Four of the 13 proposed facilities didn't make the cut because there were design issues, said Steve Sage, Clearview's General Manager of Transportation and Recreation.

"Although they are new buildings, the Creemore Fire Hall Station #4 and the Singhampton Fire Hall Station #5 were constructed as post-disaster facilities," Sage explained. This means that extra weight cannot be added to

In addition, the design of the interior of the roof of the Creemore Community Centre prohibited it from passing structural approval for the solar power systems.

The Creemore branch of the Clearview Public library would require renovation to accommodate a solar panel system, Sage said.

In 2010, the Township installed a solar energy system on Station on the Green with an expected gross revenue of \$8000; it got \$11,000 instead.

"Since then, the system has exceeded expectations," said Sage. The system generated about 30% more revenue than expected in 2012, he said.

To pay for the installation, Treasurer Edward Henley will apply for a loan from Infrastructure Ontario for an amount up to \$500,000 with an amortization of up to 20 years.

Twenty-six buildings were originally on the list for receiving solar panel systems. However, the Ontario Power Authority would only approve one building per property.

Another reason some facilities are not receiving solar panels is because Ontario Hydro's power lines didn't have enough available grid space.

Volunteer revs up for fall election

One of Clearview's candidates for the municipal election has won a volunteer service award.

John Broderick, who filed his nomination papers for the new Ward 6 in March, has been honoured by the Huronia West Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police for his service with the Huronia West Snowmobile Trail Officer Patrol (S.T.O.P.).

S.T.O.P. is a partnership between the OPP and the Ontario Federation of Snowmobile Clubs. Through "community policing," volunteers such as Broderick improve snowmobiling by increasing public awareness of drinking and riding, educating riders about safety and promoting voluntary compliance with snowmobile laws.

"In 1995, I lost one of my younger sisters to a drinking and driving accident," said Broderick, who has been a member of S.T.O.P. for 15 years. "So, when the program came along, I wanted to prevent another family from going through what our family did."

In 1997, Broderick began two years of training from the OPP to be a S.T.O.P. volunteer. He said he is one of three members of his graduating class who still volunteer.

Broderick feels strongly about the role that S.T.O.P. volunteers play in keeping community members safe. "Patrols come across people putting

themselves at risk and they may not realize it until you bring it to their attention," he said.

Given his experience as a snowmobile expert, this election hopeful feels that Clearview's future lies in tourism.

"I'd like to see a multi-use trail system expanded upon. I think there is so much potential in Clearview and I think we could do better in tourism," he emphasized.

Broderick owns J&R Cycle power sports store outside of Wasaga Beach with his wife, Rhonda. He and his wife raised their four daughters within 25 miles of the home where his family has lived since the 1830s.

"I've spent my entire life in this industry," explained Broderick. He believes that his business experience, as well as his involvement with every motorized trails group in the area ("in some fashion or another,") will help him in a role on Council.

Broderick's leadership experience includes stints as President of the Central Ontario ATV Club, Past President of the Ontario Federation of ATV Clubs and Board Member of Huronia Trails and Greenways.

"I'm a team player and I know how to work with a group," he said. "I know how to make groups successful."

This won't be Broderick's first kick at the can; in the last municipal election he ran for Ward 5, which was won by Councillor Robert Walker.

This time, however, he has decided to run for the new Ward 6, because he feels his experience better reflects its rural population, instead of half of Stayner's, which the new Ward 5 includes.

Former Simcoe County District School Board Trustee Connie **Leishman** is the only other candidate who has filed for election in Ward 6

Broderick will receive his Ontario Volunteer Service Award at a ceremony hosted by the Ontario Honours and Awards Secretariat in June in Barrie.

LAWYERS TO SETTLE HOME HARDWARE DISPUTE

The fate of Creemore's local hardware store is in the hands of lawyers, the store's owner says.

Last Thursday, May 1, customers of the Creemore Home Hardware arrived to find its doors locked.

On the front door was a Notice of Termination of the Lease from

landlord Brian Doran to tenant 1866204 Ontario Ltd. as guaranteed by (the late) Richard Miles and Patricia Miles.

The letter says the tenant is in breach of the lease for unpaid rent amounting to \$5,921.46.


Patricia Miles disputes the content of the letter as well as Doran's reason


for locking the doors.

