#### It's last call for Small Halls Festival line-up

The Avening Hall will host Whitney Rose, Sam Cash and the Romantic Dogs and The Devin Cuddy Band on Friday, Oct. 3.

All three acts are with Cameron House Records, a recording and promotion company out of the legendary Queen Street bar.

### **Trustees matter**

The election of trustees doesn't get the attention it deserves.

As part of the upcoming municipal election, people will be asked to vote for their representative on the school board of their choosing.

The majority of the people in this area will be voting for the trustee who will represent Clearview Township and Collingwood on the Simcoe County District School Board or the trustee who will represent Clearview Township, Collingwood, Springwater Township and Wasaga Beach on the Simcoe Muskoka Catholic District School Board. There are also elections for the French public and separate school boards.

People are eligible to vote for the representative of the school board their taxes are directed towards.

During a municipal election there are those that care and those that don't. And then there are those that can get excited about prospective council members but don't give the race for trustee a second thought.

It doesn't make sense.

Schools are an important part of our community, no argument.

Most children spend more waking hours in the care of educators than with their own family members.

Canadians often cite public education as one of the fundamental cornerstones of this country.

Some people put in their first community volunteer hours at schools once their child enrolls.

We get to know the principals, teachers and school

staff.

When schools are closed we go ballistic. Yet, working away in the background are the board of trustees. They are the elected officials who make decisions about what goes on at the schools, they are the council of the school board.

In the same way that township staff is directed by decisions of council, the school board staff is directed by decisions of the board of trustees.

Most people don't know who their trustee is or what that person does yet they are rarely included in candidate debates.

They make important decisions about all kinds of things from programming to bricks-and-mortar.

The Simcoe County District School Board controls a budget of more than \$500 million.

Clearview's budget last year was \$96,841,000, and that was higher than usual.

Trustees work for the voters in the same way council members do. They are someone people can call when they are having an issue at school. They are the representatives of the people.

The trustee for the Catholic school board in this election is acclaimed but there is a race in both French language school board elections and in the English public board, of which many of us are supporters through our taxes.

Two strong candidates have put their names forward for trustee. We urge voters to give them a second thought and then vote.

# Please test and replace your smoke alarms and stay fire safe at home

An important fire safety program is in place in Creemore and communities across Ontario throughout Fire Prevention Week Oct. 5-11 and extending over the entire month.

I am writing to make all parents aware of the initiative and how they can help.

Fire departments are working with teachers to educate children about the importance of properly functioning and installed smoke alarms.

Watch for "Test and Replace Your Smoke Alarm" homework kit in your child's backpack, which includes a home fire escape plan and "Test and Replace" Fire Safety Checklist.

The packages are designed to work in tandem with the website www.safeathome.ca/testandreplace.

It is critical to know that working smoke alarms installed correctly throughout your home, double the chances of surviving a catastrophic house fire.

To ensure your families safety from fire, you must test your smoke alarms monthly to confirm they are in proper working order.

Smoke alarm batteries must be replaced with fresh ones at least once per year. Also, smoke alarms do not last forever.

If your smoke alarm is more than 10 years old it must be replaced. Outdated alarms might not provide the protection you count on.

Some new models feature 10-year lithium batteries which never need to be changed and last the full life of the alarm

Please be fire safe and test and replace your smoke alarms this Fire Prevention Week.

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## Clearview candidates for mayor and deputy mayor take Q&A

The Creemore Echo posed three questions to the candidates running for mayor and deputy mayor:

- 1. As county councillor, how would you raise Clearview's regional profile?
- 2. What is the best strategy for economic development in Clearview *Township?*
- 3. How do you choose between adding services and reducing/ maintaining tax rates?

#### Mayoral candidates Alicia Savage

1. Over the last eight years, I have worked closely with the mayor and together we have established strong relationships with county staff and council resulting in Clearview's recognition as a leader in Simcoe. As chair of human services, I have played a key role in policy development, advocacy at the provincial and federal levels, new initiatives in long-term care, housing, paramedic services and other areas as well as actively providing input into all sectors of County responsibilities.

I will continue to build on the strong relationships in place with our neighbouring and regional municipal partners, seeking opportunities to share resources and find synergies. My experience at other county stakeholder organizations such as the Simcoe Muskoka Board of Health, Simcoe County Alliance to End Homelessness, and Simcoe County District School Board Bridges out of Poverty will continue to benefit Clearview directly and indirectly.

