As Creemore Springs Brewery embarks on a second year-long expansion, it is taking steps to reduce disruption on Mill Street.

On June 1, the Brewery will begin constructing a new retail store, maintenance area, laboratory and staff room, plus a board room that will be available for community use at its current site.

Initially, this will require heavy equipment to access the site to excavate foundations, pour concrete and place steel until the middle of June.

"Due to their large size, some vehicles will have to enter the work site through Mill Street," said **Geoff Davies**, Head of Operations at Creemore Springs Brewery. "However, Creemore Springs will strive to minimize the frequency of such access."

While summer in Creemore is a season that many feel could do without a construction site on the main street, Davies said the Brewery planned to start

the construction at this time to increase efficiency.

For one, the better weather will help increase productivity, he said. As well, truckload weights (which are restricted

in winter and spring to protect roads) are no longer limited in the summer.

With construction starting in June, trucks will be able to carry more to the construction site at one time, instead of making multiple trips, Davies explained.

"Half-load restrictions increase the number of truck movements in and

out of the site," Davies said. "If we had started in March, then the disruption would have been significantly longer."

Davies said the brewery is taking steps to lessen the disruption to its neighbours. This includes erecting a temporary fence to separate construction activities from Mill Street. There will also be a fence along the west side of the sidewalk from the northwest corner of the warehouse to the southwest

## Brewery communicating with residents and businesses

(Continued from page 1) corner of the existing brick brewery building, and a barrier to separate pedestrians from traffic.

"It is inevitable that some things are going to happen, but you have to be responsive," said Davies. "We are trying to find the way to be the most efficient and provide the least obstruction. We are going to do the best we can."

Once the structural steel is in place, construction work will be staged in the west side of the south parking lot. Access to the work area will be through the west side, inside the fence.

All other construction traffic will be required to enter the site through the existing Elizabeth Street entrance, Davies said.

Chef Caesar Guinto, who coowns Creemore Kitchen across the street from the brewery, is concerned about the effect the

construction could have on his business. In particular, four parking spots on Mill Street,

will be lost to the construction barrier the Brewery will build. He is also worried about dust blowing onto his restaurant's front patio.

However, Guinto said communication with the Brewery has been good. Creemore Springs will address his concerns by installing signs advertising parking on nearby streets and watering down dust, he said.



"We feel lucky to be involved in the plans," said Guinto. "We are always willing to work with the Brewery."

Guinto recently learned more about the construction plans at a meeting hosted by the Brewery Liaison Committee in April. At the meeting, the Brewery's general contractor, architect and landscape architect were on hand to answer questions.

The Brewery Liaison Committee was established after a 2009 settlement with local residents and business owners who had initially appealed Creemore Spring's initial zoning application to the Ontario Municipal Board.

The Committee, which is chaired by Councillor Thom Paterson, includes Davies, Gordon Fuller, Brewmaster at Creemore Springs, Brewery neighbours Christine Boake and Paul Vorstermans, and Creemore Business Improvement Association (BIA) President, Corey Finkelstein.

The Committee's purpose is to communicate between the Brewery and its neighbours, and to ensure the construction goes as smoothly as possible, Vorstermans explained.

Vorstermans, who was one of the individuals who appealed the Brewery's initial application, said the Committee has lived up to its mandate.

"It has kept us involved in the discussion and is keeping us informed," he said.

The Brewery plans to have the foundations and steel completed by the end of August. Construction workers should finish the exterior of the building and the landscaping in the fall, Davies said. Work on the interior will continue until next spring.

"The goal is to have the exterior and all landscaping completed by the end of the year," said Davies. "We will keep working inside in 2015."



#### **EDITORIAL** Warm feelings, wintry day

Visitors and vendors alike could sense the excitement at the birth of a new season of all things farmy – from herbs and honey, planters and plants to maple syrup, meat, jam, breads, baking, bug juice and tea.

For new vendors Lara Kelly and Jamie Kingston, last weekend marked their first foray into the Farmers' Market world. Their company, The Farm Project, offers raw and vegan snacks, as well as outdoor yoga classes.

"It was a joyful atmosphere!" said Lara on the phone with the *Echo* earlier this week. "We found that everyone was receptive to what we are doing. The other vendors were warm and friendly. I even did some of my own grocery shopping."

Others, like Sarah Hallett, former Creemore Farmers' Market President and owner of Roseberry Farm bakery, are old hats. But even though Sarah has maintained a booth at the Market for the last seven years, she said she still finds opening day exciting.

Roseberry Farm will be back this Saturday with the 37 other Farmers' Market vendors – plus a film crew! They will be filming Sarah – and the Market – for an interactive online exhibition called "Citizens in Action," which showcases stories of new citizen volunteers across Canada.

Sarah credits volunteering at the Farmers' Market with helping her become a new Canadian citizen, after moving to this country from the U.K. eight years ago.

"I felt (and feel) very strongly that Creemore really welcomed me into the community," she said in an email to the *Echo*. "The community supported me, so, in turn, I wanted to support them by volunteering to help at the Market... The volunteer experience can be a great way to become an integral part of the community."