"I was in arrears because the minus 40 degree weather in January and February caused worse business than normal," she said. "However, I attempted to make a payment."

She told the Creemore Echo that lawyers were now handling the situation.

EDITORIAL Times of change

Have you noticed? Things are changing around here – and not simply because of the very welcome signs of spring.

Two weeks ago, the Home and Garden Show, a mainstay at the Creemore Arena for years, was cancelled because not enough vendors had registered, co-organizer Donna Harper said.

Last week, customers who arrived at the front door of the Home Hardware on Mill Street found its doors locked, with no indication of whether it would be opening anytime soon.

And next month, the old brick building of Nottawasaga and Creemore Public School will say goodbye to its last students before the site is closed and the Simcoe County District School Board begins the process of unloading the building.

Luckily, the kids at NCPS will be relocating just up Collingwood Street to the school's modern senior site.

Still, that's quite a bit of change for one small village at one time.

Will the hardware store re-open? Will there be a Home and Garden Show next year? What will happen to the old school building?

People are wondering what it all means.

Like a library, pharmacy, grocery store or post office, a hardware store is an anchor of a village like ours. And a school – as everybody who witnessed the closing of Duntroon Central Public School in 2012 knows – is a symbol of a living community. Even a Home and Garden Show reflects community spirit and, well, growth.


Creemore needs the active participation of its residents – whether shopping or volunteering or simply attending – to survive. I agree with all of the outcry that some of the prices are higher than some other shops that are a bit of a drive away – some being a minimum of 20 minutes away. However, unless you are already in the area of those other stores, it really is not worthwhile to drive there.

I buy the majority of my groceries at the local grocery store, all of my drugs at the drugstore, and many articles at the hardware store. It goes beyond the fact that our friends and neighbours work there – it is a source of employment for local villagers, some of whom do not have a vehicle to drive to another work location. The high prices are a reflection of the lack of business and the economics of dealing with "the last stop on the line." Perhaps collectively as a community our voices could be heard to the higher echelons to appeal for a price cut to save our shops and our community

Call for more efficiency LETTER

The following remarks are in accordance with recent conversations within the Creemore community. Suggestions are rampant as to what is required from our acting Councillors, to effect a more efficient community including additional interaction with the public. As a nonagenarian and resident of Creemore in excess of 20 years, I am cognizant to some degree of what one might expect in addressing problems in our community. I have listed a number of irritants, which I hope will be received in the spirit given.

I realize we live in a world of change, and added costs are rapidly becoming a way of life. However, many seniors who are on fixed incomes are virtually being priced out of their residences by high taxes and ever-increasing water costs. They are left with no alternative but to seek accommodation elsewhere and assuredly not in Creemore.

- 1. My property taxes continue to reveal a substantial increase on an annual basis during the past few years, with no acceptable reason given.
- 2. It is my belief that Creemore is in dire need of an influx of new homes for the sustainability of existing merchants, many of whom are experiencing difficulty in paying their rent. It is appalling when one considers that Creemore doesn't even boast a barber shop! Obviously, without significant input, support from Council including an urgent need of a positive outlook, our community is slowly but surely contributing to the image of a ghost town with few amenities to offer visitors on whom we rely during summer months.

- 3. A pressing need that continues to remain dormant is why no apparent action has been taken to build a facility in the town of Creemore for the benefit of seniors, or even assisted living. This is a service sorely required, but on the surface there appears to be a lack of foresight by our elected representatives. From relevant enquiries, I am not encouraged that it will come to fruition in time for many of us to access its advantages. Despite the fact that time is running out for those who qualify, regrettably there is no visible light at the end of the tunnel.
- 4. As a former entrepreneur, I am conversant with the importance of budgets, and the need to control costs, thus I question the need of our current number of Councillors and staff. I have always been a strong advocate of utilizing maximum efficiency from a limited number of sources, i.e., burdened by too many employees, or lack of effort by those who view their positions with a sense of disinterest. With due respect to our present Council, I suggest that with efficient planning and the calibre of personnel, services of at least two Councillors could and should be dispended from your roster.
- 5. In an attempt to create a closer liaison and improve communication between Councillors and their constituents, I readily subscribe to the plan Councillor Thom Paterson arranged two years ago at Station on the Green. With the use of a screen and well-planned portfolio, we learned where our money was being spent, and about a more equitable budget in the coming year. A most informative meeting with kudos to Thom for

his thoughtful gesture, especially as it exemplified the needs of our community. Other Councillors would do well to extract a leaf from Thom's

6. Clearview's new logo, presented recently by The Creemore Echo, is of major concern, as the exorbitant cost versus a measure of return is unjustified. I feel it would have been logical to allocate a financial outlay of this dimension, to fulfill a much greater need (of which several come to mind) taking precedent over a very expensive sign.