2. One of the priorities of the next term of council is to develop an economic development strategy, a task that must include all sectors and











we have to facilitate new development in order to expand the assessment base simply to maintain the status quo. At some point, however, this becomes

unsustainable. Therefore, we continue to seek out cost savings by utilizing new technology, entering into partnerships and considering service levels. I view taxes as an investment in the quality of life I enjoy in my community, province and country. As investors, residents need assurance that funds are being spent responsibly and so we continue to improve our budget process. accountability and communication.

It will be increasingly difficult to add or increase services in this economic climate so we will have to approach these opportunities cautiously, considering all options including sharing with neighbouring municipalities and determining whether the benefit is worth the investment.

#### **Chris Vanderkruys**

1. I would strongly advocate for more fund distribution (from provincial and federal governments) as we struggle with very little industrial and commercial tax base as we are known for our farming community and don't want to change that. We need the tax base that is from industrial and commercial usage but have not been successful in attracting them and may not as many businesses choose to locate in certain areas and focus on market area models and profit maximizing. We need business leadership and also community leadership tied into one. The leadership group, not just individuals can be drawn from all parts of the community and they can make change happen. Effective leadership is a discipline and a major commitment to action. I will lead Clearview with the help of all residents to create our vision. breaking bottlenecks, establishing tough but achievable goals, and leveraging community interest and involvement.

2. Clearview needs to consider completing township-wide improvement plans such as many of our neighbours have. This will help to identify and develop an incentive program that will offer investment opportunities to public and private companies. This will also ensure that all growth associated with it will create a positive impact on Clearview's economy and social needs for the future.

leveraged as a result, we will be able to define an economic development strategy that has tangible actions and goals. The strategy must define the municipality's role, specifically as it relates to facilitating development on the newly serviced industrial/ commercial lands.

A likely outcome of the strategy will be a focus on supporting our current small business community and creating an environment that will promote new entrepreneurs while ensuring we can maintain and retain mid-size companies as they expand.

We will also be able to capitalize on the County of Simcoe's ongoing investment in Economic Development including staff resources, county-wide initiatives and dedicated funding.

3. This is the challenge facing all municipalities as other levels of government continue to cut back funding while adding regulations and requirements in addition to downloading more responsibilities. In a growth-based economy like Canada,

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

3. Reducing taxes is not an option with our challenges we face but we do need to review our staffing levels and ensure our resources are best situated to reflect our current needs and that our spending is justified. We had anticipated much growth since 2010 but many factors have delayed it and now that growth does need to happen to assist covering the costs that we have incurred in planning for it. Many say that our township has been closed for business and the time has come to ensure we are open and ready to grow where possible. We need to ensure that the residents are aware of the spending consistently, and also ensure that residents have more say in the future projects we plan. We need to be more accountable with the dollars raised through taxation and ensure they are being spent and invested with our vision in mind always.

# Water and wastewater rates going up next year

Clearview Township council is banking on development to help pay for water and sewer services.

Residents with those services will see a slight increase in their bills next year.

While the fixed portion of the bill will remain at \$163 per year but the volumetric rate will increase from \$1.94 to \$1.99 per cubic metre.

Rates will continue to increase each year with the fixed rate at \$169 by 2025 and the variable portion at \$2.45 per cubic metre. The wastewater rate will also go up in 2015.

Clearview council approved the new rates based on the Drinking Water and Wastewater System Rate Report prepared by Sharratt Water Management Ltd. dated August 22, an 11-year water and sewer rate report.

"The rate study takes into account everything that we do," said **Mike Rawn**, general manager of environmental services for Clearview Township. "It's capital replacement – we have dome pipes that are 100 years old – and equipment maintenance."

"The township has undertaken this project to prepare water rates, which will ensure that sufficient funds will be in place to cover the future water system operating costs, water and wastewater system lifecycle asset renewal and replacement costs. It will also provide the basis for the preparation and submission of a water system financial plan," states the report.

The updated water rate study and financial plan are required to renew Clearview Township's water licence, which is up for renewal in January 2015.

Council decided to go with the rates based on a full population projection of 18,750 by 2024, as calculated in last year's development charge background study.

"A user taking 70 cubic metres per year is projected to pay \$301 in 2015, or \$4 more per year compared to what was paid in 2014," states the report. "The bill

will be \$324 in 2019, and \$338 in 2025. Someone using 125 cubic metres per year will pay \$410 in 2015, or \$4 more than 2014, \$447 in 2019, and \$472 in 2025. A user of 300 cubic metres per year will pay a water bill of \$758 in 2015, or \$13 more than 2014, \$837 in 2019, and \$896 in 2025. An average user has been included in the table as average use is declining over time. The average user of 293 cubic metres per year will pay \$735 in 2015 or \$3 more than in 2014, will take 261 cubic metres in 2019 and pay \$750, and is projected to take 233 cubic metres per year in 2025 and pay \$734. Water use by the average user in all systems is expected to decline during 2015 to 2025."