So come out this weekend, support your community, visit the vendors (old and new), smile for the cameras and don't forget to say "hi" to Sara and Fred at the *Echo* booth, as we continue our subscription drive.

#### THE WAY WE WERE

#### **LETTER** The property tax train

I've looked at my property tax bill. It's a lot higher than it used to be.

I looked up Census and Development statistics. The population of Clearview in 2001 and 2011 was 13,700 in both years. In other words, zero change over 10 years.

I also compared Clearview's 2003 audited statement with the most recent audited statement of 2012. In this nine-year period, costs increased by \$9.2 million. So did taxes and user fees (\$5.6 million). The excess of costs over revenues for the nine years was financed by a 72% increase in long-term debt (\$3.6 million).

These audited statements show Clearview is spending more, taxing more and accumulating more debt to provide the same level of services to the same number of people.

If you were paid 10% more each year, spent everything and also ran up your credit card by 72%, where would you be? That's where Clearview is – and it's looking to you for payment.

Clearview faces uncertain revenue sources other than property taxes and government grants. Considering the insolvent state of Ontario, future meaningful provincial grants appear unlikely.

Some might argue that increased development fees will meet revenue shortfalls. In reality, development charges are deterrents to growth for individuals and businesses and Clearview's charges are already high.

Upcoming commitments to Wasaga for Stayner's sewage treatment total \$18 million, with the first payment of \$6 million due on July 1, 2017; also rumoured is a \$5 million Stayner library. Adding the \$440,000 to acquire the Beattie feed mill plus the multi-million HUB equals profligate spending.

For 2003 to 2012, inflation would account for only an 18% increase in costs. There may also be accounting reclassifications that distort individual accounts. On balance though, it's the same picture: hugely increased spending for the same number of people.

Forecast growth hasn't happened and substantial future growth is a mirage. Yet there is no apparent effort to reduce costs; hiring and spending keep increasing and taxes ratchet higher to the point where there is zero value added for your tax dollar.

Clearly, serious corrective fiscal restraint and cost cutting are urgent priorities and far past due.

Across North America, municipalities are trying to avoid bankruptcy by cutting costs and renegotiating debt; it's high time for Clearview to wake up to this looming risk.

If remedial action is not immediately taken, look out for the train; it's coming at you, fast.

## The mystery of the prisoner's box

During the spring and summer of 1838, prisoners in the Toronto jail crafted small boxes out of firewood, and decorated them with words and pictures.

The men had been jailed for participating in the 1837 Upper Canada Rebellion to free Canada, led by William Lyon MacKenzie.

Some of the messages on the boxes were sentimental greetings to family members; while others were religious.

But many were political.

"They are not penitent," said Canadian historian, **Chris Raible**, of the prisoners. "[The messages] are political and they tell the stories of people who are in prison asking not to be forgotten."

Recently, the Dufferin Museum acquired a box made by a prisoner named John J. McNulty in the Toronto jail, before he was transported to the Van Diemen's Land prisoner colony in Tasmania.

On Sunday, Chris will discuss McNulty's story at the Dufferin County Museum Archives, in a presentation about the prisoner's boxes.

Chris started compiling an inventory of all known prisoner boxes eight years ago. He began with 17 boxes that were owned by the City of Toronto and private collectors.

A search with the help of **John Carter**, a Museum Consultant for the province, and **Darryl Withrow**, a volunteer wood crafter with the Pickering Village Museum, produced 90 boxes.

These boxes were documented in a book, *From Hands Striving to be Free*, written by the three men.

Since then, more boxes have emerged from the, er, woodwork. At last count, Chris said there were 132 made by at least 70 different prisoners. While most were made at the Toronto jail, some came from Fort Henry in Kingston.

Although we now know the origin of the prisoner's boxes, the mystery of their appearance remains. There are no known boxes before or after this group of prisoners constructed their creation, Chris said.



Since 2008, Denise has run Seasons on Mill Street, which she describes as "an eclectic mix of antiques and modern."

When making purchases for the store, Denise focuses on objects made by Canadian designers and Fair Trade companies.

"I try as much as possible to buy Canadian and Fair Trade," she says. "I want people to shop local and go promoting other Canadians."

Twice a year, Denise goes to the Toronto Gift Fair on the hunt for new and interesting items for the store. Through the Fair, she has discovered mirrors, lamps and rings, all made by small Canadian manufacturers.

The furniture she sells is made locally as well. Customers who admire the wooden table in the front of the store can order it for their own homes

in any size or finish.


However, Denise does make exceptions to the local rule – unless you think of the United Kingdom as local (which Denise, who was born in Portsmouth, England, might). She carries a line of sweaters, for example, that hails from Glasgow, Scotland.

For her store, Denise also seeks out sellers from Fair Trade companies. The term "Fair Trade" refers to the concept of fairness in the marketplace. Merchandisers who sell Fair Trade products ensure the artisans who make the products are paid fairly for their work. It is the opposite of mass production.

"I think everyone should get a fair wage," Denise explains simply.


Right now in the store, you can find bracelets from Argentina, purses from Indonesia, silk scarves from Cambodia, lamps from the Philippines and pillows from India.