7. Finally, the bridge on Collingwood Street, considered to be a heritage site and in need of repair. Rumours abound that a proposal is being considered to construct an entirely new one. Yet, despite an objection by the majority of Creemore residents, it is apparent that opposing sources strongly favour a new facility that will involve huge financial outlay. With rising costs and time involved to complete, in my opinion this is suggestive of irresponsible planning.

It is not my intent to disparage anyone on Council. Obviously, problems arise on a daily basis including dissenting comments from an unyielding public. However, if we fail to make our opinions known, or wishes stated, we must be prepared to share decisions with gratitude or continue to promote our beliefs that would be advantageous to the community in which we live.

Council briefs

Approved: SCI greenhouse

At its last meeting on April 28, Council approved the building of a single-storey greenhouse at Stayner Collegiate Institute. Earlier this year, SCI received a grant from the Ministry of Education to promote healthy eating. The school will use part of that grant to build the greenhouse where the students will grow their own food. The proposed 150-square metre greenhouse will be constructed to the south of the school.

Approved: Waste water project to tender

Council directed Township staff to go to tender for Phase Two of the Creemore Waste Water Treatment Plant (WWTP) aeration upgrade. Phase Two will include two new blowers and upsized aeration pipes. Phase One of the project (during which new diffusers were installed) was completed in September 2013. The project is intended to protect and expand Creemore's sanitary servicing ability while fostering economic development. It aims to do this by implementing a cost-sharing partnership with one of Creemore's largest employers, Creemore Springs. Both phases of the project are expected to come within its \$663,762 budget. Clearview will account for 30% of the cost and the brewery will take on 70%.

Approved: Stayner renovation

Council approved a \$59,196.18 quote from Bill Leimgardt to renovate 220 Huron Street in Stayner, which Clearview purchased last year. The renovations will include accessible washrooms, an accessible public area, security, cold storage and a climate-controlled area for storing documents. Leimgardt's fee was the lowest of three companies that the Township invited to quote. The Township did not undertake a full tender process due to the project's small size. A full public tender process with engineered drawings would have cost an extra \$150,000.

Approved: ATV for Fire Department

The Fire Chief has been authorized to purchase an all-terrain vehicle from Earth Power for \$22,700 plus HST to replace the 2001 John Deere Gator the Fire Department currently uses. The ATV will be used for responding to emergencies and at for use at community activities. It is designed for year-round use on difficult terrain and trails, and in severe weather conditions in all emergencies. "The firefighters have used their own snowmobiles, which could be a health and safety issue," Acting Fire Chief Colin Shewell said. "It will be better to have trained equipment."

Approved: Animal control contract

Council agreed unanimously to contract Ontario Animal Control to perform after-hours animal control in Clearview for \$450 per month.

Renewed: Automatic aid agreement

Council directed Township staff to prepare a by-law to renew the paid agreement between the Municipality of Grey Highlands and Clearview for certain properties located near Fire Station #5 in Singhampton. The agreement is intended to ensure prompt and efficient emergency response to the properties in case of fires, rescues and emergencies over the next five years. In this "pay-for-service" agreement, Clearview Fire and Emergency Services would have full cost recovery.

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Spring signals Ramp Romp time in Singhampton

Each spring for the past 30 years, hundreds of individuals and thousands of wild leeks come together in Singhampton. They do so at the village's Ramp Romp, a celebration of wild leeks for a very worthy cause.

The Ramp Romp started as a response to a fire emergency in Singhampton in 1983. A group of concerned local residents created the Fire Prevention Committee. The Committee established the Ramp Romp to raise funds and awareness for timely fire and emergency response for the community.

