## **Burton launches bid for Deputy Mayor**

With one week to go before the September 12 deadline for nominations, the outlook for Clearview Township's 2014 municipal election changed in two significant ways this week – Creemore resident **Barry Burton**, well-known for his opposition to Simcoe County's plans to replace the Collingwood Street bridge, filed to run for the Deputy Mayor's seat last Friday. And on Thursday, incumbent Councillor **Shawn Davidson** ended speculation that he would run for higher office by filing for reelection as

a Councillor in the new Ward 4.

As of this issue's press time, Burton was the only name put forward for the Deputy Mayor position. Incumbent **Alicia Savage**, who had previously signalled her intention to run for reelection, switched gears and filed to run for Mayor against **Chris Vanderkruys** last week after **Ken Ferguson** announced he would not seek a third term.

Burton told the *Echo* this week that he had made the decision to run prior to Savage's decision, and that his most pressing motivation had come out of his

experience on the bridge file.

"It became very clear to me that the existing Council had very little regard for the will and voice of the people," said the self-employed lighting technician, promising to revisit the bridge issue but also to focus on encouraging both industrial and residential growth.

The deadline to file a nomination is 2 pm on Friday, September 12. Current information on who is running can be found at http://www.clearview.ca/home/election/registered-candidates.

## NEW YEAR BEGINS AT NCPS

Nottawasaga & Creemore Public School's 2014/2015 school year got underway Tuesday, with exactly 200 students enrolled – a number that's expected to remain constant for the next decade or so, according to NCPS principal **Heather Birchall**.

While the day went smoothly, it was not without its unexpected circumstances, chief among them the fact that the Full Day Kindergarten addition, expected to be ready for opening day, was still abuzz with construction workers.

"Unfortunately, we're about a week behind schedule," said Birchall, explaining that the delay was caused by a late shipment of windows.



## NCPS school year starts with addition delayed

opportunity to check out the junior annex site on Caroline Street, which was officially closed and declared surplus to the board last spring. Junior Kindergarten students joined them for their first day on Thursday. It's anticipated the two full-day JK/SK classes will move to their new accomodations at the main school within a week or so. There they will find two identical, bright and spacious classrooms with shared washroom facilities and a cloakroom.

Funding for that addition came from the Province's Full Day Kindergarten initiative. There are plans for three more phases of improvements of NCPS, including an expanded gym and library, but funding for those would have to come from the Simcoe County District School Board's capital allocation, for which the Board of Trustees prioritizes projects every year. At present, nothing has been allocated for NCPS.

That said, Birchall is happy to have the new Kindergarten space, and is looking forward to having all of the school's staff and students under one roof.

"There are real advantages to that," she said, mentioning mentor/mentee relationships between primary and intermediate students and access to the gym and library for all as examples.

Beyond the new infrastructure, Birchall said the school will continue its focus on numeracy this year, and especially its efforts to bring parents up

to date on how their children are being taught math.

Last year's successful inaugural Family Math Night will become an annual event, after-hours numeracy lessons will continue for selected students and teachers are also being encouraged to include 10 or 15 minutes of daily math drills in addition to more progressive approaches.





## Telephone and online voting could be a problem

To The Editor:

Most voters are probably unaware that in its infinite wisdom, Clearview Council decided to do away with a paper-based voting system and impose, without much debate, an electronic voting system which requires all voters to use a computer or a touchtone phone ("follow the prompts") to register their votes for Mayor, Deputy Mayor and a Councillor of choice in their riding.

This means that unless you have access to a touchtone phone or a computer, are computer literate or have endless patience, you will have a real problem voting in the next municipal election. According to the Council bylaw, no one is allowed to help you with the many steps involved in voting or do anything that might give them access to your secret PIN. So if you are not comfortable with using a bank machine, just imagine how difficult it is going to be to register your vote. People who are leading shut-in lives in retirement homes or nursing homes are going to have an even tougher time voting and their needs were not even considered by our so very smart Council! Now to be fair, the Township has some instructions on its website on how to vote electronically, but unless you have a computer you will

not be able to access those instructions to learn what you should do to vote.

As if all of this is not bad enough, there is going to be no paper record of how people voted, there is no requirement for the computer code or results to be placed in the hands of a trusted third party (such as Elections Canada) and it will be almost impossible to check after-the-fact to ensure there was no fraud involved.


The system is not, according to my best information, approved by Elections Canada or by the Federal or Provincial governments and you would think that at the very least the Province of Ontario should have tested and approved the system. I checked the experience of some other municipalities which used this system, owned by a small company in Nova Scotia and funded in part by the Nova Scotia government, and many encountered problems of various kinds during their last elections. Surprisingly, it appears that the municipality in which the company being used by Clearview is located has selected a Spanish company to run their voting system in the next election!