## Teenager protects world – close to home

Stayner teenager **Noa Bridson** thinks globally while acting locally.

The Grade 11 student at Collingwood Collegiate Institute (CCI) has recently been named one of the Top 25 Environmentalists Under 25 by The Starfish Canada, an online environmental organization committed to encouraging positive change through scholarship, workshops and research.

Exploring the world with her parents has inspired Noa to see the big picture. The family lived in India when Noa was 10, and spent much of that year backpacking around Asia and Africa. When Noa was 14, they lived in Vietnam where she attended an International School where her parents worked as teachers.

Noa recalls, "There was amazing beauty in the places we travelled in Asia and Africa, but we also saw so much environmental degradation, like deforestation in India and currents of garbage floating through the South Pacific. I remember thinking that if humans could have a negative impact on the environment, then they must also be able to have a positive one, too."

When they came home to Clearview, Noa brought a global and environmental awareness back with her. She knew that she wanted to protect the natural world, so she began close to home. Noa organizes youth to clean up sideroads and local parklands. She started and runs CCI's Earth Link Environmental Club. She also sits on the Ontario Youth Council and serves on the Environment Network's Board as a Youth Director.

"I started Earth Link at CCI because I saw that so many people cared about the environment, but there wasn't any outlet or way for them to help at school," Noa said. "Earth Link presents students with opportunities to make positive changes in both the school and the community."

Noa's Environmental Science teacher **Bryden Jones** is also the Faculty Advisor for Earth Link. He acknowledges that Noa, who is 17, is wise beyond her years.

"Noa inspires people. She's amazing at organizing and delegating and knows how to get things done. The way she thinks, she is really an extraordinary person... Her yearbook quote should read, 'Most Likely to Win a Nobel Prize'."

Noa has just been accepted to Pearson College, a two-year International Baccalaureate school on Vancouver Island. The admission process is competitive; the program accepts only a few students from each province in Canada, with the rest coming from 84 countries around the world.

She is looking forward to being part of a program whose aim is to inspire students to create a more peaceful and sustainable future. "I'm very excited about the opportunity to go to Pearson and continue my work in environmental sustainability," she said.







## Bridges and turbines dominate discussion at CARA's AGM

The following are a few highlights from the Creemore and Area Residents' Association's recent lively Annual General Meeting held at the Station on the Green on May 19.



**Collingwood Street Bridge** 

Barry Burton gave an update on the Collingwood Street Bridge Restoration Project. The Bridge Committee has the support of our MP, Dr. Kellie Leitch, MPP Jim Wilson, Deputy Mayor Alicia Savage and Councillors Thom Paterson, Shawn Davidson and Brent Preston. The message: Don't waste \$2.5 million when you can pay only about \$1 million and save our historic bridge, which is a valued heritage resource and tourist attraction.

The Committee made an excellent presentation to Clearview Council last December, with more than 70 supporters filling the Council Chamber. Council seemed supportive during the presentations, but then surprisingly

the bridge! The main stumbling block continues to be our Mayor and a few of his colleagues, who seem concerned the bridge

voted not to support

restoration might be downloaded to the Township, which would then be wholly responsible for its construction. Surely there could be a way to fund the project, given the savings involved!

#### **Industrial wind turbines**

Chuck Magwood gave an illuminating talk about Preserve Clearview and the fight against wpd on County Road 91. The fight has gone on for years and has cost several hundred thousand dollars. An appeal or a judicial review is expected after the Ministry of the Environment's (MOE's) decision to approve the wpd project, which will cost at least another \$100,000. Support (moral and financial) is still needed from the community.

Chuck's research showed the tremendous impact of tourism in the Georgian Triangle area, with more

tourists visiting the Georgian Triangle than all other areas of Ontario, including Niagara Falls. Chuck summarized the very short time periods available to provide comments, and some of the defects noted. After a modified wpd proposal was posted, the public was given only 15 days to comment. Preserve Clearview, its lawyers and many others (including CARA), did comment and object. Quick and pro forma replies from wpd suggest it is not really listening nor is it interested in local opinion.

Susan Richardson spoke about her research, particularly with regard to the flawed heritage study done by wpd. When a new decision is published for comment, supportive letters with targeted criticisms are needed from the public.

#### **Heritage Committee**

Valerie Dyer spoke briefly about CARA's heritage initiative from 2011.

#### CARA in the community

Made recommendations on electoral reform, which were consistent with the direction that Council adopted.

- Wrote to the MOE raising objections to the wpd wind development.
- Provided financial support to the Rent-a-Youth employment initiative.
- Provided financial support to the Bridge Restoration Committee; attended and spoke at Council.
- Cooked hot dogs at the Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony.
- Provided financial support to the Creemore Medical Centre.
- Provided financial support to the International Festival of Authors in Creemore.

With over 200 members, CARA has good credibility with the community and local government agencies who, at the least, have to listen to us.

We look forward to doing what we can to help make Creemore such a great place to live.

In other news, one of our Directors, **John Millar**, is hosting a fundraiser for his charity, Tin Roof Global.