Ramp Romp funds initially provided for emergency relief and emergency response for the community. Since those first steps, the energy and perseverance of countless community minded individuals have helped to make the dream of better fire protection a reality.

The earthly ritual

How does the annual ritual of the Ramp Romp happen? Spring arrives in the Singhampton area, usually twice. A date is set for the Ramp Romp, usually twice. The brave and tireless leek pickers enter the moist maple forest, more than twice. And the leeks they dig. And the leeks they pick. And the leek digging and picking is a task, for sure. But it is a task with purpose. And they return to the village with nature's springtime treasure.

The green treasure's aroma begins to permeate the village. The ritual of harvesting the ramps is

In the evening, for many evenings, the brave treasure cleaners carefully clean and wash thousands of leeks. And the leeks they do wash. And the cleaning and washing are tasks, no doubt. But they are tasks with purpose. The pungent aroma of the clean, green treasure, the wild leeks, gets carried farther around the village.



The aromatic event

A typical Ramp Romp dinner feeds more than 300 folk. To do this, statistically speaking, requires 154 lbs of roast pork, 59 kgs of scallopized potatoes, 1,300 oz of beans, 8.5 L of applesauce, 5.25 cubic feet of dinner rolls, hundreds of pickles, and variable volumes of mustard, apple juice and so forth.

Central to the meal are an estimated 24,626 steamed leeks and 2,802 marinated ramps. For dessert – more than 60 homemade pies.

To feed 330 at the Singhampton Community Centre also requires many servers, cleaners and the like, and a healthy amount of cooperation. This culinary collaboration always takes place in an atmosphere of distinction – the aroma of the ramps has reached a peak.

Folk young and old, from the local community and far away, join in this springtime feast. Then feast gives way to frolic as the dance, the Romp, begins. Many take this Romp opportunity to socialize further. Many just like to dance. Some seem to dance with purpose. Others imagine that it is a way to wear off some pie. Romp purpose aside, one thing is certain: the sweet aroma is now deeply rooted in the Community Centre and neighbourhood. The proceeds, too, shall go to the Centre and neighbourhood, in the form of better fire protection.

The superb effect

Singhampton's volunteer firefighters of Fire Station #5, have been on call since 1992. Since that time, many additions have been made to firefighting and emergency equipment that these community members use including the "Jaws of Life," an electrical generator and a portable water pump, as well as training for each firefighter.

The greater Singhampton community has realized the dream of better fire protection. This accomplishment has taken the tireless effort of countless individuals, working as a team. As you raise that forkful of leeks or pie to your lips, think. Think of the dreamers. Think of the many who have made this event successful, and who have helped make the dream a reality. Think of the volunteer firefighters. Enjoy that forkful and give thanks.

Sculptor envisions an equal world for all



I have known Ernie Herzig for many years as an associate of valued friends and neighbours. We met at parties celebrating this or that, and I have skiied the extensive cross country trails behind the house in Mulmur he shares with his wife, Rivette. I noted his gentle relationship with

his horses, which is an interest we share. Not everyone cares for their horses with the kind of reverence I like to see, so I was always fond of him for that elevated devotion.

Recently, I found another side to Ernie that had escaped me over the last 35 years. Sculpture has been a quiet preoccupation and passion that he has devoted thousands of hours to through a demanding career as a publisher, many social pursuits and a close family life. His fabulous sculptures were on display at the Station on

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the Green at the Creemore Festival of the Arts last fall.


Because I have known Ernie socially and not professionally, I was surprised to find he has a long list of artistic accomplishments, which is unusual in a part-time artist. Since studying at Ontario College of Art and Design in Toronto in 1995, Ernie has taken part in several group exhibitions including shows at the Beau-xi and John B. Aird Galleries. He had a one-man show at the Canadian Sculpture Society in April 2002. His major work, "Two Visions," was unveiled in Ken Williams Square in Brampton, and coincided with a major show at Brampton City

Ernie's sculptures are mathematically precise, elegant and beguiling. They are beautiful, but also engaging. And they all speak to the balance between male and female.


They are all a meditation on the theme of "different but equal."