**Ken Sharratt** told council members water use is declining due to water efficient fixtures.

The majority of the growth is slated for Stayner, Creemore and New Lowell.

Had council gone with rates based on half of the projected growth rates being realized, the fixed portion would go up \$10 in 2015. The rates will be reevaluated on an annual basis. Sharratt recommends the rates be increased if the projected growth is not realized in the next few years.





### Clearview fire department distributes alarms during Project Zero

The Clearview Fire Department has received 376 smoke and carbon monoxide alarms as part of Project

In partnership with Enbridge Gas Distribution and the Fire Marshal's Public Fire Safety Council they are working to bring the number of fire and carbon monoxide-related deaths down to zero.

"This is an excellent opportunity to work with our safety partners and enhance our smoke alarm and carbon monoxide program. Early detection is key and this program will be a valuable initiative to achieve this," said Clearview Township Fire Chief Colin Shewell.

Locally, the fire department will install the alarms for those who need assistance. The devices can also be picked up at the hub.

During the campaign, more than 4,500 alarms are being provided to residents in 15 municipalities in Ontario. Enbridge invested \$100,000 this year in Project Zero.

The alarms will be distributed to homes in neighbourhoods where the number of residential fires and fire-related deaths and injuries have been higher than average.

"Safety is our top priority at Enbridge, and we're committed to helping ensure there are no deaths in Ontario due to carbon monoxide exposure," said Enbridge Gas director of construction **Frank Smith**. "Educating customers about the importance of installing a combination smoke and carbon monoxide alarm and properly maintaining fuel-burning equipment is an ongoing priority."

Since 2009, Project Zero has been launched in 64 Ontario communities.

"Smoke and carbon monoxide alarms are critical life safety devices. They detect the presence of smoke and deadly gas and provide those precious seconds for occupants to escape. Everyone needs to have them in their homes," said Ontario Fire Marshal Ted Wieclawek.

In Ontario, it is the law that every home must have a working smoke alarm on every storey and outside all sleeping areas. While regulations on Bill 77 – the Hawkins Gignac Act, which gives the government the authority to make having a carbon monoxide detector mandatory – have not yet been finalized, a carbon monoxide detector is highly recommended by the Ontario Fire Marshal.

Combination smoke and carbon monoxide alarms, when properly installed and maintained, help provide the early warning that is needed to safely escape from


a house fire or carbon monoxide exposure.


Carbon monoxide is a toxic, odourless gas that is a by-product of incomplete combustion of many types of common fuels. It is important that all fuel-burning equipment be properly maintained to prevent carbon monoxide buildup.

Carbon monoxide alarms are recommended as a second line of defense to protect against the dangers of carbon monoxide poisoning.

The hub is located at 6993 Highway 26, in Stayner. People can call the fire department if they need assistance with the installation of the alarms. Call 705-428-4355.

The department has until Nov. 15 to distribute all of the devices.








Do we not have a beautiful kaleidoscope of colour in the trees surrounding us this season?





M. Joan Bichan (née Heslip), daughter of Frank and Jean, brother of Jack, all deceased, passed away peacefully, on Wednesday, September 24, at St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto, after a brief illness, at

the age of 95. She was the beloved mother of David (Heather), and Dougal (Joyce, Linda), and the well-loved grandmother of Kyle (Jen) and Michael (Danielle), and the great-grandmother of Morgan, Kendall and Adam. She also leaves her niece, Susan Cameron (Rick) and her great nieces, Melissa (Ben) and Katie (David) and their children Hannah, Ian, Jackson and Sydney.

Her extraordinary life included a long career beginning as a surgical nurse at Toronto General Hospital. She was particularly proud to have served as a nurse in the Royal Canadian Navy, in England, during WW II. In her own words, she then "leapt into retirement" and became a moving force in the cultural life of Collingwood. She was a force of nature, feisty, cherished by many, and will be greatly missed, by all who knew her, for her intelligence, curiosity, wit, boundless energy, her paintings, her pies, and, of course, her knitting.

She will be buried in Creemore Union Cemetery beside her brother Jack and his wife Winona.