We have all read or heard of the security problems

created by hackers. Well, a number of computer experts have expressed very serious concerns about the security of electronic voting software and unanswered questions have been put to the Township Clerk, Ms. Fettes, to determine why they chose Intelivote Systems Inc., and just how safe the system is in making sure nothing goes wrong with the election. When our Council was made aware of possible deficiencies and concerns, the Deputy Mayor is on record as responding to one detailed enquiry to Council with the words "...stop wasting our time." One final note: Jim Wilson MPP, when alerted to possible problems with the security and reliability of the electronic voting system, passed those concerns to the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing for review. He did not respond with "... stop wasting my time."

It will be interesting to see how some very legitimate issues regarding the voting system are handled with less than two months to the election and I hope that those who feel disenfranchised by not being computer literate or by not having access to a computer will protest very loudly to our Council and to Elections Ontario.

## The Men Who Made Creemore

"The Hiseys made Creemore" has often been remarked, but how many of you know anything about them? A walk around Creemore may show no evidence that they were here to many. If you stand in Foodland parking lot facing west, you'll see a

big empty space that at one time was the busiest spot in the whole area.

But there are reminders of the Hiseys around town. The 100 Mile Store was once their head office, with a vault at the back that is now a storeroom. Two of the Hisey houses on Mill Street still stand. One is on the southwest corner of Mill Street and Johnson Avenue. The other is one of the brick houses across the street. One of the nicest reminders of the Hiseys is the display of peonies in the perennial border along the edge of Johnson Avenue. Jake Hisey, who is also remembered as the originator of Creemore Horticultural Society, planted them.

The following account of the Hisey business comes from a special edition of the Creemore Star issued March 11, 1937, to mark the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the paper.

"The Hisey farm was on Ten Hill just outside the corporation. In 1880 Mr. Hisey Sr. opened a butcher shop in Gowan's Hotel [now the Sovereign] and the following year built the brick building which has ever since been the Creemore Meat Market. Mr. Hisey had several sons and these young men soon

became interested in the business.

"The farmers up to this date sold all their hogs dressed. The Fearman Packing House at Hamilton was a new industry and in 1885 the Hiseys shipped the first carload of live hogs that ever went out of this district. It was the beginning of a new era for farmers.

"Gradually, the business of shipping live stock increased, including cattle, lambs and hogs. The old gentleman died and the two brothers, Sam and Jacob, entered a partnership styled S. & J. Hisey.

"A packing plant started in Collingwood in 1894, and this firm secured a franchise to be that company's buyers and shippers, for much of the County of Simcoe. Buyers were placed at nearly every station from Palgrave to Creemore, also on the Cookstown and Thornton line. Altogether they did business at eighteen shipping points.

"The farmers rushed into hog raising and thirty carloads, many of them double-decked, was the average weekly shipment. There were so many carloads of hogs passing over the local railroad that the train was referred to as the 'Hog Special.' The name still sticks, but many of the younger generation never knew how it originated.

"The farm had been in the grain business in the late nineties as well as the live stock trade. In 1900 they built a modern elevator and became large buyers and shippers of grain. A modern office building was built in 1901. There were no banks in Creemore at that time, and in this office was built a substantial vault, as enormous amounts of money were necessarily carried. The firm also had grain buyers at ten other shipping points, and all the business was handled through the head office in Creemore.

"New lines were added; an apple cold storage building with a potato house below was built about 1905. That year twenty thousand barrels of apples were handled through this building; nearly all were sold for export. The firm also handled coal, cement and other bulky commodities.

"The Hisey business was possibly at its peak from 1905 to 1910. There was a huge turnover annually, and so many farmers delivered their produce to Hiseys' that stable accommodation at the hotels was at a premium.

"Both members of the firm had

married and built fine homes. They were both big men in every sense, and worked not only for themselves but for the good and welfare of Creemore. They were promoters in helping the village get a water system, which was put in in 1905, and a few years later hydro light and power.

"Gradually big changes occurred. The Collingwood packing plant closed and this ended their extensive franchise. Other shippers started up and gradually the business was all confined to Creemore. Mr. Sam Hisey moved to Toronto about 1920, leaving his brother, Jake, in full control. Unfortunately the latter went into ill health and in 1924 he passed on. The business was sold later that year to H.P. Shepherd and Son, the present proprietors [Bill Gordon would later own the business].

"This story would not be complete without paying a well-deserved tribute to the Hisey brothers. It has often been said that the Hiseys made Creemore, and this statement is not much wide of the mark. They had the confidence of farmers, and as every farmer delivered his produce with team and wagon, there was a large number of farmers to be seen in Creemore every day. 
## A final Ward 4 Town Hall meeting