This preoccupation comes from his despair over the sad reality in our world of the intransigence of mysogeny. Ernie feels strongly that it is the black force that propels most of the world's problems. Ernie was moved by **Shelley Hannah**'s wonderful article in the *Echo* (Friday, March 28 edition) on this subject. He also said that the book, *Ascent of Women* by Canadian **Sally Armstrong** (available at Curiosity House), has inspired him. Armstrong is a visionary journalist who exposes the fight for equality in every corner of the globe. The fight of our times is an equal voice for women that will also heal the planet. Ernie wants his sculptural vision to be part of the solution.

Ernie is an unlikely candidate for sculpting. He and

the two-dimensional

preoccupations of line,

texture, composition, value

these reproductions

As a watercolour artist, I am preoccupied artistically with two-dimensional work. Sculpture falls firmly outside my expertise. So it is with these uneducated eyes that I viewed Ernie's body of work, which spans 40 years.

Ernie, who has an elegant mind and generous spirit, took the time to answer my questions without flinching. I had such a good time with him as the hours unfolded, revelling in his skill and vision. I learned about many things

I had never thought about like resins, plasters, granite, alabaster and wood, wire assemblages and reductive carving, bronze casting and mold-making. But mostly, I was deeply engaged in his vision.

I hope that Ernie's sculptures will find a large audience soon. They deserve a place in our consciousness.


Vice President **Shayne King** was the Master of Ceremonies for the afternoon, and did a wonderful



Why women matter: the road to inclusivity

"Why a column called Women Matter?" you might be asking.

It is rooted in the concept of inclusivity. It begins with



my enthusiasm about being alive at this time, and woven into that, my deep belief that our lives are opportunities for us to contribute something to the community around us, perhaps even to the evolution of life on our planet. I believe that we live in *the* most interesting time to be alive as human beings. I believe that we live in a pivotal time, when we are facing economic, environmental, political and social challenges, and when our choices – individual and collective – often have an immediate and consequential impact.

So with this as our backdrop, I believe that we are *all* being called forth to alter the course of current inertia. We have

a perfect example of this in our own neighbourhood with the threat of the mega-quarry. Many of us – perhaps you, too – were called forth to take a stand for something more important to us – clean water and food - than the comfort of our anonymity or the status quo. That being said, I have, over the course of my adult life, noticed that women's voices, women's contributions to conversations and women's perspectives on situations have too often gone ignored, unnoticed, unacknowledged, uncelebrated and, simply, not put to good use. From women's voices protesting the beginning of WWI in the Hague to the current situation in Syria to the dynamic between my own parents. Something different happens in groups where only one every in five people are women (as in our local municipal Council) than when women are equally represented. We very often do not get to reap the benefits of women's creativity or genius in such situations.

In 1995, Nobel Peace Prize recipient Aung San Sun Kyi opened the

NGO Forum at the fourth UN World Conference on Women in Beijing with: "For millennia, women have dedicated themselves almost exclusively to the task of protecting and caring for the young and old, striving for the conditions of peace that favour life as a whole... Now that we are gaining control of the primary historical role imposed on us of sustaining life in the context of the home and family, it is time to apply in the arena of the world the wisdom and experience thus gained in activities of people over so many thousands of years."

It is exciting for me to notice the places where women have something to add to the conversation. And so it is, on many local and global fronts, opportunities scare and/or enrage us, or, from a different perspective, inspire and engage us to bring a little – or a lot – more of ourselves forth than we might have known ourselves to be, to make a difference that matters to us. Where do vou see places that might benefit from a new perspective or a different or tone that women could bring? Where, if you are a woman, have you wished to have been heard, or had the courage to share your ideas?

This column is a place to explore the places and ways that we might truly be

an inclusive community. It is a place to acknowledge that there has been an imbalance in the conversations and actions that have shaped our communities and our world, a place that acknowledges that this imbalance exists still, in spite of the efforts made in recent decades. It is intended to be a place that sparks respectful conversation and thoughtful engagement.

For women, I encourage you to take a few moments to notice the difference that you make in the lives of those around you, to celebrate the difference that women together have made in the course of local and global history and to consider where next you will make a difference.

For men, I welcome you to honour and acknowledge the difference that the girls and women in your life have made, and to consider just one thing that you could do to facilitate our world being more inclusive of women's contributions, locally and globally.

Indeed, we are the ones we've been waiting for, to make the world a safer, more compassionate, inclusive and joyful place! All of us.





Welcome, May – now for some warmer weather, please!






